## **FOSTER YOUTH JOIN FOREVER FAMILIES AT ADOPTION DAY**

CASA of Passaic and Union Counties


On a recent fall morning, five youth ranging from three to 10 years old entered the courtrooms of Superior Court Judges Gavin Handwerker, Paul Nieves and Chanel Hudson as foster youth and, shortly after, emerged as official members of their new families.

Adoption Day is eagerly anticipated by many at Union County's Family Court, as ample smiles fill the courthouse – a juxtaposition to the daily navigation of complex issues fraught with loss or discord. This year, county dignitaries presented families with proclamations and certificates, and festivities included performances by 30 high school students from Elizabeth's Thomas Jefferson Arts Academy A Cappella Choir; a former foster youth sharing her personal journey and adoption story; a roaming balloon artist; sheriff's officers dressed as superheroes and a Batmobile outside for visiting; furry greetings from Kenilworth's David Brearley Middle High School mascot bear; personalized cupcakes; and ice cream, face painting, and friendship-bracelet making stations.

CASA of Passaic and Union Counties presented family fun-themed gift baskets made possible in part from donations by David Brearley Bears That Care program and the Union County Bar Association. Baskets were given to all those finalizing on Adoption Day, as well as several families who adopted earlier in the year.

Cynthia Evans of Scotch Plains was among the CASA volunteers to attend the ceremonies for their assigned children. "The day was a long



time coming for these sisters, and it was amazing," she said. "I've been their advocate since 2020. Between their adoptive families and all involved, embraces and cheers were aplenty. My time as their CASA volunteer was both rewarding and challenging. I'm thankful I could help ensure their needs were met and services were provided while in care."

Adoption Day is a national movement to raise awareness of children in foster care. Since its inception 23 years ago, nearly 60,000 children have found permanency. More than 437,000 youth in the United States are currently in the child welfare system awaiting a permanent home, and the average wait is four years. For more than 23,000 youth, that doesn't happen, and they age out of the system, facing life on their own.

#### PERFECT AND EXCEEDED EXPECTATIONS SCORES ON NJSLA ASSESSMENTS

#### Rahway Public Schools

Franklin Elementary School in Rahway recently hosted a ceremony to honor the Franklin School NJSLA All-Stars and their induction into the 800 Club for their academic achievements. Twenty-three students in grades 4 through 6 were recognized for their outstanding achievements of earning an 800 or higher on the Spring 2023 New Jersey Student Learning (NJSLA) assessment. NJSLA is given annually in the spring to students in grades 3-12. NJSLA scores are reported on a scale of 650 to 850 for ELA and Mathematics. The scale is divided into five performance levels. Students scoring at least 750 are considered to have Met Expectations, while students scoring 800 and above have Exceeded Expectations. NJSLA scores are used to measure student progress over time and to identify students who may need additional support. The scores are also used to hold schools accountable for their performance.

Two students, Juliette (Grade 4 English Language Arts) and Jeison (Grade 5 Math) were also recognized for their exceptional achievement of earning a perfect score on the NJSLA. Jeison's accomplishment is particularly noteworthy as he is a former English Language Learner who has excelled through the school's

bilingual program and is thriving academically.

The honored students and their families were treated to a breakfast in the school's cafeteria, followed by a ceremony in the school auditorium. During the ceremony, the students were presented with certificates of recognition from Rahway's Board of Education President, Mr. Bernard Robson; Dr. Aleya Shoieb, Rahway's Acting Superintendent; and Dr. Patrick Holness, Franklin School's Principal. The honorees also received a gift bundle courtesy of Dr. Tiffany Beer, Director of Curriculum and Instruction, and the Curriculum and Instruction staff. The event was well attended by their peers, families, teachers, district coaches, district administrators, and Rahway Board of Education Members.

"These students have demonstrated exceptional talent and dedication to their studies," said Dr. Aleya Shoieb. "We are thrilled to recognize their achievements and to celebrate their success."

"We are incredibly proud of our 800 Club members," said Dr. Patrick Holness. "They are an inspiration to their peers and the entire Franklin School community. They have set a high standard for their peers and have shown what it means to be a true Franklin Scholar."

The SBRG began in 2017 in response to hurricanes in Puerto Rico and the U.S. Virgin Islands. The Program relaunched in 2020 and was made available again in 2021 to aid small businesses and nonprofit organizations facing challenges due to the Coronavirus pandemic. By participating in the SBRG this year, The Atlantic was able to grant \$10,000 each to Bianca F.L.O.W.E.R.S. Inc. in Plainfield, Jewish Family Service of Central New Jersey, Mobile Meals of Westfield, St. Joseph Social Service Center in Elizabeth, and The SHARE Alliance in Springfield.

## **A LOOK AT RAHWAY – 100, 75, 50 YEARS AGO**

#### 1924

The invited speaker at a meeting of the Rebecca Cornell Rahway Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) spoke on immigration, a hot topic in the 1920s. It was the speaker's opinion that the government should restrict the influx of immigrants and expressed a need for a policy of selective immigration. The presenter also promoted the view that all publications should be printed in English. The more things change...

The Union County Park Commission purchased 129 acres of land located on the west side of St. Georges Avenue from the City of Rahway with plans to create a county park. The acreage, consisting of two parcels known as the Castor-Denman property and the Rahway Poor farm, had previously been bought by the city to help expedite the plans of the park officials. The action assured that Rahway would have a beautiful park within the city limits that would be managed and maintained by the county.

The World War 1 "Baby Boomers" were reaching school age and the Board of Education was discussing the need for more school buildings and for renovations to the older ones. The new Franklin School, built in 1922, was already over-crowded and Lincoln, Washington, and Columbian were antiquated. Plans soon got underway for the construction of Roosevelt and Cleveland Schools to give relief to the conditions at Franklin. Public school student enrollment reached 2,300 when schools opened in September, the largest number in the city's history. St. Mary's Parochial School had also reached its highest enrollment and plans were being made for a new, more modern building.

After the war, the Ku Klux Klan reared its ugly head and their hate-filled activities began to surface in cities in both southern and northern states. By the middle of the decade, their shadowy presence was being felt in cities throughout Union County including Rahway. In July, Rahway Police received a report of a cross burning on the southeast corner of St. Georges and Central Avenues. The noxious presence of the Klan would become even more overt in 1925 and 1926.

#### 1949

Construction of the housing development on the west side of Madison Avenue on the acreage behind Rahway High School began in the spring of 1949. More than 360, single family homes would eventually be constructed. Plans for building projects were also commencing for the vast area on the west side of St. Georges Avenue between Lake Avenue and Colonia Boulevard. By the end of the year, Rahway broke all records for new construction.

New homes in the western section of the city meant new schools were needed for the children who would grow up in these neighborhoods. In May, the Board of Education purchased property on Madison Avenue next to the high school as the site for a new elementary school. Madison School would open in September, 1953.

The scourge of polio, the dreaded, highly contagious, infectious disease, that had been crippling adults and children during much of the first half of the 20th century, would reach pandemic proportions by the late 1940s. In August, eight polio cases, including one death, were reported by the Rahway Health Department. Union County officials reported 26 cases, including three deaths, with the state totaling 227 cases in the same month. The pandemic would get worse and would reach its peak in 1953 with 58,000 cases reported in the United States. The Salk vaccine (1952) and the Sabin oral vaccine (1955) helped to end the pandemic and control the disease.

#### 1974

In October, 1973, the Arab oil nations placed an oil embargo that targeted several nations including the United States that would last until March of 1974. Wide-spread shortages of oil and gasoline soon caused serious problems for most Americans as long lines of cars leading to gas stations stretched for blocks. Wait time to get served could take hours. To lessen the hardships, mandatory state regulations were put into place on Monday, February 11. Automobile owners with even numbered license numbers would get gas on even numbered days, while odd license numbers would get served on odd days. A minimum purchase of \$5.00 was required to get gas. If the car's tank was more than half full, no gas would be pumped. Station hours were staggered to help deal with the crisis. The embargo finally came to an end after six months of inconvenience.

A site for a new city hall-police station to stand on the corner of Main Street and Milton Avenue was finally selected and approved at a meeting of the city council in early February. Although the project was given approval by a vote of the council in June, the complex was not completed and dedicated until 1982.

Rahway Boy Scout Troop 141 was certified by the American Revolution Bicentennial Administration to be the first official Bicentennial Scout Troop in the nation. Sponsored by the Second Presbyterian Church, the troop was presented with the Bicentennial Flag during a ceremony at the National Office of the Boy Scouts of America in North Brunswick.





### **NORTHERN MOCKINGBIRDS**

Now common in our area, Northern Mockingbirds are widely known for their singing ability. Mockingbirds sing to establish their territory and attract mates. Their songs have a series of phrases that are repeated two to six times. They can incorporate other sounds into their songs, often imitating other songbirds but sometimes frogs and dogs. On a warm summer night unmated male mockingbirds fill the air with their songs. Mockingbirds sometimes sing during late fall and winter for reasons still being studied.

Mockingbirds have been videoed mimicking car alarms and emergency sirens making them very unpopular to the residents of those neighborhoods. You can see some of these videos on YouTube.

Mockingbirds have gray-brown feathering on their heads and backs, with pale undersides and long tails that stick out while flying. Each of their somewhat short wings has two white bars and white patches that can be seen on the wing while the birds are in flight. They have long, thin black bills that curve slightly downward. Mockingbirds are a medium-sized song bird. Adults are 8.3-10.2 inches long, with a wingspan of 12.2-13.8 inches. Generally, they weigh around 1.6 to 2 ounces.

Juvenile's bellies can be heavily spotted with pale edging giving their back and head a streaked appearance.

Northern Mockingbirds prefer open areas, such as forest edges, parks and suburban backyards. They can be found year-round throughout the United States and Caribbean, Southern Canada, Mexico and Central America. Some individuals in the northern part of their range will migrate south if the weather gets too extreme.

Mockingbirds live alone through much of the year, but males and females pair up during the breeding season. Both birds can be fiercely territorial and will chase off a wide variety of

intruders. Northern Mockingbirds aggressively defend their nest and are known to attack and mob potential predators including people that approach too close. Northern Mockingbirds have been known to identify individual people who repeatedly encroach into their nesting territory and will selectively harass them.

I will write about mockingbirds mating in more detail in the early spring as mating season approaches.

Northern mockingbirds eat mainly insects in the summer, but occasionally crustaceans and small lizards depending on the region. In winter, they eat berries and fruits, including ones found in backyard gardens. They scout out their foraging area from an above-ground perch and will descend as low as the ground when the coast is clear to look for food.

In the winter mockingbirds are very protective of food within their territory even if they don't eat it themselves. I have watched them eat peanut butter off the logs meant for woodpeckers, but in my garden their favorite food seems to be apples. Mockingbirds will chase away smaller birds from seed feeders that I have never witnessed them eating themselves.

In order to help these smaller often colorful birds, I place the apple away from the rest of the feeders. This draws the mockingbirds away but

now their main competition for the apple will be Starlings that comes in flocks for this fresh fruit snack and of course squirrels.


