



IMAGINE'S VOLUNTEER FEBRUARY TRAINING

A recent participant in Imagine's last volunteer facilitator training shared this about her experience: "The training was truly amazing and inspiring. I am so honored to have had the opportunity to participate in it." Another shared: "The Imagine Staff are amazing. I so appreciate all the knowledge they shared and the encouragement they gave to me and the other participants."

Participants in Imagine's training programs often describe the experience as "life-changing". In addition to story sharing and the opportunity to support one another, training participants gain knowledge and skills regarding Alan Wolfelt's Companioning Model for grief support that's practiced at Imagine. Participants often walk away with a new understanding of themselves, and a new capacity for supporting the people in their lives. They bring this understanding to their role as facilitators in Imagine's peer support group program where children, youth, young adults and adults come together to share their grief experiences and receive and give support.

Imagine's volunteer facilitators come from all walks of life and no special background is required other than a willingness to listen, a heart inclined to serve, and the ability to be with children and adults in grief without trying to fix, solve or give advice. No prior experience is necessary. Volunteers must be 18 years or older. Bilingual (Spanish speaking) volunteers are needed as well. Volunteers serve as companions and loving listeners for those who are grieving and help create a space where participants can share tears and embrace the joys of life.

If you'd like to join us for Imagine's next facilitator training, it will be held Saturday, Feb. 17th through Monday, February 19th from 9 am-5 pm each day at Imagine's Newark Center at 570 Broad Street in Newark, and we ask that our new volunteers attend the entire training. Our new Newark center is located downtown in the Chase building with parking available directly behind the building. It's also close to public transportation. We're hoping those completing the training will be able to facilitate groups held every other week at our Newark center. We have İmagine a world where no child grieves alone

DR. JOHN VERMEULE HOUSE OPEN HOUSE

Green Brook Historical Society The Dr. John. Vermeule House, located at 223

Rock Avenue, Green Brook, will be open for visitors on Saturday 2/17/24 at 10:00 a.m. - 12:00 p.m. There you will meet several of its volunteer members to give you a glimpse into 19th - 20th century rural living.

The Dr. John Vermeule House, one of Green Brook's historic links to its early settlers was built as a farmstead. Construction began in 1799 and became occupied by the Vermeule family in 1805. Dr. Vermeule practiced medicine and operated a farm on the original 113 acres of his property. The home is based on a blending of English and Dutch architectural traditions with Georgian and Federal style influences.

Vermeule ownership of the property ended in 1824. Various families bought and sold the property over the years, namely, Vail, Cohen, Voorhies and lastly, Mundy. The farmstead continued to function as a dairy farm into the mid-20th century. The township of Green Brook acquired the house and remaining 2.2 acres of the property in 2008. Necessary preservation renovations have been made to some structural elements, but the house is virtually unchanged from its original construction. There are some interesting outbuildings and farm equipment to see on the 2-acre property. There is wheelchair accessibility to the first floor.


NJ MOM CELEBRATING 10-YEAR ANNIVERSARY OF LIVER TRANSPLANT

NJ Sharing Network

Renee Reilly, a resident of Madison, NJ, is celebrating an incredible milestone as she marks the 10-year anniversary of her life-saving liver transplant. Renee, 52, has not only cherished every moment of her life since her successful transplant but is also passionate about advocating for NJ Sharing Network, the nonprofit organization responsible for the recovery and placement of donated organs and tissue for transplant in the Garden State. She actively shares her story with others to encourage more people to register as organ and tissue donors.

"I continue to feel overwhelmed, humble, and grateful," said Renee. "Giving someone a second chance as an organ and tissue donor is such a special and amazing gift of love."

Renee's journey began when she was 16 years old and was diagnosed with Polycystic Kidney Disease (PKD). Her father, who also battled PKD, had received a life-saving kidney transplant that gave him an additional 35 years of life. Renee later developed Polycystic Liver Disease



"Waiting for the liver transplant phone call, I felt hopeless at times, tired, anxious, and I didn't think I would ever get 'the call,'" said Renee.

The pivotal moment in Renee's journey arrived unexpectedly on a day filled with emotional turmoil. Her father had been in the hospital for weeks due to complications from a previous surgery. Renee had just visited him when she received 'The Call' from the transplant center.

"I began to cry because I was filled with emotions, from joy and excitement to worry about my family and guilt about receiving such a precious gift. But my husband, John, and my sons, Ian and Brendan, served as a source of strength and kept me focused because they were excited to know that I was going to get a liver transplant," said Renee.

On August 6, 2013, Renee's liver transplant surgery was a success, giving her a new lease on life. In 2017, Renee's kidneys started to fail. Fortunately, she received a kidney transplant in 2018, sparing her from the hardships of dialysis

The transformation in Renee's life posttransplants has been remarkable. She now enjoys all of her favorite hobbies, including gardening, knitting/crocheting, sewing, and spending time with her family.

"Thanks to my organ donors and the miracle of transplantation, I have been there for unforgettable moments like my boys' graduations. I am now able to give hugs again without any pain due to my enlarged liver," said Renee. "Now, I am focused on sharing my story to give hope for those waiting for the gift of life and inspire everyone to register as organ and tissue donors."

According to United Network for Organ Sharing (UNOS), there are over 100,000 Americans – nearly 4,000 of whom live in New Jersey – waiting for a life-saving transplant. One organ and tissue donor can save eight lives and enhance the lives of over 75 others. 


PTO FUN RUN WAS A HUGE SUCCESS

RESIDENTIAL BURGLARY & CAR THEFT

A message from the Green Brook Police

Recently there has been an increase in residential burglaries and stolen vehicles occurring in Green Brook Township and throughout the entire state of New Jersey. The green Brook Police Department would like to take this opportunity to provide some information and help reduce the possibility of our residents becoming burglary or car theft victims.

- 1. Report ANY and ALL suspicious activity you see in your neighborhood.
- 2. Install quality door locks and dead bolts to all exterior doors of your home.
- 3. Keep all windows and doors locked, especially on the first floor.
- 4. Install an alarm system and surveillance cameras on the exterior and interior of your home. Make sure that the alarm is monitored by a central station that will immediately notify the police whenever there is an activation. Additionally, when you install cameras, please make sure that the system provides views to the street, driveway, all door entrances, and perimeter, if possible.
- 5. If you already have these systems, make sure that they are in working order and properly activated. We suggest you have a battery/cellular backup installed and remote monitoring activated.
- 6. Install motion lights on the perimeter of your property. Always keep the exterior of your home well-lit during all nighttime hours.
- 7. Communicate with your neighbors. Advise them before you go on vacation or extended weekend trips, so they can monitor your home. Have them take in your mail, package deliveries, garbage/recycle cans, and report any activity that may be out of the ordinary.
- 8. DO NOT post on any social media sites about your vacation plan and duration. Only post pictures/events from your trip AFTER you return home.
- 9. Fill out a Vacation House Check Form at the Green Brook Police Department, if no one is available to check on your residence when you go on vacation or extended weekend trips. Once the form is submitted, your home will be specifically checked by the patrol division in your absence.
- 10. Keep any valuables and cash in a home safe that is mounted to the floor or wall. If you do not have a mounted safe, secure these items, including your safe, in a well-hidden location that is not in your office or bedrooms.
- 11. Lock your vehicles. Do not leave key fobs or garage door remotes in the vehicles. Do not leave purses or valuables in plain view.

The Green Brook Police Department takes all investigations and the safety of our residents seriously. We encourage you to report any suspicious incidents, no matter how minor it may seem, to 732-968-1188. For any emergencies, please dial 911.


