RIBBON CUTTING FOR 12 HOMES IN SUMMIT

Morris Habitat for Humanity

Morris Habitat for Humanity, a major builder and leading advocate for affordable housing in New Jersey, celebrated the completion of 12 new homes in Summit with a dedication and ribbon cutting ceremony held on December 14, 2023. The celebration brought together the new Habitat homeowners, government officials, volunteers, donors and staff who partnered together to complete the new condominium complex.

"Today is a momentous occasion," said Liz DeCoursey, Morris Habitat CEO. "We are celebrating alongside the 12 families who will soon be moving in and calling 146 Morris Avenue home. These families have worked hard putting in their 'sweat equity,' building their own homes."

Morris Habitat provides a hand up not a handout to homeownership. Each of the new Summit homeowners performed between 300 - 400 hours of 'sweat equity' working alongside other Habitat volunteers toward building their homes.

Planning for the Summit project started in 2015 when Morris Habitat began meeting with the City of Summit and the Italian American Club, the previous owners of the property. While DeCoursey acknowledged the lengthy timeline, she also noted Morris Habitat's commitment to every project as a "miracle" for families and children.

DeCoursey highlighted the diverse effort that led to the project's completion. "Those of us who are committed to this work are not a homogenous group. We are from different backgrounds with different skills and experiences, some coming from nonprofits, businesses and government agencies. We come from different houses of worship, different towns and we speak different languages. Our individual differences make us stronger together, much like the community we helped build here today. But we all have one thing in common. We all believe everyone deserves a safe and affordable place to call home--a home where memories are made and where dreams come true."

Helping to make those dreams come true were 1,006 volunteers from civic, church, corporate and school groups who donated 7,660 hours of labor toward building the condominiums.

DeCoursey lauded all who came together to make the project possible, acknowledging a \$1.4 contribution from the City of Summit and \$100,000 from the Summit Civic Foundation. Other major funders included the New Jersey Department of Community Affairs and the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development. Sponsors included the Braunwarth Family; Cavalry Episcopal Church; Central Presbyterian Church; Fountain Baptist Church; St. John's Evangelical Lutheran Church and Hope Sferra. Other in-kind services were provided by Bowman Consulting Eikon Planning and Design; Dave Bossart of Property Research Associates; Kennon Surveying; Schenck, Price, Smith and King; architect Seth A. Leeb and Stewart Surveying and Engineering. Construction sponsors included GAF and United Site Services.

ANIKA JAIN CELEBRATED FOR ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

Johns Hopkins Center for Talented Youth

Anika Jain from Summit has been honored as one of the brightest students in the world by the Johns Hopkins Center for Talented Youth.

Anika, a student at Jefferson Elementary School, was honored for exceptional performance on the SAT, ACT, School and College Ability Test, or similar assessment taken as part of the CTY Talent Search. CTY uses above-grade-level testing to identify advanced students from around the world and provide a clear picture of their academic abilities.

Each year, about 16,000 students from more than 90 countries around the world join CTY. On average, less than 30 percent qualify for either High Honors or Grand Honors/SET based on their test scores.

"This is not just recognition of students' performance on one test, but a testament to their curiosity and capacity for learning," said Amy Shelton, PhD, executive director of CTY. "These students have demonstrated enormous potential, and now we encourage them to seek out experiences and communities that help them challenge and stretch their knowledge, connect with other young scholars, understand diverse perspectives, think critically, and pursue their goals confidently."

HEART ASSOCIATION AWARDS CERTIFICATION TO SPRING GROVE

THE FEBRUARY SPEAKERS PROGRAM FOR THE SUMMIT AREA OLD GUARD

The Summit Area Old Guard was founded in 1930 and meets most Tuesdays at the New Providence Presbyterian Church located at 1307 Springfield Ave. Our motto is "Come for the Programs. Stay for the Friends."

February speakers include Scott Hough, Ed Oatman or Amy Wagner, Dr. Yaron Moshel, and Amy Behr-Shields. Please join us. Our programs are free to the public, and we welcome you!

Our speaker on **Tuesday, February 6th** will be Scott Hough, Superintendent of Schools, Summit, NJ. Scott will give us an overview of the school system and describe the impact covid had and how he dealt with it (he was appointed to his position in June 2020!). Scott will also discuss critical issues facing all school administrators, such as bullying, security and student safety. Roughly one half of Summit's annual budget goes to support the public schools, and the appeal of Summit as a great place to live is supported by its excellent schools.

Our speaker on **Tuesday, February 13th** will be either the manager or deputy manager of Union County, NJ. Union County has a diverse population equivalent in size to that of Wyoming and a budget of a half billion dollars. Most people are quite familiar with their own city or town, but usually know much less about their county. Ed Oatman, manager, or Amy Wagner, deputy manager, will hopefully change that for you. County operations include areas such as law enforcement/courts, parks & recreation, public works -roads and infrastructure, health care, economic development, and a lot more.

On **Tuesday, February 20th**, Dr. Yaron Moshel, co-director of the Gerald J. Glasser Brain Tumor Center at Atlantic Health System's Overlook Medical Center, will be our speaker. He is one of a select few surgeons who specialize in removing deep-seated brain tumors using technology that includes computer-guided navigation, awake intraoperative brain mapping, endoscopy, and microsurgery. Dr. Moshel will explain how the convergence of precision medicine, advanced robotics, and specialized imaging are fostering new breakthroughs in the treatment of brain and spine tumors.

Finally, on **Tuesday, February 27th**, we ask the question, 'with so much information accessible online, is a public library still relevant'? Amy Behr-Shields, the Director of the Summit Free Library, will explain how the library is needed to curate reliable sources of information, and to manage the complexities of digital and non-digital media, while serving as a community center and a welcoming environment. You will also be surprised to learn how many varied programs and services the library offers.

SWIMMING WITH FRIENDS FOR OVER 20 YEARS

A group of Masters Swimmers from Madison and the surrounding areas have now had the privilege of swimming together for two decades at the Madison YMCA, the Madison Community Pool, the Summit YMCA and other close by locations. Traditionally, we track monthly swim yardage for the entire year on a user-friendly web site (with support from our web site coordinator Barry Lass). Each of our 60 swimmers has a chance to see how they rank throughout the year in total yards within the group in a monthly newsletter.

Also, as we do every year in January, the Masters Yardstick Swimmers gathered recently at our 20th anniversary annual awards breakfast on January 6th - a combined live (at the Kemmerer Library in Harding Township) and online (via Zoom) event- with strong participation (39 in person and 6 on Zoom)! Hosted by longtime swimmers Bob Nissen, Joe Donohue, and Richard Clew, the multi-media slide show and event highlighted activities of 2023 (aided by our group historian, Barbara Rushman) and brought us together in such a way that all active members could enjoy.

It began with a fascinating summary of our 20year history- how we started, how we have evolved and grown as the "Yardstick Swimmers", and what we have accomplished as a group. Since 2004, our collective swimming efforts are amazing- logging more than 371 million yardsor nearly 211,000 miles! That is equivalent to swimming "around the world" more than 8 times!

After reviewing a number of "20th Anniversary Workouts" submitted by our swimmers, we were entertained with a Surprise Video Tape and Congratulations Message from Rowdy Gaines, 3-time Olympic Gold Medal Winner in Swimming.

Many of our swimmers enjoy participating in group workouts at the Walker D. Kirby Aquatics Center in its modern eight lane pool at the Madison YMCA. For further information on the pool and swim program, please contact the main desk at the Madison YMCA at 973-822-9622.

Ultimately, we moved on to the highlight of the event- our Annual Awards. Jane Ikeda of Mendham, Diane Dinsmore of Madison, and Bob Franks of Chatham were each named "Bold Performer of the Year", for demonstrating improved performance, exceptional effort and a special commitment to the swimming program. 3 D(imension) 20th Anniversary Awards for long



term participation and passion for swimming by 1,461,630 yards, or 830 miles! Sandra was exemplifying Commitment, Consistency, and Competitiveness were presented to Jennifer Bauman of Parsippany, Bill Sullivan of Florham Park, and Richard Clew of Harding Township.

The Team Competition was unbelievable, with our two squads each swimming more than 12 million yards in a competition that was close until the final day, when The Yardstick Rulers (led by Captain Richard Clew) bested the Yardstick Junkies (led by Captain Bill Sullivan). Finally, our top two swimmers for 2023 were runner up Cindy Viola of Chatham, and Yardstick Winner Sandra Seddon of Chatham, swimming

awarded the Doug Clark Championship Yardstick, named in memory of our former "Yardstick Swimmer".

We all had a great time and were so happy to connect with our swimming friends for this special 20th Anniversary celebration. And we will continue our monthly yard tracking in 2024, and are convinced that our program will grow in numbers! ELKS RECEIVE VETERANS WELCOME HOME KITS

Recently, twenty-five area Elks and volunteers helped to restock the shelves at the NJ State Elks Veterans Annex in Stirling. The items that were received will be assembled into Welcome Home Kits and delivered free of charge to previously homeless Veterans who are moving into a new residence.

Welcome Home Kits include a bed, night stand, dresser, sofa, dining table and chairs, lamps, bedding, linens, appliances, cleaning supplies, a shower curtain, mats, pots and pans, flatware, glassware, and more. All items are brand new.

Enough items to assemble 20 Welcome Home Kits were purchased by the NJ Elks East Central District, with Lodges in Stirling, Summit, Springfield, Mountainside, Union, Cranford, and Rahway, at a cost of approximately \$10,000 which was provided through grants, donations, and fundraising events.

The NJ State Elks National Veterans Service

SUMMIT EMS RESPONSES

Summit's EMS volunteers finished the year with a busy December, responding to 226 emergency calls.

Responses included 144 medical emergencies; 16 falls; 18 motor vehicle accidents, including 5 on routes 24 or 78; 15 traumatic injuries; one allergic reaction; 12 cases of overdose or poisoning; five responses to a medical alarm; two pedestrians struck by a vehicle, and two responses to a fire scene. Squad Volunteers also provided six "lift assists" to patients who did not require transport to a hospital.

16 emergency calls were answered by an offduty "back-up crew" of volunteers responding from home or work when the on-duty crew was busy. Summit volunteers also provided mutual aid assistance to neighboring towns 17 times. 11 patients transported to a hospital by Squad members also received advanced life support care from hospital-based paramedics who accompanied the Squad's ambulance. During December, Squad volunteers transported 161 patients to 4 different hospitals.

The Squad also provided 3 non-emergency ambulance transports for Summit residents, hosted 4 Emergency Management training sessions with the City of Summit, 2 presentations for Cub Scout groups, and a public CPR class.

The Squad answers calls for help 24 hours a day and at a variety of locations. December responses included 89 to a patient's home or apartment; 23 for accidents or medical emergencies on streets or highways; four in a

public park; two in a recreation facility; two in public buildings; 13 at a local business; five at a bar or restaurant, and 3 to a health care professional's office. There were also 22 medical incidents at Summit's train station; 19 at a local behavioral health facility; three on the grounds of Overlook Medical Center; 6 to an assisted living facility, five in a house of worship; 15 on a sidewalk or parking lot, four in a public building, two at Summit's Public Library, three at a school, and three in a hotel.

The all-volunteer First Aid Squad, responds to emergency calls 24/7, is entirely funded through private donations and does not bill for service. The Squad is always looking for new volunteers to join its ranks. All needed training, uniforms and equipment is provided.
