SABRINA QADRI, A JDRF AMBASSADOR, RAISES 3K

Warren Township Public Schools

With the support of her family, classmates, teachers, and school community, a student from Warren Township, NJ, JDRF Youth Ambassador Sabrina Qadri raised approximately \$3,000 for the Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation during the week of November 13, 2023, by collecting funds during a Coin Toss, and classroom collections.

On November 6, Qadri shared a letter with the Angelo L. Tomaso School community, where she attends as a grade five student, to introduce herself as a JDRF Youth Ambassador and explain her mission to help educate the Warren community about Type 1 Diabetes (T1D) and raise funds for the Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation.

Qadri shared that she was diagnosed with T1D at the age of four and how her life essentially changed overnight. "I went from being a little girl playing with her toys to checking my blood sugar ten times a day and taking shots of insulin each time I ate food."

Qadri invited school staff, her classmates, and their families to join her in recognizing World Diabetes Day on November 14, 2023, and asked that anyone able to do so participate in her week-long fundraiser. Qadri was encouraged and supported by School Nurse Mrs. Jan Brennan and fellow T1D advocates, Grade 4 Teacher Mrs. Michelle Wegener, and Grade 3 student Lyla Chavez.

On World Diabetes Day, Qadri delivered a presentation to her entire school through their morning news station. It was broadcast to each classroom via YouTube and for families to follow along at home.

During her presentation, Qadri shared that Type 1 Diabetics need insulin to survive. She also shared that, in some cases, insulin, which is a life-saving medication, can cost \$1,000 or more per vial. This reason led her to get involved with fundraising, as she strives to help those in need care for themselves and afford the necessary medications to stay alive.

At the end of her presentation, Qadri reminded her peers that it's essential for everyone to eat plenty of healthy food and get lots of exercise. She also reminds her peers that it's important to be good to your friends and to help each other. "Everyone has something that makes them unique. Be kind to one another."

Nurse Brennan was overjoyed at the success of the event. "I am so proud of Sabrina for becoming a JDRF Ambassador and sharing her story," she said. "I have been working closely with Sabrina and her parents since she entered Kindergarten. In the early years, I was managing her diabetes throughout the school day. Now, she is almost completely independent in her changing breakthroughs for type diabetes.


February speakers include Scott Hough, Ed Oatman or Amy Wagner, Dr. Yaron Moshel, and Amy Behr-Shields. Please join us. Our programs are free to the public, and we welcome you!

Our speaker on **Tuesday, February 6th** will be Scott Hough, Superintendent of Schools, Summit, NJ. Scott will give us an overview of the school system and describe the impact covid had and how he dealt with it (he was appointed to his position in June 2020!). Scott will also discuss critical issues facing all school administrators, such as bullying, security and student safety. Roughly one half of Summit's annual budget goes to support the public schools, and the appeal of Summit as a great place to live is supported by its excellent schools.

Our speaker on **Tuesday, February 13th** will be either the manager or deputy manager of Union County, NJ. Union County has a diverse population equivalent in size to that of Wyoming and a budget of a half billion dollars. Most people are quite familiar with their own city or town, but usually know much less about their county. Ed Oatman, manager, or Amy Wagner, deputy manager, will hopefully change that for you. County operations include areas such as law enforcement/courts, parks & recreation, public works -roads and infrastructure, health care, economic development, and a lot more.

On **Tuesday, February 20th**, Dr. Yaron Moshel, co-director of the Gerald J. Glasser Brain Tumor Center at Atlantic Health System's Overlook Medical Center, will be our speaker. He is one of a select few surgeons who specialize in removing deep-seated brain tumors using technology that includes computer-guided navigation, awake intraoperative brain mapping, endoscopy, and

microsurgery. Dr. Moshel will explain how the convergence of precision medicine, advanced robotics, and specialized imaging are fostering new breakthroughs in the treatment of brain and spine tumors.

Finally, on **Tuesday, February 27th**, we ask the question, 'with so much information accessible online, is a public library still relevant'? Amy Behr-Shields, the Director of the Summit Free Library, will explain how the library is needed to curate reliable sources of information, and to manage the complexities of digital and non-digital media, while serving as a community center and a welcoming environment. You will also be surprised to learn how many varied programs and services the library offers.

IMAGINE VOLUNTEER FEBRUARY TRAINING

A recent participant in Imagine's last volunteer facilitator training shared this about her experience: "The training was truly amazing and inspiring. I am so honored to have had the opportunity to participate in it." Another shared: "The Imagine Staff are amazing. I so appreciate all the knowledge they shared and the encouragement they gave to me and the other participants."

Participants in Imagine's training programs often describe the experience as "life-changing". In addition to story sharing and the opportunity to support one another, training participants gain knowledge and skills regarding Alan Wolfelt's Companioning Model for grief support that's practiced at Imagine. Participants often walk away with a new understanding of themselves, and a new capacity for supporting the people in their lives. They bring this understanding to their role as facilitators in Imagine's peer support group program where children, youth, young adults and adults come together to share their grief experiences and receive and give support.

Imagine's volunteer facilitators come from all walks of life and no special background is required other than a willingness to listen, a heart inclined to serve, and the ability to be with children and adults in grief without trying to fix, solve or give advice. No prior experience is necessary. Volunteers must be 18 years or older. Bilingual (Spanish speaking) volunteers are needed as well. Volunteers serve as companions and loving listeners for those who are grieving and help create a space where participants can share tears and embrace the joys of life.

If you'd like to join us for Imagine's next facilitator training, it will be held Saturday, Feb. 17th through Monday, February 19th from 9 am-5 pm each day at Imagine's Newark Center at 570 Broad Street in Newark, and we ask that our new volunteers attend the entire training. Our new Newark center is located downtown in the Chase building with parking available directly behind



the building. It's also close to public transportation. We're hoping those completing the training will be able to facilitate groups held every other week at our Newark center. We have so many children and families currently in need of support that we're planning to launch a new Night of Support in Newark. We're also looking for a few new facilitators for our Mountainside location.

PRESERVATION PLAN ADOPTED BY WARREN HISTORIC SITES COMMITTEE

The Warren Historic Sites Committee has adopted a Historic Preservation Plan for the Township. The purpose of the Plan is to foster pride in the community, help maintain historic resources and contribute to rational discussions about growth.

This is the first time a Preservation Plan has been prepared for the Township. The Committee members have been concerned about the loss of historic properties during the past few years, especially the demolition of the King George Inn, and hope that the adoption of a Preservation Plan will bring attention to Warren's rich and storied past as well as protect its historic buildings and resources.

John Lindner, Chairman of the Committee and Township Planning Board Member, noted that "The Preservation Plan and related Historic Inventory is a great milestone for the Historic Sites Committee and our community. Warren's history is now better preserved for future generations."

Warren Township has numerous historic sites and structures located throughout the municipality. The Committee completed a thorough and comprehensive analysis of historic sites that have previously been identified by various government entities. Numerous factors



and previous governmental designations were considered before finalizing a list of 192 Historic Resources that are an essential part of the Preservation Plan. The Historic Inventory includes sites which are listed on the State and National registers, sites which are now or potentially eligible for designation, and those deemed to be historically significant.

The Plan outlines various Goals and Strategies that should be considered to better recognize and protect the Township's historic resources. Present-day Warren evolved out of a collection of historic hamlets or neighborhoods, i.e. – "Union Village & Mt. Bethel", that still exists today. One goal of the Plan is to consider the establishment of Historic Districts for these areas. The Township's Preservation Plan is consistent

with the goals and objectives set forth in the Somerset County Preservation Plan that was adopted in 2022.

Alan Siegel, President of the Warren Township Historical Society, stated "As a town settled nearly 300 years ago, Warren ought to make every effort to preserve the historic structures, neighborhoods and environments which give our community much of its physical appeal and special character. The Preservation Plan will go a long way toward achieving that end."

The Historic Sites Committee feels that with the coming 250th Anniversary of the founding of our country, it is a fitting time to recognize the many historic resources of the Township. It is also hoped that the Preservation Plan can be adopted as a Historic Element of the Township's Master Plan.

"HOFHEIMER: THE FAMILY AND ITS LEGACY

"Hofheimer: The Family and Its Legacy," a 46-page illustrated booklet that tells the fascinating history of the Nathan Hofheimer family and its impact on Warren Township, is the newest publication of the Warren Township Historic Sites Committee.

"Although no member has lived in Warren for nearly seven decades, the influence of the Hofheimer family on the township has been profound," writes author Alan A. Siegel in his introduction.

Researched and written by Siegel, president of the Warren Township Historical Society, and designed by Historic Sites member Karl Horster, the booklet opens with the first ever detailed biography of Nathan Hofheimer, who immigrated from Germany as a teenager in 1866, made his fortune in the whiskey business and became one of the early investors in what would become the General Motors Company. When the family patriarch died in 1921, he was reported to be worth \$450 million.

Beginning in 1911, the year Nathan's son Arthur bought a parcel of land on the corner of Warrenville and Washington Valley roads, family members acquired over 300 acres of farmland at the center of Warrenville. Here, over the following decade, the Hofheimers built their summer retreat, complete with four mansions, a golf course, horse stables, swimming pools, a family mausoleum and an imitation European-style grotto on the Middle Brook at what had once been the site of a copper mine.

The booklet's author has written extensively about Warren's history. Among Siegel's ten published books are Warren A to Z: An Entertaining Guidebook to the 275 Year History of Warren Township and Images of America: Warren Township. Siegel's booklets on the Kirch-Ford-Terrill House and the Mount Bethel Baptist Meeting House were also published by the township's Historic Sites Committee.
