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SUMMIT EMS RESPONSES – JANUARY 2024

After answering 2,379 calls in 2023, Summit's responses included 78 to a patient's home or EMS volunteers began the new year by responding to 210 emergency calls in January. emergencies on streets or highways; one in a

Responses included 122 medical emergencies; 27 falls; 19 motor vehicle accidents, including 4 on routes 24 or 78; 21 traumatic injuries; four allergic reactions; 12 cases of overdose or poisoning; three responses to a medical alarm; two pedestrians struck by a vehicle, and three responses to fire scenes. Squad Volunteers also provided four "lift assists" to patients who did not require transport to a hospital.

Seven emergency calls were answered by an off-duty "back-up crew" of volunteers responding from home or work when the on-duty crew was busy. Summit volunteers also provided mutual aid assistance to neighboring towns nine times. 12 patients transported to a hospital by Squad members also received advanced life support care from hospital-based paramedics who accompanied the Squad's ambulance. During January, Squad volunteers transported 156 patients to three different hospitals.

Squad mutual aid responses included the January 5 major warehouse fire in Elizabeth where a crew was on scene for 8 hours. On 2 occasions during the month, all 3 Summit ambulances were responding to simultaneous calls. The Squad also provided 2 non emergency ambulance transports for Summit residents and hosted 3 public CPR classes.

The Squad answers calls for help 24 hours a day and at a variety of locations. January

responses included 78 to a patient's home or apartment; 24 for accidents or medical emergencies on streets or highways; one in a public park; five in public buildings; 15 at a local business; eight at a bar or restaurant, and 10 to a health care professional's office. There were also 20 medical incidents at Summit's train station; 13 at a local behavioral health facility; three on the grounds of Overlook Medical Center; 13 to an assisted living facility, two in a house of worship; 15 on a sidewalk; five in a parking lot; one at Summit's Public Library; and two at a school.

The all-volunteer First Aid Squad, responds to emergency calls 24/7, is entirely funded through private donations and does not bill for service. The Squad is always looking for new volunteers to join its ranks. All needed training, uniforms and equipment is provided. 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THE DOMINICAN NUNS CLOISTER SHOPPE

For Westfielder Pat Colbert, volunteering at the Monastery of Our Lady of the Rosary in Summit "brings me peace no matter how my day is going."

She began volunteering at the Cloister Shoppe more than four years ago after another Westfield resident, Marge Roeck, told her about it.

The well-stocked gift shop is operated by the Dominican nuns who reside on the Rosary Shrine grounds that include a large chapel that is open to the public. Several years ago, the cloistered nuns began making a number of products to sell, including candles, soaps, face and foot crème, etc. Those items are available, along with a host of religious goods, at the gift shop and online at cloistershoppe.com. Proceeds provide funds needed to support the 20 nuns who live at the monastery.

Many people come to the shop to secure perpetual enrollments that provide prayers for individuals.

"These are beautiful cards that people usually buy to give to families of recently deceased individuals or for any living person who might need prayers," says Tina Lesher, of Westfield, who along with her husband, John, volunteers at the shop. "We print out these lovely enrollments and include a special holy card."

Morris Township resident Kathy Sette has been a dedicated volunteer for 20 years.

"We're more blessed being here," says Sette. "There's just a feeling about it."

Her feelings are echoed by decades-long volunteer Dorothy Shanahan of Summit.

Many of the volunteers are members of the Rosary Guild, an auxiliary that assists the nuns in such undertakings as raising funds, driving the nuns to appointments, shopping with the sisters, etc. The current president is Joan Brinkerhoff of Summit. She argues that working in the shop "can give me and all the volunteers an Evangelizing ministry---a time to care for others emotionally in a loving, Christian way. We reach out to our shoppers to help them find a special gift for a new grandchild, a sick friend or help them with a loss of a friend, child, parent or even a life-altering illness...we are the lay hands and voices of the nuns."


"Curiosity led me as a young woman to also answer calls coming into the Rosary Shrine and relay the messages to the nuns.

"Many of the callers are seeking the nuns" prayers for a variety of reasons, often because of illness or loneliness or depression. As I listen to the pleas, I feel so lucky," says Tina Lesher.

The Summit monastery was founded in 1919 when a group of sisters from a Union City monastery moved to the current site. As contemplatives, the nuns use prayer and penance to spread the Kingdom of God. The average age of the current 20 sisters in Summit is in the 50s.

The monastery chapel houses the only copy of the Shroud of Turin. The 400-year-old shroud copy can be viewed during the open chapel hours from 6 a.m. to 7 p.m. daily. Mass for the public is celebrated daily at 7:30 a.m and Sundays at 8 a.m. The Cloister Shoppe is open Mondays through Saturdays from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

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THE OLD GUARD MARCH SPEAKERS PROGRAM

The Summit Area Old Guard is a social, educational, and recreational organization that serves men of retirement age. We meet most Tuesdays at the New Providence Presbyterian Church located at 1307 Springfield Ave. Our dues are minimal, and members manage all aspects of the operation. Our motto is "Come for the Programs. Stay for the Friends." The organization was founded in 1930.

March speakers include Gregory J. Kaczorowski, PhD., Jessica Arkel, Dr. Dennis Liotta, and Dr. Lenny McDonald. Please join us. Our programs are free to the public, and we welcome you!

Our speaker on Tuesday, March 5th will be Dr. Greg Kaczorowski (ex-Merck) discussing the importance of ion channels vis-a-vis our health. Ion channels are a large family of membrane proteins that are present in all cells of the body. These proteins span the plasma lipid bilayer membrane and contain an internal pore structure which can be opened/closed by various stimuli to allow the gated passage of ions (e.g., sodium, potassium, calcium, or chloride ions) into or out of a cell. Nature has used this rather simple mechanism to modulate all major biological activities, both somatic responses like voluntary muscle movement and autonomic actions like cardiac and respiratory activities. Because of their fundamental importance in systems biology, Greg will discuss how ion channels can be modulated for therapeutic benefit or be targeted to kill an organism.

Our speaker on March 12th will be Jessica Arkel, the development officer at Children's Specialized Hospital Foundation. She will discuss the history of Children's Specialized Hospital in New Jersey from its early days in 1891 in Westfield to becoming a preeminent provider of pediatric rehabilitation with 15 facilities across New Jersey serving more than 35,000 children annually who are living with a variety of complex pediatric medical conditions—from chronic illnesses and complex physical disabilities like brain and spinal cord injuries—to a full scope of developmental,

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Our speaker on March 19th will be Prof. Dennis Liotta. Prof, Liotta has led a group of synthetic/medicinal chemists at Emory University for over four decades. He will provide an overview of his research in the antiviral arena, featuring stories of three highly successful antivirals he developed in collaboration with his academic colleagues and biotech partners. Dr. Liotta has contributed to 18 FDA-approved therapies, with perhaps his biggest impact coming in the HIV/AIDS field. He will also highlight recent drug discovery endeavors in various therapeutic areas, including oncology and neurological diseases.

Finally, on March 26th, our speaker will be Dr. Lenny McDonald discussing the importance of

experimentation and creativity in photography and sharing his journey from science (exWyeth/Pfizer) to his present avocation. Macro and close-up photography are his favorite styles, and he will discuss the impact of exploiting minute details. He will also show some of his non-macro abstract work. Lastly, he will briefly share his perspective on AI in photography and how it fits into his workflow. Lenny has exhibited his work in various venues across New Jersey, including Reeves-Reed Arboretum, Mayo Performing Arts Center, and the Trenton City Museum at Ellarslie Mansion. 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
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DONOVAN TUNG NAMED OUTSTANDING SQUADRON CADET OF THE YEAR

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

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PASSAIC COUNTY CASA EXPANDS TO UNION COUNTY

Passaic County Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA), a leading child advocacy organization focused on protecting the best interests of abused and neglected youth, has announced the expansion of its service footprint to include Union County. With this expansion, critical volunteer advocacy for child victims removed from home and living under the jurisdiction of the family court will be made available to even more of New Jersey's most vulnerable children. This expansion allows for greater community impact, efficiency in operations, and greater long-term sustainability.

CASA recruits, screens, trains, and supervises community volunteers to advocate for local abused, neglected, and abandoned youth from birth to age 21 involved in the child welfare system through no fault of their own.

Executive Director Erica Fischer-Kaslander, who continues to lead the expanded advocacy organization, said, "There's no doubt this expansion will reap even greater rewards for Union County's vulnerable youth. The synergy created from two experienced programs allows far greater community impact and enhances its agility to withstand today's shifting landscape as a strengthened, multi-county program." Acknowledging the nearly two-decade impact of the previous Union County CASA organization, Fischer-Kaslander adds, "The dedicated advocates in Union County remain focused on

fulfilling CASA's mission: quality advocacy, in child welfare. All prospective volunteers continuity of presence, and increased access to services for local vulnerable vouth-victims. As a combined force, we will build on that good work. I remain grateful to all professionals involved in these cases for their support – judges, attorneys, caseworkers, and more - and look forward to the collaboration required for us all to do our best for the children depending on us."

Gretchen Boger-O'Bryan, Content Director for CASA of Passaic and Union Counties, added, "In my 11 years working with CASA in Union County, I have seen the organization pivot to meet unforeseen needs, adapt to changing trends, and persevere through recent challenges faced by all nonprofits, including a global health pandemic. Ultimately, the expansion of Passaic County CASA to include Union County breeds a strengthened organization that bolsters CASA's impact throughout the county. For our local youth, that's what matters."

Considered extra "eyes and ears" for judges hearing abuse and neglect cases, CASA volunteers are assigned to a youth or sibling set by court order, granting access to all parties in the youth's life. Advocates use unbiased observations to make fact-based recommendations to judges deciding the future of each youth. Often, CASA volunteers are the only long-term, caring, and informed adult in the corner of a youth awaiting a safe, stable, and permanent placement.

Volunteer advocates need no prior experience

complete a 36-hour training course, extensive application, and screening process in addition to background checks. Volunteers with the newly expanded CASA of Passaic and Union Counties program are supported by a 26-person professional staff with extensive experience in child welfare. 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ADDRESSING RECENT INCREASE IN HOME BURGLARIES

Dear Summit Residents,

I am writing to you today to address a critical concern within our community: the recent increase in home burglaries. This trend is not only alarming but also a disruption to the sense of security we value in Summit.

The Summit Police Department is taking these incidents very seriously and responding proactively to them. We have already increased our strategic patrols in key areas and are

constantly analyzing regional and local patterns and trends to prevent future occurrences. Additionally, we are implementing advanced technology such as surveillance at our borders and license plate readers to identify potential perpetrators in stolen vehicles that will ultimately aid in their swift capture.

As we recognize that this issue extends beyond our city limits, collaborating with neighboring towns that are experiencing similar challenges is another key strategy. By sharing intelligence and resources, including participating in the Union County Prosecutor's Office Municipal Task Force initiative, we aim to create a broader network of deterrence and detection, making it harder for criminals to operate across town lines.

To further strengthen our efforts, we seek your active participation. Here are some specific recommendations for residents to enhance the security of their properties:

Upgrade Locks and Security Systems: Invest in high-quality locks for doors and windows. Consider installing a reputable home security system, ideally doorbell and driveway cameras, and remote monitoring capabilities.

Lighting and Visibility: Ensure that your property is well lit. Motion-sensor lights can be an effective deterrent especially in the driveway and rear of the home. Keep shrubs and trees trimmed to avoid potential hiding spots for burglars.

Secure Valuables: Keep valuables in a safe. Avoid leaving spare keys outside your home.

Community Vigilance: Be aware of and report

any suspicious activities in your neighborhood. Share contact information with neighbors on your block. If possible, discuss routines and upcoming schedules, so unusual activities can be spotted more easily.

Sign up for alert notifications: There are several options to receive alerts and advisory information from Summit Police that include Everbridge Nixle, Smart911 and website notifications. Please consider signing up for all three services to stay safe and informed.

Beginning on March 1, 2024, Summit Police Department will offer free home security assessments. Members of our team are participating in training to enable them to provide property owners with professional, targeted recommendations on safeguarding against burglaries. More information on this program and a home safety assessment checklist can be found on the city website prior to March 1.




