Braving the frigid temperatures wasn't on the agenda for Grover Cleveland Elementary School students, but thanks to the NJ State Police Marine Service Bureau, they got a firsthand lesson in ice safety that was both informative and engaging.

Marine Service Bureau officers, Trooper Nigel Ferrreira and Trooper Kenneth Bayer well-versed in the dangers of icy waters, brought their expertise to Grover Cleveland. Through interactive presentations and demonstrations, they enlightened students about the importance of ice safety during the colder months.

The program wasn't just talk! Students participated in a simulated ice rescue, putting their newfound knowledge into action. This hands-on experience allowed them to understand the proper procedures for staying safe on frozen surfaces and what to do if they

witness someone in trouble.

Troopers showcased the specialized equipment they use for ice rescues, including ice picks, throw ropes, and flotation devices. Students got a close look at these tools and learned about their vital role in keeping people safe.

Principal Mr. Giambrone of Grover Cleveland Elementary echoed this sentiment. "This program was an invaluable experience for our students. It equipped them with the knowledge and skills they need to stay safe around frozen water."

The NJ State Police Marine Service Bureau's visit to Grover Cleveland Elementary School served as a crucial reminder of the importance of ice safety. By combining education with interactive activities, the program empowered students to make informed decisions and potentially save lives.

VOLUNTEERS NEEDED TO ADVOCATE FOR CHILDREN IN FOSTER CARE

Five-year-old Jennifer is diagnosed with autism and almost completely nonverbal. Due to excessive violence in the family home, a concerned neighbor called for help and, after investigation, Jennifer was placed in foster care. The two phrases Jennifer can say graphically depict violence witnessed at home and confirm trauma she's endured. Since entering care and being enrolled in school, it's evident Jennifer has also experienced educational neglect. At age three, she was entitled to an Individualized Education Plan from the Department of Education to provide such intervention services as in-home speech and behavioral therapies, both helpful for future enrollment in a half-day educational program. Unfortunately, Jennifer's parents neglected to utilize these services and she is now more than two years behind her peers.

Jennifer is just one of the more than 500 children removed from home in Passaic and Union counties each year due to abuse and neglect. These children are separated from all they've ever known: parents, siblings, friends, teachers, and their belongings. For Jennifer, the road ahead is long, and she needs a caring, consistent adult in her corner to protect her best interests. That's where Court Appointed Special Advocate (CASA) volunteers come in.

A CASA volunteer is trained on the ins and outs of advocating for child-victims and fully supported by CASA staff for the duration of the case. No special background in child welfare is necessary; successful CASA volunteers are dedicated community members with varied life experiences who believe abuse and neglect are non-negotiable. CASA volunteers visit the children, make unbiased observations, interview others in the child's life, and make


BAYWAY COMPLEX COMMUNITY ADVISORY PANEL

St. Joseph Social Service Center

The St. Joseph's community, encompassing residents from Elizabeth and volunteers and supporters from five counties in New Jersey, came together on February 24, 2024, to celebrate the opening of two new buildings on its campus. The new food pantry building is already in use, and the second building will ultimately be used for clothing distribution.

The cold weather was no match for the warm spirit of compassion and caring that animated the event and has guided the agency for the past 38 years. All in attendance toured the new buildings and participated in a moving dedication ceremony that concluded with an uplifting blessing offered by Father Anthony Randazzo of Holy Trinity Roman Catholic Church in Westfield.

The two new buildings represent the first phase of an ambitious capital improvement plan to improve and expand services to families and children in need in Elizabeth and to fulfill St. Joseph's vision to serve those experiencing homelessness and poverty with dignity. The new food pantry building will allow St. Joseph's to offer a better food pantry model - an individual choice food pantry. With this model, clients will come at an appointed time and will be able to choose their food based on their personal and cultural preferences. The new clothing building will be used as temporary program space during the next wave of renovations and ultimately will be used to offer clothing and home goods in a more dignified environment.

"Dignity has been a core value of the agency since our founding in 1986," noted Bernadette Murphy, Executive Director. "Our goal is to help people acquire the material items they need to live with dignity. We believe that it is vital for our clients to receive food, clothing, supplies and support services in an environment that fosters dignity, where individuals experiencing poverty and homelessness are truly welcomed as sisters and brothers."

Daisy Trocan, a member of the Board of Trustees, spoke at the dedication event about what these new buildings will mean to Elizabeth residents. As a child her family relied on support from the agency during difficult times. "The love and support my family received from St. Joseph's meant so much to us," Trocan reflected.

Harold "Kess" Kessler, who has overseen the capital improvement plan from its inception several years ago, remarked that work has already begun on the second phase of the construction plan. Over the next year, the main hall on campus will be transformed into a multipurpose space with private offices for mental health counseling and case management services, new facilities for the soup kitchen program, spaces for the Adult Learning Center and health and nutrition workshops and diagnostic testing, and a reception area where residents can obtain information about agency programs and community services. Karen Maher, President of the Board of Trustees, noted that these new spaces will "allow the agency to expand services to the community, particularly in the areas of physical and behavioral health."

Six days a week a dedicated team of 6,000 volunteers from Elizabeth, Union, Westfield, Cranford, Mountainside, and dozens of other communities, make sandwiches for the hungry in their kitchens, bring food, clothing and home goods, serve meals at the soup kitchen and help with the operations of the agency. St. Joseph's serves over 3.500 individuals annually. The organization helps Elizabeth residents access food, medicine, mental health counseling, adult education, clothing and a myriad of additional healthcare and support services.

DIVINE MERCY (FORMER ST. MARY'S) CELEBRATES 170TH ANNIVERSARY

The history of St. Mary's Roman Catholic Church dates back to 1845 when Father Isaac Howell, pastor of St. Mary's Church of Elizabeth, chose Rahway as the site of one of his first mission churches. At that early time, Father Howell's parish extended from Elizabeth all the way to New Brunswick. The Rahway mission grew steadily and in 1853, Father Thomas Quinn, who would serve the congregation over the next 19 years, was appointed the first resident pastor. A year later, in 1854, the first church, rectory, and school were built under his leadership, and property was also purchased at the west end of Rahway for a parish cemetery.


In 1880, Father Edward McCosker was named pastor. It was under his direction that the present imposing brick church and rectory were constructed in 1882. The original church was moved to the rear of the new church and converted into a hall for meetings and social affairs. The hall would serve the community as a make-shift hospital annex for patients affected by the horrific 1918 influenza epidemic.

During the tenure of Father George F. Brown (1905-1910), the church was renovated, and a two-story brick schoolhouse was built behind the rectory which is still in use. The old school was converted into a convent for the Sisters of the Dominican Order. Over the first half century, St. Mary's Parish had taken its place among the leading parishes of the Diocese and had become an active and important congregation in the city.

In 1917, Father Cornelius Kane, who was to serve the Church during a period of great growth and activity, became pastor. Shortly after his arrival, a new auditorium was built to replace the old hall. In 1923, a large estate on Esterbrook Avenue was purchased and remodeled as a convent. Foreseeing the need for a larger school in the aftermath of World War I, a new fourteen room school was erected next to the church on Central Avenue. In 1941, in recognition of the many accomplishments of Father Kane, His Holiness Pope Pius the 12th elevated him to the rank of Domestic Prelate with the title of Right Reverend Monsignor. After thirty years of untiring service to his Church, his people, and his community, Msgr. Kane passed in 1947.

The congregation continued to grow into the 1950s as the church approached its 100th Anniversary. In 1953, Father John P. Sullivan was installed and led a campaign to completely renovate the church and the rectory. The school age population after World War II grew beyond the capacity of the school forcing some grades to move into rooms on the third floor of the Campbell Street City Hall. Membership in the congregation also grew, and it became necessary to call additional assistant pastors to help with the increased spiritual work of the church. In 1954, Rev. Harold Hermanns, who became a highly respected figure throughout the city, joined the staff.

The period from 1955 to 1971 marked the tenure of Father Joseph Murphy, a leader with a great interest in athletics and the youth of the parish. Under his leadership, a modern classroom

building for 7th and 8th grade students was added to the old brick school behind the rectory in 1957. The new gymnasium was built in 1964 to provide modern facilities for the church's expanding athletic program. Many parishioners remember assistant pastor Rev. Edward Myers who began his service in 1968.

Msgr. Anthony Connell succeeded Father Murphy after his sudden passing. The new pastor organized a successful campaign, which led to the continuation of improvements. The sanctuary was air conditioned, the parking area was expanded and the hall under the gym was modernized to provide rooms for classes and meetings. The hall was named Connell Hall in his honor.

Father Joseph Quinlan arrived in 1977 and completely renovated the church while maintaining its original beauty. Work was also done on the rectory and school. It was during Father Quinlan's pastorate that the first bilingual masses and ministry to the Hispanic population began.

Further strides were made in an effort to include the Hispanic community during the tenure of Father Michael J. Feketie (1989 to 2005) who was proficient in Spanish. Presently, of the four Sunday masses, one is given entirely in Spanish as the church continues to be responsive to the diversity of its members.

In 2009, Father Dennis Kaelin was installed as pastor of both St. Mary's and St. Mark's to work with the congregations of both churches during the merger that would form Divine Mercy.

The roots of St. Mark's Parish date back to 1870 when it was established to serve the



German-American families of Rahway and the surrounding towns. Within a year, property was purchased on Hamilton Street and a sanctuary erected. From the time of its founding until 1941, 18 pastors would come to St. Mark's, most serving fewer than three years. October 23, 1941 was a red letter day for the church when Father Charles Buttner was installed. He would remain for the next 37 years and become one of the most fondly remembered pastors. Former congregants also remember the good works of his successor, Father Thaddeus F. Zuber, who served for 16 years (1979-1995).

The current administrator of Divine Mercy, Father Alexander Cruz, was installed in 2018. Under his leadership, many improvements were done to the campus, all made possible by the generosity of the parishioners. During the Covid-19 pandemic, virtual online Masses were instituted to keep congregants connected to their faith as everyone struggled through the grim period. Permanent live-streaming equipment was eventually installed to enable the homebound to experience worship services.

The church's outreach programs touch those in need in the community and across the world. Every Sunday, food is distributed to individuals and families who are experiencing difficult times. In September, school supplies are donated to students, and during the Christmas season, gifts are collected and distributed to children in need. The church helps new mothers and mothers-to-be by assisting the Lifenet Baby Bottle Campaign and the Raphael House. Donations are also made to the Christian Relief Society to help the worldwide community.

As Divine Mercy celebrates its 170th Anniversary in 2024, the church remains a dynamic, diverse, and vibrant community encouraging deep spiritual commitments to the Catholic faith.



NORTHERN MOCKINGBIRDS (PART 2) BREEDING & TEACHING THEIR YOUNG

In January, 2024 I wrote an article about Northern Mockingbirds. This is a follow up to that article, how mockingbirds mate and teach their young.

Mockingbirds are usually monogamous during the mating season. However, occasionally a male will mate with more than one female. Male and female breeding pairs stay together for the whole breeding season, and sometimes for many years.

Northern mockingbirds breed in spring and early summer. A male chooses a territory and builds a few foundations for nests in the area. Then he tries to attract a female, hoping she will choose a suitable nest and mate with him.

There are three courtship displays that males use to attract female. The male may chase the female through the territory while singing, or her may run around on branches, showing the female where a nest could be built. Males also perform a "flight display". In the "flight display", males sing while flying a few meters into the air and then falling slowly back down. This display shows off his white wing patches to the female.

After a successful courtship the female builds the interior of the nest and lays her eggs. Their nests are cup-shaped and are made of twigs, cotton, dry leaves, stems, paper, grass and other organic material. The nests are built in shrubs and trees up to 50 feet above the ground.

The female lays two to six eggs (average 4 eggs). The eggs are about 24 mm long and 18 mm wide. They are blue or greenish with brown or reddish spots. Only the female mockingbirds incubate the eggs, while the male guards the nest and feeds his mate. The eggs hatch after 11 to 14 days. The chicks are helpless when they hatch. However, both parents feed their clutch so the young they grow quickly. They young leave the nest after 10 to 12 days. At this time the female leaves the young in the care of the male and begins construction on the new nest for their next brood.

This is the most dangerous time in a mockingbird's life. Unable to fly, they are

vulnerable prey for cats and other predators. Totally dependent on the male for the next two weeks the fledglings (a young bird that has just left the nest) live on the ground and hide in shrubbery. The father is diligent in his duties, remaining close and always ready to feed or fiercely protect his young. During this time he teaches them important life skills, most importantly how to fly. The fledglings become independent from their parents when they are 10 to 15 days old.

Now the male and female join together and begin the process over again. Northern mockingbirds can raise 2 to 4 broods each year. Young mockingbirds can begin mating when they are one year old.


