Six days a week a dedicated team of 6,000 volunteers from Elizabeth, Union, Westfield, Cranford, Mountainside, and dozens of other communities, make sandwiches for the hungry in their kitchens, bring food, clothing and home goods, serve meals at the soup kitchen and help with the operations of the agency. St. Joseph's serves over 3.500 individuals annually. The organization helps Elizabeth residents access food, medicine, mental health counseling, adult education, clothing and a myriad of additional healthcare and support services.

With this model, clients will come at an appointed time and will be able to choose their food based on their personal and cultural preferences. The new clothing building will be used as temporary program space during the next wave of renovations and ultimately will be used to offer clothing and home goods in a more

"Dignity has been a core value of the agency since our founding in 1986," noted Bernadette Murphy, Executive Director. "Our goal is to help people acquire the material items they need to live with dignity. We believe that it is vital for our clients to receive food, clothing, supplies and support services in an environment that fosters dignity, where individuals experiencing poverty and homelessness are truly welcomed as sisters and brothers."

Daisy Trocan, a member of the Board of Trustees, spoke at the dedication event about what these new buildings will mean to Elizabeth residents. As a child her family relied on support from the agency during difficult times. "The love and support my family received from St. Joseph's meant so much to us," Trocan reflected.

Harold "Kess" Kessler, who has overseen the capital improvement plan from its inception several years ago, remarked that work has already begun on the second phase of the construction plan. Over the next year, the main hall on campus will be transformed into a multipurpose space with private offices for mental health counseling and case management services, new facilities for the soup kitchen program, spaces for the Adult Learning Center and health and nutrition workshops and diagnostic testing, and a reception area where residents can obtain information about agency programs and community services. Karen Maher, President of the Board of Trustees, noted that these new spaces will "allow the agency to expand


NATIONAL SPECIAL NEEDS REGISTRY

Town of Westfield

The Westfield Police Department is proud to partner with the Union County Prosecutor's Office to participate in the National Special Needs Registry, a comprehensive resource available to support all law enforcement agencies in Union County. This program aims to enhance communication and understanding between law enforcement officers and individuals with disabilities and special health needs, including those with autism spectrum disorder, Down syndrome, intellectual and developmental disabilities, mental health conditions, deafness and hearing loss, blindness and vision loss, physical disabilities, Alzheimer's disease, and dementia.

The registry allows individuals or an authorized family member or caregiver to voluntarily register, providing details such as name, contact information, nature of the person's needs, communication preferences, triggers or potential challenges during interactions with law enforcement, and emergency contact information. This information is securely stored and accessible only to authorized law enforcement personnel when responding to a call for service involving a registered individual.



Westfield Historic The Preservation Commission will present a special program titled "Suburban Modern:" Homes of the Early 20th Century, on Thursday, April 18, at 7:30 pm in the Community Room, 425 E. Broad St. in Westfield, NJ. Presented by Janet W. Foster, an authority on New Jersey historic architecture, the illustrated talk will discuss how these homes

were built, what physical and social attributes She is a graduate of the Columbia University they shared, and how they continue to create pleasant, livable neighborhoods. The program is free and open to the public.

the first third of the 20th century created a housing boom that remains evident in many of its historic neighborhoods. Hundreds of homes ranging in size from cottages to mansions -including Foursquares, Capes, Craftsman bungalows, and popular revival styles such as Tudor, Dutch Colonial, and Spanish Mission -were built between 1900 and 1930. This housing stock was "modern" in every sense of the word, from the exterior design to the interior amenities, including bathrooms, kitchen, heating system, and often a garage to meet the latest requirements of a middle-class homeowner.

Janet W. Foster is an architectural historian and historic preservation consultant with over 30 years of experience with New Jersey's buildings.

Historic Preservation Program, where she currently serves as adjunct professor. She is the author of numerous articles and books, including Westfield's tremendous population growth in Building By the Book: Pattern-book Architecture in New Jersey (1992, Rutgers University Press), the definitive history of NJ's early 20th century plan book and kit homes. A resident of Madison, Ms. Foster serves on the New Jersey State Review Board for Historic Site and the New Jersey Historic Trust.

> Recognizing the cultural significance of Westfield's rich historic and architectural heritage, the Historic Preservation Commission was established by municipal ordinance in 1984. The HPC is charged with preserving historical sites and structures while fostering an appreciation for these landmarks as an essential element of the town's unique character. 

VOLUNTEERS NEEDED TO ADVOCATE FOR UNION COUNTY CHILDREN IN FOSTER CARE

Five-year-old Jennifer is diagnosed with autism and almost completely nonverbal. Due to excessive violence in the family home, a concerned neighbor called for help and, after investigation, Jennifer was placed in foster care. The two phrases Jennifer can say graphically depict violence witnessed at home and confirm trauma she's endured. Since entering care and being enrolled in school, it's evident Jennifer has also experienced educational neglect. At age three, she was entitled to an Individualized Education Plan from the Department of Education to provide such intervention services as in-home speech and behavioral therapies, both helpful for future enrollment in a half-day educational program. Unfortunately, Jennifer's parents neglected to utilize these services and she is now more than two years behind her peers.

Jennifer is just one of the more than 500 children removed from home in Passaic and Union counties each year due to abuse and neglect. These children are separated from all they've ever known: parents, siblings, friends, teachers, and their belongings. For Jennifer, the road ahead is long, and she needs a caring, consistent adult in her corner to protect her best interests while in foster care. That's where Court Appointed Special Advocate (CASA) volunteers come in.

A CASA volunteer is trained on the ins and outs of advocating for child-victims and fully supported by CASA staff for the duration of the case. No special background in child welfare is necessary; successful CASA volunteers are dedicated community members with varied life experiences who believe abuse and neglect are non-negotiable. CASA volunteers visit the children, make unbiased observations, interview others in the child's life, and make recommendations to the judge. They often are the only consistent adult in the life of a child involved in the child welfare system, as caseworkers, professionals, and even placements

can be ever-changing. A CASA volunteer provides continuity during a time of chaos and unknowns.

Assigned by a court order that grants access to the child and all those in their lives, the CASA volunteer gathers information and makes informed recommendations to the judge deciding the child's future. Often, the CASA volunteer is the only consistent person in the child's life. ROTARY HEARS ABOUT PLANS FOR LIBRARY

Library Director Allen McGinley spoke to the Rotary Club about the future plans of the Westfield Memorial Library during a club meeting held on January 16, 2024. Mr. McGinley commented that use of the library has significantly increased over the past year, with more books being borrowed, more electronic books downloaded, increase of the WIFI use at the library, and increased use of the reference library resources.

The library recently joined a consortium of 40 libraries to increase the ability to share books and materials. This also allows Westfield residents to go directly to other libraries such as the Cranford or Scotch Plains/Fanwood libraries and peruse their collections. Middlesex County College is part of the consortium. Mr. McGinley commented that sharing services is beneficial to Westfield residents and is the latest trend in local Governments.

The library upgraded its bandwidth to 1 Gig for better technology use. Many students and researchers bring their own laptops to the library.

During the pandemic, it was noted that people liked using outdoor spaces, so the library created a small patio outside for patrons' use. The patio includes WIFI and electrical outlets for charging devices.

The library has created a seed library, which will be of special interest to gardeners.

An important facility upgrade will be to convert the scanning of library books at checkout to Radio Frequency ID. This will increase ease and speed of checking out. Also, there will be an outdoor 24 hour pickup locker planned for times the library is not open. The Library is currently open Monday through Friday 9:30 a.m. to 8:30 p.m., Saturday, 9:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. and Sunday 1 p.m. to 5 p.m.

Mr. McGinley is looking into additional locations for pickup lockers, such as the train station or the police station, to make it easier to access library materials.

The library received a grant of \$200,000 from the Women's Club of Westfield to purchase an electric vehicle to serve as a book mobile in order to bring materials to schools. It can also be used to provide power or WIFI remotely in emergencies.

The study carols are usually full with high school students and researchers, so they plan to increase their number.

The Local History Room is being converted into a conference room which would be available for rent to local organizations. The demand for the main conference room is at maximum, so a second room would be put to good use.

The summer reading program is very popular with children and parents.

The Rotary Club has supported the Westfield Library with grants over the years. The Rotary Club is holding their annual fundraiser for scholarships and grants called Breakfast with the Bands. Tickets are \$10 at the door. The event will be on Saturday, March 2nd from 9 a.m. to noon, at the Westfield High School cafeteria.

The Rotary Club of Westfield Foundation gave \$117,000 in college scholarships and \$29,978 in community grants, last year, in 2023. Recently, the Women's Club of Westfield closed, but turned their assets over to the Rotary Club Foundation to continue their legacy, which will add another \$30,000 in annual scholarships for women students, and \$9,500 in community grants. Since 1967, Westfield Rotary has awarded \$3.5 million of scholarships to 1800 students, and approximately \$875,000 in community grants. Scholarship applications for Westfield students are accepted through the Westfield High School guidance department.

The Rotary Club of Westfield meets the first three Tuesdays of each month for lunch at noon, at Limani Seafood Grill on North Ave. Guests are always welcome. "It was a revelation returning to quilting given all the advancements in technology, dyes, digital printing along with the new availability of international fabrics," Lee said.


