## **JLS LAUNCHES 100K DIAPER PROJECT**

The Junior League of Summit (JLS) is proud to announce that it is embarking on an ambitious project to collect 100,000 diapers by the end of May. One hundred percent of all diapers collected through the 100K DIAPER PROJECT will be donated to Moms Helping Moms, a NJ-based organization dedicated to addressing the critical issue of diaper need in New Jersey communities.

Now through May 31, 2024, the JLS will be partnering with various community organizations to host a series of diaper drives in our communities. To date, The Gingham Giraffe School (Chatham), Accenture (Florham Park), Swimquest (Millburn), Washington School (Summit), Lifetime (Berkeley Heights), Congregation Beth Hatikvah (Summit), Stanley Preschool (Chatham), Zadie's Nurturing Den (Summit), JUMP Immersion School (Summit), and Chatham Middle School (Chatham) have committed to hosting drives.

Individuals who wish to contribute to the 100K DIAPER PROJECT can do so by donating diapers through the League's Amazon Wishlist. Diaper need affects a staggering 1 in 2 families across the United States. New Jersey is no exception. Last year, Moms Helping Moms distributed over 1.3 million diapers, which according to the organization is just scratching the surface of the current diaper need in New Jersey.

The shortage of diapers not only impacts the health and well-being of children but can also result in missed work or school due to parents' inability to provide the required diapers to their daycares. Diapers are not recognized as a basic need by government programs and cannot be purchased with food stamps, further exacerbating the challenge for families in need.

## **SPRING HAS SPRUNG, AND SO HAVE THE LEAF BLOWERS!**

Monday, May 27, 2024, a ceremony will be held at 8 a.m. in front of the Library and War Memorials on Main Street (or in the Fire House Commons Room if it's raining). There will be a reflection, soloist, wreath laying.

Spring has Sprung! The days are longer, the community at large. sun is shining. Birds are chirping and trees are budding. Unfortunately, with the change of seasons also comes the frequent whirring of gaspowered leaf blowers. Starting as early as 8 a.m. until the sun goes down it seems; the constant whirring of these machines can be heard all around town. Not only is the use of gas-powered leaf blowers harmful to human health, but it also has a negative impact on nature.

Although we have been trained to see the perfect yard as consisting of a lawn without any stray leaves, twigs or natural debris, these sterile environments don't provide any protection for the littlest creatures that we love to see fluttering about in the Spring and Summer. It's time to change our ideas of the "perfect lawn."

Gas powered leaf blowers create high intensity, low frequency noise, that impacts neighbors, schools, children playing at parks and sports fields, and disturbs local wildlife – not to mention our beloved pets.

Emissions generated from gas leaf blowers create high levels of benzene, formaldehyde, fine particulate matter, and smog forming chemicals. These clouds of dust and debris can include pollen, fertilizers and pesticides, lead and / or asbestos in some cases, fine particulate matter, animal feces and more that are inhaled by the folks who operate the machines and the Climate Change/LeafBlowers

These heavy-duty blowers erode, compact, and dry out soil. Plants, microorganisms, and pollinators are harmed. Those fireflies we all love to see and chase, the butterflies we watch with joy and magical winged creatures such as the Luna moth can't survive the power of a leaf blower. Gas powered leave blowers also create CO2 emissions that contribute to the climate crisis and warming of our planet.

What can we do? We can start small: instead of blowing your entire property, consider only blowing the driveway and walkways. Leave the lawn and the flower beds - your plants, the soil, and the pollinators we all love so dearly will thank you! Ask your landscaper to limit use of a leaf blower to paved surfaces only. Consider raking leaves into flower beds to act as a natural mulch and habitat for native insects, act as a natural weed suppressant, and organic matter that will retain moisture and boost soil health. If you have a gas-powered leaf blower, consider purchasing an electric one when the time comes to replace your current machine.

Collectively making simple, small changes to how we groom our yards can have very big and beneficial effects on the balance of nature and on human health.

Chatham Historical Society New history was created on Sunday, March 24,

**CAPTURING A MOMENT IN TIME** 

2024, at the Chatham Train Station as the Chatham Historical Society (CHS) organized an event celebrating the importance of the railroad to Chatham's development. A panoramic picture was taken of approximately 200 attendees mimicking a 1930's picture of Chatham residents celebrating the arrival of the first electric train into our town.

About a year and a half ago, Debbie Fabian -Chatham Historical Society Vice-President, was in the Chatham Train Station looking around at the blank walls when she had an idea. Why not decorate the walls with some of the photos from the Chatham Historical Society's archives. While looking for photos, she discovered a panoramic photo of a large crowd of people on the westbound station platform celebrating the arrival of the "First Electric Train" into Chatham.

The Chatham Business Men's Association (CBMA) was formed in 1921 to improve the growth and development of Chatham. In 1928, the CBMA, along with other towns serviced by the Lackawanna Railroad, met with railroad representatives company to discuss improvements to the train service. At the end of 1929, the Dover Line was electrified. To celebrate this milestone the participants rode the first electric train on December 18, 1930, from Hoboken to Chatham. When they arrived their

signatures with occupations were recorded and the panoramic photo was taken. This photo is now on display at the station along with many other historic Chatham train pictures through the years for commuters to enjoy.

Sunday, March 24, 2024, turned out to be a bright and sunny day which was perfect for all the attendees who came to see the pictures posted at the station. Just like in 1930, attendees signed their names on the participant sheets before posing for the picture. Coloring book pages of trains that children had colored at the library were on display along the station walls as well.

One of the attendees, Rick Loock, a retired Police Officer, and a lifelong resident of Chatham, found the signatures of his Grand Uncle George H. Loock, Sr. and Uncle Carl Henrich, 1948's Chief of Chatham's Volunteer Fire Department, on the 1930 photo signature list.

The entire Young Adult book collection is now housed in this area.

## **CHATHAM GIRL SCOUTS' DAY OF SERVICE 2024**

Chatham Girl Scouts hosted their annual Day of Service event on March 16th, at the Stanley Center in Chatham. This year's topic was Mental Wellness. Over 60 Girl Scouts, ages kindergarten to 12th grade attended. The event organizer, Troop Leader Jessica Romeo, planned the event with her 10th grade Troop 96147; Annika Raffetto, Asher Robson, Chloe Fajolle and Fina Gianusso, who wanted to host a Day of Service that was meaningful and spoke to current issues facing Girl Scouts in the Chatham community.

Many local women volunteered their time and expertise to make this day impactful.

The event kicked off with a yoga and mindfulness practice with resident and yoga instructor Julia Gray followed by a discussion with Chatham Township Mayor Stacey Ewald; Chatham Borough Mayor Carolyn Dempsey; and Chatham Township Police officer Carolina Kopacz on how mental health and selfconfidence are important to help Girl Scouts successfully navigate their world and make good decisions. Organizer Jessica Romeo explained to the Girl Scouts that by learning to understand and care for their own well-being, they can be their best and most healthy selves as well as be better equipped to help others.

The Girl Scouts then broke out into groups, organized by age, to visit 15 tables where they learned about topics such as identifying and

understanding feelings and emotions with a feelings wheel, and understanding - and practicing the therapeutic value of hands-on activities, such as creating their own clay worry stones and making meditation/calm jars using kits created by Senior Troop 96147.

Other mental wellness stations included the benefits of getting outside in nature led by Junior Troop 97790, the benefits of gardening on our wellness, coloring for calm with Troop 96323, music therapy with Jill DeBiasse, and self-care bingo. Members of the Chatham High School Gender-Sexuality Alliance (GSA) hosted a table with LGBTQ+ information and resources, and Girl Scouts learned about good mood food with nutrition and wellness health coach Gina Roof. In addition, the Girl Scouts had open conversations with officer Carolina Kopacz about self-respect and issues she sees facing Girl Scouts in the Chathams, and Allison Bardon from the Madison Chatham Coalition was there to provide resources and information on mental wellness programs and support.

Three 12th grade Girl Scouts were in attendance to inspire younger Girl Scouts through their Gold Award projects. Katelyn Hoffelder created a platform to provide books to local food pantries, providing families who utilize those services with the mental health benefits of reading. Ishita Yadav is tackling health issues that women face, including period poverty, and shared how these issues impact girl's and women's mental wellbeing. Rhea Agarwal presented her project on the impact the media has on our body image and the need for body positivity.

Event organizer Jessica Romeo said, "The day was not only fun and engaging for the attendees but shed light for adults on many important topics facing girls each day." Romeo heard feedback from adult attendees who said it was "timely", "very much needed", "impactful". One mother said, "I didn't realize how much I actually needed this day myself!" Romeo also noted that each Girl Scout seemed to leave with a feeling of empowerment and a boost of positive energy to be better able to help others.
