FISHAWACK FESTIVAL RECOGNIZED VOLUNTEERS

Borough of Chatham

The 2024 Fishawack Festival was held on Saturday, June 8th, 2024. There were festivities for all ages. Chatham businesses were open during the festival and attendees were encouraged to shop small.

Fishawack was started by Chatham's Chamber of Commerce in 1971 as an event to celebrate the heritage of Chatham Borough, in addition to support local shops. According to John T. Cunningham's 1967 book, Fishawack was the Lenni Lenape word for the Passaic River, and because Chatham's section is the narrowest part, the natives would cross the river at Chatham on their seasonal migration along the Minisink Trail.

While for many, the highlights of Fishawack were the dunk tank, the pretzels, and rides, the event also served as a time to honor three residents who have set extraordinary examples in providing service to the community.

The three volunteers honored were:

Megan Deaton, co-founder and co-executive director of Moms Helping Moms, which distributes over 1 million diapers to families in need.

Reverend Jeff Markey, who helped establish the Chatham Food Distribution and Chatham Food Bank and who has helped reinforce and guide the community in meeting Chatham's goals of inclusiveness and respect for people of all backgrounds.


Tom Salvas, who served in the Navy for 10 years and who has made it his mission to document the history of Chatham and Chathamites, most recently through the Chatham Library Veteran's Project.

Council President Jocelyn Mathiasen presided over the ceremony as Mayor Carolyn Dempsey was out of town. "This is the first time we have given these awards since before the pandemic," said Mathiasen, "and I think it is fitting now to remember that while the pandemic was such a dark, frightening, and tragic time for so many of us, it was also a time that brought out the best in so many as we turned to each other and asked 'how can we help' instead of just retreating into ourselves."

STUDENTS WIN CONGRESSIONAL APP CHALLENGE

Newark Academy sophomores Alexis Zhang, a resident of Chatham, and Aadit Shrivastava, a resident of Short Hills, were named winners of the 2023 Congressional App Challenge, in which high school students compete to make the best application in their congressional district.

The presented their app TranquilTally to Congresswoman Hillary J. Scholten, who serves the 3rd district of Michigan. The team competed in the Michigan district because Alexis resided there during the summer, when most of the app development took place.

"TranquilTally offers a simple and stress-free approach to improving mental health and taking mindful steps daily," says Alexis. "Overall, the website is a valuable tool for anyone looking to enhance their mental wellbeing through selfreflection and positive habit-building."

The duo was inspired by their personal experiences to create an easy, healthy and effective tool for self-care. "During this process, we had many candid conversations about our shared frustration with stress-inducing methods of self-care that often make it harder to improve mental health," Aadit says. "We noticed that many existing platforms and approaches were overly complex, demanding, or overwhelming. Our goal was to create a platform that takes the burden out of self-care and, instead, makes it an enjoyable and effective journey toward better mental well-being."

With the help of NA Computer Science Teacher Andrew Alford, Alexis and Aadit worked together to make TranquilTally a reality. It took a few months to develop the framework for an innovative yet feasible idea, but once their plan was in place, they dove into coding the user interface and database backend with systems such as HTML, CSS, JavaScript, PHP and MySQL.

In April, Alexis and Aadit traveled to Washington, D.C., to demo TranquilTally for members of the House of Representatives at the U.S. Capitol Building during the #HouseofCode, a STEM expo event for the competition winners.

"DUNK TANK" GENERATES \$1,400 FOR CES

Chatham Emergency Squad A Soaking for the Squad - Politicians, Police Officers and EMTs Sent Plunging into Cold Water for Worthy Cause

Residents and visitors of the Chathams who enjoyed the festivities at the annual Fishawack Festival held on Saturday, June 8 in Chatham Borough were treated to the first-ever "dunk tank". For a donation of \$5 for 3 attempts, kids and adults were invited to have a little fun and try their hand at sending local politicians, police officers and members of the Chatham Emergency Squad into cold water.

Chatham Township resident Lisa McHugh and her husband, Committeeman Marty McHugh, pitched the idea to the Emergency Squad in March. They generously rented the 500-gallon tank, filled it with water and enlisted colleagues and local "celebrities" to take their seat on the platform. Tickets sold briskly with all proceeds benefiting the Chatham Emergency Squad.

106 tickets in total were sold for residents to take their aim at elected officials including Chatham Township Committee members Marty McHugh, Jennifer Rowland and Mark Lois, and Chatham Borough Council member and candidate for Morris County Commissioner, Justin Strickland.

137 tickets were sold to dunk Chatham First Responders including Chatham Emergency Squad Training Lieutenant Jon Carlsson, Chatham Emergency Squad member and candidate for Chatham Township Committee, Craig Alperowitz, Chatham Township Police Sergeant Scott Herchick and Lafayette School Resource Officer, Charlie Ribaudo.

"The line was down the block once officers Scott Herchick and Charlie Ribaudo took to the booth," said Chatham Township Committee member Marty McHugh. "It's as though the kids were in cahoots with one another and planning all year for their moment of retribution on these well-regarded officers. They pulled out all the stops – I think they recruited top pitchers from the Chatham Baseball team and Chatham Sparks when they needed the best closers. We politicians had fun, too – don't tell anyone, but I made the water just a little colder for the police. All-in-all,



several days of workshops, activities, and talks that enhanced her leadership skills.






