OAS STUDENTS MAKE A DIFFERENCE IN DAY OF SERVICE

Eighth Grade students from Orange Avenue School dedicated a day in May to give back to local charities. Stations were set up throughout the school where students rotated to make sandwiches for the homeless, and shelter bags for transitional housing facilities, birthday bags filled with everything to make a birthday cake, they made cards for veterans and collected diapers and wipes for mothers in need.

In all, the day of service was able to assemble 400 shelter bags for Jersey Cares; make 500 sandwiches for St. Joseph Social Service Center in Elizabeth; 200 birthday bags with cake supplies, birthday cards and gift cards for Cranford Family Care and Jersey Cares; 35 boxes of diapers and wipes to Jewish Family Service; and 185 cards for Hugs for Soldiers.

OAS is thankful to the donations from Cranford families of almost \$4,000, OAS PTA and the 8th Grade Committee, and for the deli meats donated by Lenny & Johns.

"Service is a value OAS wants to instill in the student body and the day was a great collaboration between parents, faculty, and 8th graders. It was uplifting for everyone to see the great impact everyone made as a community," said Christina Bentrewicz, member of the OAS 8th Grade Committee and Day of Service.

During the day of service, students also learned how they can volunteer for local charities on their own time.

This is the third year OAS has supported local charities with a day of service. "Students made a difference in so many lives today," said Robin Yablonski, member of the OAS 8th Grade Committee and Day of Service. "Our goal is to help meet the needs of people in New Jersey and also educate our students on how to volunteer in our community and beyond."

Jersey Cares brings accessibility to volunteering. Students can create an account on their website and find a place nearby



to volunteer the next day. Jersey Cares website is jerseycares.org. Students can also volunteer in the Food Pantry at Cranford Family Care on Myrtle Street. Volunteering opportunities at St. Joseph's include pantry bag assembly on the second Saturday and third Monday and Tuesday of each month; assist with food distribution Monday through Saturday from 8:45 a.m. to noon and Monday through Friday from 1 to 4 p.m.; join with volunteers in the daily Bread Sandwich Program, and the Soup Kitchen held each Saturday from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m.; as well as special holiday projects (Easter basket assembly, school backpack supplies, etc.), and sorting donations of food and / or clothing.

Within a 10 mile radius of Cranford there are 20 homeless shelters, and one in 10 New Jersey families experienced food insecurities in 2023. "Our eighth graders showed such great teamwork today making sandwiches, birthday bags and shelter bags. They left their in-service day with a groundwork to continue to make a positive change through volunteerism," said Keren Segal, member of the Eighth Grade Committee and Day of Service.

DONNA HERRAN INDUCTED INTO HALL OF FAME

National Junior College Athletic Association

Longtime UCNJ Coach Donna Herran of Cranford, was named an inaugural inductee into the National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) Region XIX Hall of Fame. Herran became assistant coach of the women's basketball team in 1975 and went on to serve as head coach from 1980 through 1999.

Coach Herran accomplished much during her time at UCNJ. Under her leadership, the team accrued 537 wins and had five National Tournament appearances. During her first season, the team won the first UCNJ Garden State Athletic Conference, Region XIX Conference Championships, and a bid for the 1976 National Tournament held in Kansas. On six occasions, she was named the NJCAA Region XIX Coach of the Year. In honor of Herran's many contributions to the Region, NJCAA Region XIX presents a deserving coach each year with the "Donna Herran Coach of the

Year Award."

In 1996 and 1997, she was named both the NJCAA National District Coach of the Year and received the Converse Coach of the Year award. Herran was inducted into UCNJ's Athletic Hall of Fame in 2001 and received the New Jersey National Girls and Women in Sports Award. During her tenure UCNJ was consistently ranked in Defense on a National level. UCNJ had numerous All-Americans, All-Region XIX and All Garden State players honored. Kathy Penczak, All-America from Roselle, NJ went on to play for the St. Louis Streak Womens Professional Basketball League and T.C Flynn. Morris, All America also from Roselle, NJ was selected to try for for the 1980 Olympic Team. Nancy Foster of Union, NJ was chosen as WBCA Kodak All-America 1st Team. Their numbers #10 and #44 are retired. Defense was the Lady Owls trademark and they were consistently in the national polls for defensive average. A majority

of the Lady Owls either graduated from UCNJ or transferred to a Senior College or University to finish their education. Herran also served WBCA Women's Basketball Kodak All America Committee and Coach of the Year National Committees. She credits her success to Fred Perry, former Athletic Director and Coach. Herran is a graduate of UCNJ and Caldwell University.

"I am honored to extend my heartfelt congratulations to Coach Herran on this well-deserved recognition. She has been a dedicated member of the College community for many years, from coaching to her current membership on the College's Board of Governors. Her dedication to the College and presence in the UCNJ community is admirable. This recognition is a testament to her contributions both on and off the basketball court, and we are proud to celebrate this achievement," stated UCNJ Board of Trustee's Chair Victor M. Richel.





TUNNEL TO TOWERS NEVER FORGET MOBILE EXHIBIT VISITS OAS

The Orange Avenue School PTA welcomed the newly reworked Tunnel to Towers 9/11 Institute 'TM9/11 Never Forget Mobile Exhibit' at Orange Avenue School on May 29th. The public was invited to an opening ceremony in the school's front parking lot. An estimated one hundred people were in attendance including the Cranford Police and Fire Departments, Union County Police and Fire Pipes and Drums, scout troops, school staff, students, and other community members.

OAS middle school students visited the exhibit during the school day on May 30th.

The visit is largely the result of the tremendous interest put forth by the 8th grade class, many of whom participated in an essay contest sponsored by The Tunnel to Towers Foundation 9/11 InstituteTM and The New Jersey Commission on Holocaust Education. Each participant wrote an essay about the positive actions that our country and communities experienced following the attacks.

Essay themes included patriotism, unity, heroism and sacrifice. They also included a look at the improved safety standards and communication protocols that came as a result as well as a renewed call to service of community and country. Students were pleased to take on this educational challenge as the contest allowed for them to explore the attacks from a unique educational perspective. They discussed the attacks with family and friends who had lived through that time period and could offer their personal experiences. In some cases, they were surprised to find out that so much good had followed something so devastating.

The essay contest was brought to the attention

of the school by Caren Villarreal, an OAS parent and PTA member whose father, FDNY Assistant Chief Gerard A. Barbara co-led the rescue effort of Tower 2 on that day and ultimately sacrificed his life. She joins Tunnel to Towers in their mission to educate future generations about both the horrific and heroic acts experienced on 9/11 and believes that in order to truly "Never Forget" we must continue to educate. Chief Barbara's grandchildren, Thomas and Elena Villarreal attend OAS and are proud to carry on his legacy. The family joins the other members of the Cranford community who lost loved ones on that day in remembering them with honor and

ongoing appreciation for their sacrifices. They also appreciate the partnership and support of the Cranford community first responders in helping to organize this event and bring it to life.



For the last few years, the New Jersey Veterans Network (NJVN) has been helping veterans with resources and assistance with their mental health conditions. Over time we came to realize that the veteran's family was being affected by their struggles as well. Our team had to learn how to include their family members in our outreach efforts. We lose 22 veterans each day to suicide, and they leave behind grieving families. Recently, we decided to make sure all veteran family members can use the same resources that our team has available for veterans. Sometimes we forget about the sacrifices our veteran families have to make and this country should appreciate them for this.

One thing our team decided to do was to have Gold Star families meet disabled veterans at our events, so they can work together and form a bond. This effort was extremely affective and immediately brought joy to both the Gold Star families and to the disabled veterans. By adding veteran family members to the team, it allows us to work together on our peer support and recreational therapy programs. We are honored to have veteran family members to work alongside us and know they are just as committed with helping our veterans live a better way of life.



GRAND MARSHAL'S REMARKS HIGHLIGHT MEMORIAL DAY CEREMONY

For the third time in the last 10 years, the threat of dangerous weather loomed on Memorial Day morning, cancelling Cranford's parade and moving its iconic Memorial Day Ceremony indoors, to the Community Center. In a gymnasium filled with people, it was standing room only as the Memorial Day Committee, Cranford VFW Post 335 and the Cranford 86 project presented a ceremony full of tributes and emotion.

Many people look forward to the remarks from the Grand Marshal who is selected each year by the VFW. This year that selection did not disappoint. Vietnam War veteran, Jay Flanagan,

chose to speak not of himself, but of three men, and was shot and killed. Jay Flanagan, comrades who paid the ultimate price for freedom

Lieutenant Colonel William Stinson was Jay Flanagan's commanding officer. Alpha Company, under heavy fire from attacking North Vietnamese forces, had run out of food and ammunition. The fighting was so extreme, that it was determined to be too risky to send supplies into the embattled landing zone. Lt. Col. Stinson filled a helicopter with ammo and rations and delivered the payload himself. For the return trip, the chopper was loaded with dead and wounded comrades. During takeoff, William Stinson reached out to secure one of the

after an emotional pause, said "He was a hell of a leader".

Army Medic Danny O'Shea was from Jay Flanagan's Americal Division. Jay explained that Danny O'Shea's unit was under heavy fire while crossing rice paddies, and five men lay wounded under the continuing crossfire. Medic O'Shea made four trips into dangerous territory and carried his wounded comrades on his shoulders to safety, where he was able to provide them with medical attention. On the way to aid the fifth wounded soldier, Danny O'Shea was shot and killed. For his bravery under fire, he was posthumously awarded the Medal of Honor.

Army Nurse Sharon Lane was the only woman killed by enemy fire in Vietnam. While serving in a field hospital located near Jay Flanagan's headquarters, Sharon tended to sick and wounded soldiers and Vietnamese orphans. She died when the hospital was struck by rocket fire.

This steadfast gathering, held every year in our town, is always a beautiful, but bittersweet experience. All of those who join together, on this special morning in May, recognize that their freedoms are the result of the blood, sweat and sacrifice of those who have gone before them. Everyone involved in the preparation of Cranford's Memorial Day Ceremony does their best to ensure that your attendance at this timehonored Cranford tradition, will be time well



URGENT NEED FOR ADVOCATES FOR YOUTH

Child Focus

The latest class of CASA volunteers were sworn in to advocate for youth in foster care on June 11, 2024.

Union County Superior Court Judge Rosalba Comas presided over the swearing-in of the newly trained volunteers, and each can now be assigned to work with children living in foster care through no fault of their own, advocating for their best interests and ensuring their needs are met while in the child welfare system.

The nonprofit organization Child Focus operates CASA of Passaic and Union Counties, and its goal is to provide a CASA volunteer for each of the more than 250 child-victims in Union County foster care. Currently, just 30 percent of these vulnerable infants, children, and teens have the continuity and support of a CASA volunteer serving as extra eyes and ears for judges hearing their cases. The need is critical for additional volunteers to step up and serve waiting children.

"We are proud to welcome this new group of volunteers to the CASA family," said Erica Fischer-Kaslander. Executive Director of Child Focus. "These individuals have taken concrete action to make a difference in the lives of children who have experienced immense trauma, having been removed from home through no fault of their own, often due to abuse or neglect. We look forward to working with our new advocates as they serve these vulnerable youth and urge more community members to follow their example by volunteering to support children in need."

Judge Comas expressed her gratitude for the CASA program and the volunteers' commitment to the children they serve. "If I really want to know what's happening with a child I listen to the CASA worker, because they are 100% in tune with everything that the child needs, and everything that's happening in the child's life," she shared. "Their job is to look out for the kids,

represent the children's interest, and make sure that all of their needs are being addressed. It's not just whether they need clothes or whether they need toys, it's the bond. It's what they need emotionally, it's someone they can count on."

Since caseworkers, attorneys, and foster homes are ever-changing, the CASA volunteer – or advocate - is a much-needed constant in a child's life, committing to work with the child until they reach permanency in a stable home and the case closes. Children assigned a CASA volunteer are more likely to receive services, spend less time in the foster system, and experience significantly better outcomes than those without an advocate.

BECOMING A CASA - TRAINING SCHEDULED IN JULY

Becoming a CASA requires no special skills or background in child welfare. Child Focus provides thorough training on the ins and outs of advocating for abused and neglected children, and volunteers are fully supported by CASA program staff. Volunteers visit the children at least monthly and get to know the people in the child's life, such as foster parents, biological parents, teachers, therapists, and attorneys in order to make unbiased recommendations to the family court judge that support the child's best interests.

The first step to becoming an advocate is to attend an information session. 




