\$58K IN SCHOLARSHIPS AWARDED BY COLLEGE WOMAN'S CLUB

Caitlin Cabrales received a \$7,000 College Woman's Club. She plans to major in business as Jacksonville University.

Erin Doherty received a \$5,000 College Woman's Club Scholarship. She will attend Salisbury University where she plans to major in Exercise Science.

Hannah Gerstel received a \$5,000 Past Presidents' Scholarship and \$5,000 College Woman's Club Scholarship. She plans to major in history at SUNY Binghamton.

Shannon Gibbs received a \$5,000 College Woman's Club Scholarship. She will attend SUNY Brockport where she plans to major in physical education.

Caroline Morrelli received a \$6,000 College Woman's Club Scholarship. She will attend George Washington University to major in history and political science.

Chloe Wiedman received an \$8,000 College Woman's Club Scholarship. She will attend Franklin & Marshall College where she will major in business.

"Through all these challenges, they have emerged with a remarkable sense of resilience, optimism, and teamwork. We wish them continued success as they pursue their college and career goals."

Scholarship applications are available through local high school guidance departments in February of each year and are evaluated by a committee of CWC members each spring. Funds for scholarships come from membership dues, community sponsorships, fundraisers, and legacy bequests from members.

Founded in 1917, the College Woman's Club is an intergenerational organization devoted to educational opportunities and lifelong learning for women. 

Veterans Banner program is now displaying the next round of banners to recognize our veterans and active duty military personnel. The 25 new banners recognize honorees from WWI to present day and represent all branches of service.

For the first time, the banners feature a married couple! Staff Sergeant Jerry Boyle landed in Normandy in June 1944 and led men into France, where he was wounded. He was flown back to England and sent to the 144th General Hospital for surgery and treatment, where he met Margaret Mary McCarthy, a Second Lieutenant in the Army Nursing Corps. They were married in 1946 and moved to Westfield, where they remained and raised their family. You can see both of their banners, as well as those of all honorees, on display through Veterans Day.

SUMMER CONCERT SERIES CONTINUES IN JULY

Every Thursday through July 11, 7:30 p.m., Mindowaskin Park.

The Westfield Community Concert Band, under the direction of Dr. Thomas Connors, continues its 112th season with its annual Summer Concert Series in Mindowaskin Park, East Broad Street, Westfield. The band will be performing Thursday evening concerts on July 4 and 11. All concerts begin at 7:30 p.m. and are free to the public.

Highlighting this season's summer concerts will be a special Independence Day program taking place on July 4th featuring an appearance by the Westfield Town Crier and vocalist Kerry Stubbs. The concert series will also include performances of selections from popular Broadway musicals, including The Lion King, Fiddler on the Roof, Miss Saigon, South Pacific and Les Miserables. Each of the band's summer concerts will include popular marches, classical works and many patriotic compositions, including works by Cole Porter, George Gershwin and Leonard Bernstein.

The band welcomed many new musicians this season, including Doug Maurer on alto saxophone, John Cavaliere on trumpet, Alyssa Aiello on trumpet, Joe Reo on trumpet, Steve Wasco on Euphonium and Natalie Strauss on flute. 

A RECORD \$75,400 IN SCHOLARSHIPS & GRANTS AWARDED

The College Men's Club of Westfield

The College Men's Club of Westfield (CMC) has awarded a record \$75,400 in four-year scholarships and one-time standardized test preparation grants to five young men from Westfield High School to help them pursue their college education. David Germond, CMC President, explained that "the recipients were selected based on a rigorous assessment of their academic achievement, community involvement, career direction, and financial need."

Ryan Clark, CMC Scholarship Chair, noted that "this was once again an extremely competitive year for the CMC scholarship program with a large group of highly qualified applicants." The three scholarship awardees from the WHS class of 2024 include:

Adam Goddard was awarded a four-year, \$24,000 College Men's Club of Westfield Scholarship. Adam plans to study Film Production at Emerson College in Boston, Massachusetts. He hopes to pursue a career in film and TV production.

Benedict Nematadzira was awarded a fouryear, \$24,000 College Men's Club of Westfield Scholarship. Benedict will attend Carnegie Mellon University in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. He plans to major in Computer Science, laying the foundation for a career in data analytics for public health. Ethan Witten was awarded a four-year, \$24,000 College Men's Club of Westfield Scholarship. Ethan will attend Northeastern University in Boston, Massachusetts this Fall. He plans to study Entrepreneurship, with a long-term goal of founding his own business.


In addition to the four-year scholarships, earlier this Spring the CMC awarded two WHS juniors one-time grants each valued at \$1,700 to fund one-on-one standardized test preparation courses conducted by CollegeWise.

The College Men's Club of Westfield was founded in 1922 and over the past century has helped hundreds of Westfield young men by providing college tuition assistance and funding standardized test preparatory courses. Since its founding, the CMC has raised and distributed over \$1.4 million in higher education assistance to young men of the Westfield community to attend over 130 institutions of higher learning.

Scholarship applications are available online at the CMC website and through the WHS guidance department in February of each year. Applications are evaluated by a committee of CMC Trustees each Spring. Funds for scholarships are generated through fund raising events, donations, membership dues, endowment investment income, and legacy bequests.

Spring offers daffodils, hyacinths, primroses, forget-me-nots, columbines, irises, and foxgloves. An attractive assortment of American and Japanese azaleas borders the porch and patio of the house. The garden is resplendent in June when the hybrid tea, floribunda, rugosa, David Austin English, and miniature roses become the stars of the garden. Summer cottage favorites include astilbes, hollyhocks, sunflowers, and zinnias. Dahlias extend colorful blooms from midsummer through fall. Late blooming perennials such as Japanese anemones, asters and monkshood brighten the garden until frost. The Shires designed their garden as a serene and enchanting place where flowers can be seen wherever one casts one's eve.

2024 MARC WESLEY HARDY HUMAN RIGHTS AWARD

First Congregational Church of Westfield (FCC) presented the 2024 Marc Wesley Hardy Human Rights Award on May 19, 2024, to Sophia Mekbeb of Scotch Plains, NJ. Awarded annually to a student advocate for social justice and human rights, the honor commemorates the life of Marc Wesley Hardy, a member of FCC who was killed in a car accident in 1990 shortly before his graduation from Westfield High School. He was a national merit scholar, a gifted singer and actor, and was very passionate about the preservation of human rights.

Sophia Mekbeb is a junior at the Union County Academy for Performing Arts (Union County Vocational-Technical Schools/UCV-TS). During her time at the school, she has served as President of APA's International Thespian Society, an academic honor society for which she organized multiple community outreach events and fundraisers.

In addition, and to further her commitment to diversity, equity, inclusion and accessibility, Sophia organizes monthly school assemblies, including showcases for Black History Month and Asian American Pacific Islander (AAPI) Month. She is also the recipient of College Board National African American Recognition Award., an honor for academically exceptional African American students who have scored in the top 10 percent of the state on the PSAT or earned a top score on AP exams.

"As the daughter of an Ethiopian immigrant, my heritage is integral to my identity and is a driving force in my being so politically minded," says Sophia. "My hope is that I can one day be a leading example and make space for other women and people of color in the political sphere."

Sophia was the Secretary of Speech & Debate at UCVTS and helped to organize and coordinate the school's first County Invitational since COVID-19, in which she competed at the varsity level, and which led her to Montclair State University's Model UN Academy.

"During this week-long intensive, under the instruction of a former United Nations ambassador, I was able to simulate UN summits on a wide variety of diplomacy issues, negotiate treaties, draft legislation, and observe real-world current events alongside teens from across the globe," Sophia stated. "At the program's culmination, I was voted and awarded Best Delegate for significant treaty propositions, consistent leadership, and conflict resolution."

In Sophia's application for the Marc Hardy Award, she explained that her work experience, awards, and advancement opportunities have propelled her into a lifelong dedication to political activism, and that she plans to pursue a degree in public policy or international relations.

"The intersection of art and activism is a fundamental aspect of everyone's lives; theatre has the unique power to resonate with audiences emotionally, challenge them intellectually, and inspire them to take steps toward a more just future. I hope that, in pursuing a politically minded career, I can also incorporate my deep love for the performing arts in a way that creates meaningful change."

Each year the honoree receives a scholarship and certificate from the FCC Board of Ministries during its worship service. On Sunday, May 19, Marc's mother, Delores, was in attendance to celebrate this amazing young woman and the work she has only just begun.



entire school district, I congratulate Mrs. Moore and Mrs. Martinez on this well-deserved honor from the Rotary Club. Their dedication to our students and passionate commitment to education is an inspiration to us all," says González. Another parent writes: "All three of my children (10th, 8th, and 4th graders) have had the privilege of being taught by Mrs. Moore. Because of her teaching, they have a great work ethic, are creative, and love school. Mrs. Moore teaches them to be responsible, to be excellent, and to think outside the box. She is a wonderful communicator and truly cares about her students."

Martinez has worked as a paraprofessional at the high school for the past 22 years.

"What I like most about my job is to be in the classrooms, assisting our students," says Martinez, who adds that she "feels lucky" to be able to work with an "amazing" staff at WHS. "I love helping my students to reach their goals and make sure they receive all the support they need to be successful in our classes. It is very

Moore and Martinez were recognized at a Board of Education meeting on May 21. They will receive the Philhower and Steengrafe Awards on June 4 as guests of honor during a Rotary Club luncheon.

A committee of three Rotarians and two elementary school principals reviewed all nominations and selected Moore and Martinez as this year's recipients.

The Philhower Fellowship was established in 1993 by the Rotary Club to honor former Westfield Rotarian Charles Philhower and to recognize the importance of teaching in the elementary grades. An educator for more than 50 years, Charles Philhower, who died in 1962, was supervising principal (superintendent) of Westfield schools for three decades as well as cofounder and past president of the Rotary Club of Westfield.

This is the second year of the Steengrafe Fellowship, established in memory of Weyman O. Steengrafe who began teaching Social Studies in the Westfield Public Schools in 1942 before serving as principal at Franklin, Tamaques, and Wilson Elementary Schools. Weyman was a lifelong Rotarian from 1966-2010, serving as Club President in 1971-1972 and District Governor in 1985-1986.







URGENT NEED FOR ADVOCATES FOR YOUTH IN FOSTER CARE

Child Focus

The latest class of CASA volunteers were sworn in on June 11, 2024.

Union County Superior Court Judge Rosalba Comas presided over the swearing-in of the newly trained volunteers, and each can now be assigned to work with children living in foster care through no fault of their own, advocating for their best interests and ensuring their needs are met while in the child welfare system.

The nonprofit organization Child Focus operates CASA of Passaic and Union Counties, and its goal is to provide a CASA volunteer for each of the more than 250 child-victims in Union County foster care. Currently, just 30 percent of these vulnerable infants, children, and teens have the continuity and support of a CASA volunteer serving as extra eyes and ears for judges hearing their cases. The need is critical for additional volunteers to step up and serve waiting children.

"We are proud to welcome this new group of volunteers to the CASA family," said Erica Fischer-Kaslander, Executive Director of Child Focus. "These individuals have taken concrete action to make a difference in the lives of children who have experienced immense trauma, having been removed from home through no fault of their own, often due to abuse or neglect. We look forward to working with our new advocates as they serve these vulnerable youth and urge more community members to follow their example by volunteering to support children in need."

Judge Comas expressed her gratitude for the CASA program and the volunteers' commitment to the children they serve. "If I really want to know what's happening with a child I listen to the CASA worker, because they are 100% in tune with everything that the child needs, and everything that's happening in the child's life," she shared. "Their job is to look out for the kids, represent the children's interest, and make sure that all of their needs are being addressed. It's not just whether they need clothes or whether they need toys, it's the bond. It's what they need emotionally, it's someone they can count on."

Since caseworkers, attorneys, and foster homes are ever-changing, the CASA volunteer – or advocate - is a much-needed constant in a child's life, committing to work with the child until they reach permanency in a stable home and the case closes. Children assigned a CASA volunteer are more likely to receive services, spend less time in the foster system, and experience significantly better outcomes than those without an advocate.

BECOMING A CASA - TRAINING SCHEDULED IN JULY

Becoming a CASA requires no special skills or background in child welfare. Child Focus provides thorough training on the ins and outs of advocating for abused and neglected children, and volunteers are fully supported by CASA program staff. Volunteers visit the children at least monthly and get to know the people in the child's life, such as foster parents, biological parents, teachers, therapists, and attorneys in order to make unbiased recommendations to the family court judge that support the child's best interests.

The first step to becoming an advocate is to attend an information session. One of Imagine's former youth facilitators said this about her experience as a volunteer:




