

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


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COUNTY RESIDENTS GRADUATE FROM CERT BASIC TRAINING PROGRAM

Management graduated 10 residents from their Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) Basic Training Program. The residents volunteer teams perform basic response volunteered 30 hours in June to learn about supporting their local communities and firstresponders when emergencies and disasters strike.

"CERT teams play a crucial role in mitigating disasters and managing emergencies in Somerset County," said Commissioner Doug Singleterry, liaison to the Office of Emergency Management. "Each volunteer is a tremendous resource to first responders, their respective communities, and for the people of Somerset County."

This year's Spring CERT class included residents from Somerville, Somerset, Branchburg, Basking Ridge, Bridgewater, Bernardsville, and Watchung.

Volunteers trained at the Emergency Services Training Academy in Hillsborough and learned about Disaster Preparedness, CERT Organization, Light Search and Rescue, Disaster Psychology, Terrorism, Fire Safety, Medical Operations, Sheltering Operations, and Stop the Bleed. Following their extensive training, each participant is required to complete a written exam and practical exercise to officially graduate.

Local CERT programs help to train and organize teams of volunteers to assist their families, neighbors, co-workers, and other community members during emergencies when



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URGENT NEED FOR ADVOCATES FOR YOUTH IN FOSTER CARE

Information sessions are scheduled for August

failed to pick her up from kindergarten, she and her little brother Ethan, age two, would see their lives change. As Bella waited at school, calls were made to locate mom - who suffers from schizophrenia. When it was learned mom had been hospitalized, the Division of Child Protection and Permanency became involved and, upon arriving at the family home, it was discovered there was no food, furniture, or other necessary items. It was then that life in foster care for Bella and Ethan began.

Bella and Ethan are among more than 500 children who need to be removed from their homes in Passaic and Union counties each year due to abuse and/or neglect. Separated from all they've ever known, the road ahead is long, and they need a caring, consistent adult in their corner to protect their best interests. That's where Child Focus comes in. Specifically, its Court Appointed Special Advocate (CASA) program and, right now, there is an urgent need for volunteers – including those bilingual in both English and Spanish - to step up and train as child advocates for waiting children.

The next advocate training series will be held from 5:30 to 8:30 p.m. Tuesdays and Thursdays September 12 through October 22 in Clark. The afternoon that five-year-old Bella's mom in both Passaic and Union counties who needs one. It is difficult to overstate the difference a CASA volunteer can make in the life of a child removed from home through no fault of their own, due to abuse or neglect." She added, "Children with volunteer advocates are more likely to have needed services ordered on their behalf, spend less time in the foster care system, and experience significantly better outcomes than those who go without. Becoming a CASA volunteer requires a significant time commitment and training, but volunteers often find the work as life-changing for themselves as it is for the children they help."

> CASA volunteers receive professional training on the ins and outs of advocating for children in foster care and are fully supported by CASA staff members.No special background in child welfare or law is necessary; successful CASA volunteers are dedicated community members with varied life experiences. CASA volunteers visit the children, make unbiased observations, interview others in the child's life, and make recommendations to the judge. They often are the only consistent adult in the life of a child involved in the child welfare system, as caseworkers, professionals, and placements can be ever-changing. A CASA volunteer provides continuity during a time of chaos and unknowns. **ABOUT CHILD FOCUS:**

> Child Focus champions the needs and wellbeing of infants, children and teens impacted by, or at risk of, abuse or neglect by amplifying their voices and working toward lasting, permanent solutions that address their unique situations and provide support needed to thrive. This critical work is accomplished through three distinct but complementary programs: CASA of Passaic and Union Counties, NJ Safe Babies Court Team, and the Open Door Store. 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RETIRED WHRHS NURSE WORKS TO HELP HAITIAN ORPHANS

Global Health Share

Global Health Share is a non-profit which since 2019 has been dedicated to supporting an orphanage as well as education programs and marketable skills training for children and families in Haiti. The 501c3 charity recently held its second annual Caribbean fundraiser at the Country Lakes firehouse in Browns Mills, NJ. One of its founders is Nan Masterson, who was formally the head school nurse at Watchung Hills Regional High School from 2000 through 2015

Global Health Share provides funding for food, free elementary and secondary education programs, daily after school help, basic healthcare when funds are available, and marketing skills training to poor families in the communities that they serve. The country of Haiti does not provide free education to children, so if parents are unable to pay for tuition, uniforms, and supplies (which cost about \$400 to \$500 per student per year), the children cannot attend school.

"Since Haiti became an independent country in 1804, they have endured major political and environmental challenges. Two years ago, the President of Haiti was murdered, and gangs took over Port au Prince, the capital city of Haiti. Recent news reports refer to Port au Prince as the most dangerous city in the world. The children and programs that Global Health Share supports are located far enough away from Port au Prince to be out of harm's way, and the education programs can continue most days. The biggest issue now is access to food and clean water due to the fact that the gangs have closed ports that receive imports of food, and food is scarce. The cost of food has escalated, and Global Health Share, with generous donations has been addressing these needs" said the organization's founder, and President, Nan Masterson.

While working at WHRHS, Nan Masterson addressed the healthcare needs of students, and states that she loved every minute of it. In 2016 she retired from Watchung Hills. After "retirement" she volunteered on two Chamberlain University clinical immersion trips for nursing students to Kenya. After the second trip she was asked to join their global health education program faculty. Over the next few years, she took students to India, Brazil, and Haiti. She began the non-profit in Haiti after a trip to the country in 2018 while training nursing students in community health.

"There was devastation in every country that I did clinical immersions in with students, however, nothing affected me so deeply as the conditions that the children were living in at an orphanage where we did health assessments in Haiti. It changed my heart forever, and knew I had to do something," she said.

Since Masterson and her students' initial purchase of one month's supply of food for the children at the orphanage, Global Health Share has grown to support two school programs in Leogane and Gressier providing funds for food, uniforms, teacher salaries, structural building repairs, and much-needed supplies, as well as weekend skills-based training workshops. Baking, sewing, computer literacy, and English language instruction have been taught to help the families develop marketable skills for earning a living.

The Caribbean Fundraiser featured regional food, live steel drum music, hula hoop fun, a Caribbean trivia contest, drum circle conga line, basket auction, and 50/50 drawing. During the event Masterson recognized planning committee members Mark and Elisabeth McCartney for their support.



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
