#### **RESCUE SQUAD'S NEW AMBULANCE IS HERE**

As part of its commitment to provide highquality and fast emergency response, the Scotch Plains Rescue Squad has taken delivery of its newest ambulance. While it may not look much different on the outside, it has many innovative features to keep both passengers and the EMTs assisting them safe and secure.

One of these new safeguards is a restraint system that allows personnel to easily care for patients while ensuring that in the event of any sudden movements, EMTs are kept secure in their positions and are in no danger of injuring themselves or their patients. There is also customized cabinetry for ease of obtaining supplies, as well as a patient compartment camera for use by the front crew so everyone on the ambulance can stay involved in the treatment being provided.

In order to increase response time en route to patients and hospitals, other new features have been installed, such as a howler horn in lieu of air horn, which has the benefit of producing a sound wave that penetrates vehicles, and an attention-grabbing exterior emergency light that flashes different patterns, so drivers can move over faster to allow the ambulance to pass. To help keep patients calm during what can be a very stressful situation, blue LED mood-calming lighting can be used at times instead of bright white lights.

During its more than 87 years in service, The



Scotch Plains Rescue Squad has always strived to implement new technology to keep the townspeople who rely on this organization safe and secure. For example, it was one of the first rescue squads in Union County to carry automated defibrillators on its two ambulances, thus increasing the chance of survival of cardiac arrest patients.

Its members want to thank the town, the businesses, and the community for their ongoing support. They very much appreciate the ongoing recognition of their outstanding all-volunteer service, and are grateful to those who donate to make purchasing this ambulance and the medical supplies that go into it possible. It really does take a village of Neighbors Helping Neighbors.



#### TALE OF TWO PATIENTS: THE IMPORTANCE OF COORDINATED HEALTHCARE

Recently, our team responded to a call at a residence for a patient who had fallen and lost consciousness. Upon arrival, we assessed the situation, and soon after, paramedics took over, conducting more detailed tests. They discovered that the patient's blood glucose level was dangerously low, a condition also noted in a similar incident earlier that week. Out of curiosity, I examined the patient's medications



and found multiple pill bottles, each prescribed by different doctors and filled at various pharmacies.

A few days later, another call led us to a different residence where a patient had fallen, sustaining significant facial injuries. Here too, the patient's daughter handed me several pill bottles from different doctors and pharmacies.

You may wonder how such situations arise. Unfortunately, they are becoming increasingly common due to the convenience of urgent care centers. Many people opt for these facilities instead of establishing a relationship with a primary care doctor who could oversee and coordinate all aspects of their medical care.

A primary care physician typically conducts a thorough initial physical exam to establish a baseline of your health. Any prescribed medications are recorded and managed centrally under the doctor's supervision. They often recommend that all prescriptions be filled at the same pharmacy to ensure that any potential drug interactions are noted and addressed by the pharmacist in consultation with the doctor. This system ensures a seamless flow of communication and a team approach to patient care, thus minimizing errors and enhancing safety.

In the cases of my patients, neither had a primary care doctor. When health issues arose, they visited local urgent care centers, received prescriptions from various doctors, and filled these at different pharmacies, sometimes never visiting the same one twice. For instance, the first patient was unknowingly prescribed the same class of diabetes medication only with different names by different doctors due to a language barrier, leading to an overdose that caused her blood sugar to plummet and resulted in repeated falls.

The second patient, treated for hypertension, experienced a similar issue. Unaware of the medications he was already taking, he was overprescribed calcium channel blockers and angiotensin receptor blockers by an urgent care doctor, which significantly lowered his blood pressure, causing dizziness, lightheadedness, and a severe fall.

The best way to prevent such medication errors is to have all medical care coordinated by a single primary care physician and to consistently use one pharmacy for all prescriptions. This approach ensures robust checks and balances, where your doctor has oversight over all medications, and any duplications or interactions are likely to be flagged by your pharmacist. With a healthcare team that knows you well, you are far more protected from the dangerous errors like those described here.

After the completion of extensive renovations, Scotch Plains Mayor Josh Losardo recently visited Willow Grove Church for a tour of the historic Chapel. Built in 1887 with large stones donated by local farmers, on land given by John Lambert, this Chapel served as a Sunday School until 1951, when it became the original building of Willow Grove Church. The church recently renamed it the "Lambert Stone Chapel" after restoring the interior in its original style, with airconditioning added. A sign with this new name has been erected on the front lawn outside the

Chapel, located at 1961 Raritan Road, Scotch Plains.

Willow Grove Church's hope is that the Scotch Plains community will become more aware of its availability as a wonderful venue for many joyous or solemn events, including small weddings, funerals, memorial services, meetings of community groups and clubs, small concerts, and spiritual gatherings. 

residents to be aware of criminals claiming to be utility workers to gain access to homes. "We have a strong message for residents: Always check these workers for identification and never give them money," said Chief Briel, "Unless there is a true emergency, it is extremely rare for service technicians to visit customers without a confirmed appointment."

Police offer these important precautions: Always ask for a company-issued photo ID. Do not share your utility account numbers or other personal information. Legitimate technicians will not ask for this. Look for the corporate logo. Note the time. Never give money.

If you suspect someone may be a utility imposter, close and lock your door, and immediately call 911.

#### 2ND ANNUAL MOVERS, SHAKERS, CHANGE MAKERS EVENT

Student Movement Against Cancer (SMAC), Inc., established in 2001 by students of Scotch Plains-Fanwood High School, raised nearly \$6,000 for the nonprofit organization Inspiring Life Together (ILT) during its second annual "Movers, Shakers, Change Makers" held in the spring.

With movement at its core, "Movers, Shakers, Change Makers" invited current students from across the SMAC network to be swept up by fun, physical activities that kept them moving throughout the afternoon and evening. Building off the success of last year's inaugural event at Union Catholic High School, SMAC was able to double its impact in 2024 by hosting two simultaneous events at two different schools. The 2024 event at Union Catholic High School featured facilitated fitness experiences, friendly games and tournaments, and a chance for student leaders to meet and mingle. Students from three area high schools made the trip to Scotch Plains for the day's festivities.

Professional fitness instructors from across Union County volunteered their time and talent to offer custom sessions for attendeesMembers of SMAC's Board of Directors and representatives from Inspiring Life Together were also in attendance to support the cause and its student organizers.

New to the event this year, "Movers, Shakers, Change Makers" placed special emphasis on cancer education and awareness. A representative from ScreenNJ – an initiative backed by the Rutgers Cancer Institute of New Jersey and the New Jersey Department of Health – was on hand to share resources and materials related to cancer screening and prevention. Event goers were also encouraged to take home cancer education information supplied by MD Anderson Cancer Center and Inspiring Life Together.

SMAC student leaders selected Inspiring Life Together as the event's beneficiary due to its local impact. ILT is a New Jersey-based nonprofit dedicated to supporting mothers experiencing a breast cancer diagnosis. The funds raised by "Movers, Shakers, Change Makers" will support ILT's Sustainable Lifestyles Program, an initiative offering ILT mothers post-treatment experiences designed to promote a healthy lifestyle. Services include gym membership, personal training, health coaching, therapeutic spa treatment, attendance at ILT social events, youth activities, and personalized services that align with ILT's mission.

SMAC, Inspiring Life Together, and "Movers, Shakers, Change Makers" garnered the attention of local businesses who showed an outpouring of support. "Once again, our neighbors and local businesses rallied behind our SMAC students," shared Danielle Delavaux, SMAC Executive Director. "We are so grateful for the generosity of our sponsors and in-kind donors, and it was only with their help that our students were able to reach their fundraising goal."

#### **NATURE CENTER CLEAN-UP BRINGS BACK MEMORIES**

#### Borough of Fanwood

Fifty years ago, 16-year-old Robert Schott was looking to complete his Eagle Scout project and was told that work was needed on a nature center being constructed in Fanwood.

Schott decided he wanted to construct a bench for a rest area for visitors at the new center, which is celebrating its 50th anniversary this year.

"There were a few of us (Scouts) that contributed to the park development including Bob Luisi and Stephen Wilson," who cut the trails at the Nature Center, Schott said, noting that the trails are named after them. Schott, Luisi and Wilson were all Fanwood residents and members of the Scotch Plains-Fanwood High School Class of 1976. Schott now lives in Cranford.

"Everything that we did (at the Nature Center) was brand new as that was when the park was being developed," Schott said. "It was a good opportunity to contribute and get our projects done."

He said his father, Joe Schott, a World War II veteran who celebrated his 102nd birthday earlier this year, helped design the bench.

"We worked together to construct the forms to cut and lay the rebar (and) to mix and pour the cement," Robert Schott said, noting that his father "probably did half the work."

"It wasn't just the bench. I carved out about a

20 by 20 what I called the Robert Schott's Rest Area. We framed it with railroad ties. I cleared out all the brush and I may have planted flowers," he recalled.

He carved the year 1974 into the bench when he constructed it. which he said is barely legible today, along with his name underneath the bench.

Robert Schott said he had only been back to the Nature Center a few times over the past 50

years but returned for a trail clean-up day on May 4th, 2024.

"I raked out all the weeds and I cleared out a few fallen branches and I cut a few things up just to freshen it up," he said.

He noted the trails are "really well manicured now and stoned and lined. It's beautiful."

Schott said his bench was painted over the years and is "solid as cement can be."
