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LOCAL STUDENT TEACHERS NAMED TOP IN STATE

Kean University

Three new teachers who recently graduated from Kean University were recognized as among the top student teachers in the state this year.

They were among 16 new teachers who received the highest commendation, Awarded with Distinction, from the New Jersey Association of Colleges for Teacher Education (NJACTE) and the state Department of Education (DOE) as clinical interns, or student teachers. In all, 63 new teachers who recently graduated from 22 New Jersey colleges were recognized as Distinguished Clinical Interns at a festive ceremony held recently at Kean University.

"I know the importance of what takes place in classrooms every day, and I am so proud of each of you," Kean President Lamont O. Repollet, Ed.D., told the group. "You are stepping into your role at a time when teachers are needed more than ever. I have no doubt you will have a profound impact."

Kean graduate Cristiana Rodrigues '24, who completed her student teaching in a third grade classroom at Washington Elementary School in her hometown of Union, said it was "surreal" to receive the top honor. In the fall, she will be a full-time teacher at the school, which she also attended as a child.

"I get to go back and thank all the teachers who made me want to be a teacher," said Rodrigues, who is also beginning studies at Kean this fall for a master's degree in special education - learning and behavioral disabilities.

Each student teacher spent two semesters working alongside cooperating teachers as part of their training. Stationed in classrooms throughout the state and across grades, they taught classes, prepared lessons, conducted labs and served as role models to children.

The state education department and NJACTE also recognized the cooperating classroom teachers who worked with the student teachers. New Jersey Acting Education Commissioner Kevin Dehmer and Assistant Commissioner Jorden Schiff, Ed.D., both took part in the

ceremony.

"This collaboration between cooperating teachers and clinical interns exemplifies how much we can accomplish for New Jersey's students by working together," Dehmer said. "These remarkable individuals stand at the intersection of learning and teaching, and their commitment serves as an inspiration to many."

Monmouth Regional High School social studies teacher Joseph Nappi, the 2023-2024 State Teacher of the Year, also spoke at the ceremony. Nappi, who works closely with the Holocaust Resource Center at Kean and teaches an elective class on the Holocaust, genocide and humanity that gives his students Kean credit, congratulated both the new teachers and the cooperating teachers.

"This is an amazing profession," Nappi said, "one that will impact, by the time you're done, thousands of minds."

The Kean students who received top honors – recent graduates Ryen Hagg '23 '24 M.A., Lillianna Ramos '23 '24 M.A., and Rodrigues '24, all said they were honored to receive the awards. They also expressed thanks to their cooperating teachers.

Hagg, of Garwood, interned in a Scotch Plains-Fanwood High School chemistry classroom with teacher Swati Bulusu. A third-generation teacher – Hagg's mother and grandfather, who both attended the ceremony, are educators – she will teach chemistry at Cranford High School in the fall.

Ramos, of Colonia, interned with Rahway High School math teacher Toni Robertelli. She will begin a full-time job teaching algebra and geometry there this fall.



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URGENT NEED FOR ADVOCATES FOR YOUTH IN FOSTER CARE

Information sessions are scheduled for August

The afternoon that five-year-old Bella's mom failed to pick her up from kindergarten, she and her little brother Ethan, age two, would see their lives change. As Bella waited at school, calls were made to locate mom - who suffers from schizophrenia. When it was learned mom had been hospitalized, the Division of Child Protection and Permanency became involved and, upon arriving at the family home, it was discovered there was no food, furniture, or other necessary items. It was then that life in foster care for Bella and Ethan began.

Bella and Ethan are among more than 500 children who need to be removed from their homes in Passaic and Union counties each year due to abuse and/or neglect. Separated from all

they need a caring, consistent adult in their corner to protect their best interests. That's where Child Focus comes in. Specifically, its Court Appointed Special Advocate (CASA) program and, right now, there is an urgent need for volunteers including those bilingual in both English and Spanish – to step up and train as child advocates for waiting children.

The next advocate training series will be held from 5:30 to 8:30 p.m. Tuesdays and Thursdays September 12 through October 22 in Clark. > Said Executive Director Erica Fischer-Kaslander, "We are committed to recruiting, screening, and training advocates for every child in both Passaic and Union counties who needs one. It is difficult to overstate the difference a CASA volunteer can make in the life of a child removed from home through no fault of their own, due to abuse or neglect." She added, "Children with volunteer advocates are more likely to have needed services ordered on their behalf, spend less time in the foster care system, and experience significantly better outcomes than those who go without. Becoming a CASA volunteer requires a significant time commitment and training, but volunteers often find the work as life-changing for themselves as it is for the children they help."

> CASA volunteers receive professional training on the ins and outs of advocating for children in foster care and are fully supported by CASA staff members. No special background in child welfare or law is necessary; successful CASA volunteers are dedicated community members with varied life experiences. CASA volunteers visit the children, make unbiased observations, interview others in the child's life, and make recommendations to the judge. They often are the only consistent adult in the life of a child involved in the child welfare system, as caseworkers, professionals, and placements can be ever-changing. A CASA volunteer provides continuity during a time of chaos and unknowns. **ABOUT CHILD FOCUS:**

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MONTH-LONG STOREFRONT ART WALK


