

WESTFIELD ROTARY SUPPORTS ST JOE'S FOOD SERVICES

Two representatives from St Joseph's Social Services in Elizabeth recently spoke to the Rotary Club of Westfield. Corey Wu Jung is the Food Program Director, and Mary Phillips is the Development Director. The Rotary Club has been

helping St Joe's for several decades.

St Joseph's Social Service Center in Elizabeth has provided a variety of services to the disadvantaged in Elizabeth, since 1986. Their mission is to serve the poor with dignity and grace. They operate a thrift shop with clothing, and 3 food services: 1. Daily food pickup; 2. Saturday Soup Kitchen; 3. Monthly food distribution to 400 families. Other programs include literacy, English as a second language, health services, prescription assistance, counselling and therapy, and providing clothing and household items. The 'Choice Food Program' allows people to select their own food. The Rotary Club of Westfield helped St. Joe's purchase a huge refrigerator so that they may offer fresh fruits and vegetables, along with eggs, milk and cheese. St. Joe's also collects and distributes toys at Christmas.

The Capital Campaign for St. Joseph's has enabled them to have successfully raised the necessary funds to: build a new food pantry building; build a new clothing and household goods distribution center; renovate the existing buildings on the property; and reconfigure and repaye the parking lot in order to make drop-offs and pickups easier. They reached their fundraising goal of 1.4 million dollars.

Collectively, these projects will transform the facilities of St. Joseph Social Service Center. This plan will make it possible for the agency to improve services and to accommodate the increase in the number of residents who seek the agency's assistance. The contractors have completed the storm water management system and connected the sewer and gas lines. Equipment has been delivered for the food building, and the HVAC has been installed. The assembly of the two new buildings has been completed, and they received the Certificates of Occupancy in January, 2024.

Phase Two will include making bathrooms to be ADA compliant, redoing the counselling cubicles, improving the adult learning program, upgrading the Soup Kitchen, and improving and winterizing the garage.

Last year the Westfield Rotary Club Foundation awarded \$117,000 in college scholarships and \$29,978 in community grants. Applications for grants are available on the Rotary Club website. Since 1967, Westfield Rotary has awarded \$3.5 million in scholarships to 1800 students. Scholarship applications for Westfield students are available through the Westfield High School guidance department.

The Rotary Club of Westfield meets the first three Tuesdays of each month for lunch at noon, at Limani Seafood Grill on North Ave. Guests are always welcome. For information check out the website westfieldrotary.com or contact club secretary Dr. D. Michael Hart by email at drmhart@yahoo.com.

URGENT NEED FOR ADVOCATES FOR YOUTH IN FOSTER CARE

The afternoon that five-year-old Bella's mom failed to pick her up from kindergarten, she and her little brother Ethan, age two, would see their lives change. As Bella waited at school, calls were made to locate mom - who suffers from schizophrenia. When it was learned mom had been hospitalized, the Division of Child Protection and Permanency became involved and, upon arriving at the family home, it was discovered there was no food, furniture, or other necessary items. It was then that life in foster care for Bella and Ethan began.

Bella and Ethan are among more than 500 children who need to be removed from their homes in Passaic and Union counties each year due to abuse and/or neglect. Separated from all they've ever known, the road ahead is long, and they need a caring, consistent adult in their corner to protect their best interests. That's where Child Focus comes in. Specifically, its Court Appointed

Special Advocate (CASA) program and, right volunteer requires a significant time commitment now, there is an urgent need for volunteers including those bilingual in both English and Spanish – to step up and train as child advocates for waiting children.

The next advocate training series will be held from 5:30 to 8:30 p.m. Tuesdays and Thursdays September 12 through October 22 in Clark. Those interested must first attend any one of the following information sessions: Wednesday, August 14 at 5:30 p.m. at the Colleen Fraser Building, 300 North Avenue, Westfield; Thursday, August 22 at 5:30 p.m. at the Rahway Library, 2 City Hall Plaza, Rahway; and Wednesday, August 28 at noon at the Child Focus office, 1143 East Jersey Street, 2nd Floor, Elizabeth. Said Executive Director Erica Fischer-Kaslander, "We are committed to recruiting, screening, and training advocates for every child in both Passaic and Union counties who needs one. It is difficult to overstate the difference a CASA volunteer can make in the life of a child removed from home through no fault of their own, due to abuse or neglect." She added, "Children with volunteer advocates are more likely to have needed services ordered on their behalf, spend less time in the foster care system, and experience significantly better outcomes than those who go without. Becoming a CASA and training, but volunteers often find the work as life-changing for themselves as it is for the children they help."

CASA volunteers receive professional training on the ins and outs of advocating for children in foster care and are fully supported by CASA staff members. No special background in child welfare or law is necessary; successful CASA volunteers are dedicated community members with varied life experiences. CASA volunteers visit the children, make unbiased observations, interview others in the child's life, and make recommendations to the judge. They often are the only consistent adult in the life of a child involved in the child welfare system, as caseworkers, professionals, and placements can be ever-changing. A CASA volunteer provides continuity during a time of chaos and unknowns.



Union County Superior Court Judge Rosalba Comas presided over the swearing-in of the newly trained volunteers, and each can now be assigned to work with children living in foster care through no fault of their own, advocating for their best interests and ensuring their needs are met while in the child welfare system.

The nonprofit organization Child Focus operates CASA of Passaic and Union Counties, and its goal is to provide a CASA volunteer for each of the more than 250 child-victims in Union County foster care. Currently, just 30 percent of these vulnerable infants, children, and teens have the continuity and support of a CASA volunteer serving as extra eyes and ears for judges hearing their cases. The need is critical for additional volunteers to step up and serve waiting children. Judge Comas expressed her gratitude for the CASA program and the volunteers' commitment to the children they serve. "If I really want to know what's happening with a child I listen to the CASA worker, because they are 100% in tune with everything that the child needs, and everything that's happening in the child's life," she shared. "Their job is to look out for the kids, represent the children's interest, and make sure that all of their needs are being addressed. It's not just whether they need clothes or whether they need toys, it's the bond. It's what they need emotionally, it's someone they can count on."

Since caseworkers, attorneys, and foster homes are ever-changing, the CASA volunteer – or advocate – is a much-needed constant in a child's life, committing to work with the child until they reach permanency in a stable home and the case closes. Children assigned a CASA volunteer are more likely to receive services, spend less time

Becoming a CASA requires no special skills or background in child welfare. Child Focus provides thorough training on the ins and outs of advocating for abused and neglected children, and volunteers are fully supported by CASA program staff. Volunteers visit the children at least monthly and get to know the people in the child's life, such as foster parents, biological parents, teachers, therapists, and attorneys in order to make unbiased recommendations to the family court judge that support the child's best interests.

There is an urgent need for additional community members to speak up for abused and neglected children. The first step to becoming an advocate is to attend an information session. The next advocate training series will be held from 5:30 to 8:30 p.m. Tuesdays and Thursdays September 12 through October 22 in Clark. 

ANNUAL MARCH TO YORKTOWN DAY - AUG. 18TH

The Washington-Rochambeau Revolutionary Route New Jersey (W3R-NJ) announces Annual March to Yorktown Day Commemoration & Encampment Festival in Westfield, NJ on Sunday, August 18th from 11:30 – 4:00 pm in Mindowaskin Park. The event is dedicated to the 1st Squadron, 102nd Cavalry from Westfield currently serving in Syria.


The event will kick off at 11:30 with an opportunity to meet living historians and listen to patriotic music and follow at 12 noon with an opening ceremony at Mindowaskin Park on Mountain Ave. There, remarks by Westfield Mayor Shelley Brindle, State Senator Jon Bramnick, New Jersey State Society Daughters of the American Revolution State Regent, Diane Waugh Oliver West Fields Chapter Sons of the American Revolution President, Jay Hershey and others will talk about the importance of Westfield commemorating when the French Continental troops marched from Newport, Rhode Island to Yorktown, VA (an almost 700 mile, nine state, land and water journey) in the summer of 1781 taking them through Westfield on August 29, 1781. The route is designated as the Washington-Rochambeau Revolutionary Route National Historic Trail, which is administered by the National Park Service.

At 12:30, the community is invited to watch or join-in the symbolic march re-enactment into an Mindowaskin Park accompanied by the Generals Rochambeau, Washington and Major General Chastellux and General Lafayette, the New Jersey Sons of the American Revolution Color Guard, the Daughters of the American Revolution, the New Jersey Fifes and Drums, the 2nd Regiment Light Dragoons with horses, the Miller-Cory Museum colonial living history group and New Jersey Militia Heard's Brigade.

From 1:00 to 4:00, a history themed festival will be set up in Mindowaskin Park with children's' games, musket firing, military drill on horseback and history items and information provided by local history organizations such as the Forgotten Victory Trail Association, Miller-



Cory House Museum, Princeton Battlefield Society, Union Township Historical Society, Chatham Historical Society, Westfield Chapter Daughters of the American Revolution and the Washington Association of New Jersey had informational tables set up and interacted with the

SCHOOLS WELCOME NEW ADMINISTRATORS

Westfield Public Schools

The Westfield Public School District welcomed two new administrators this summer. At its regular public meeting held on June 25, the Board of Education approved the appointment of Jada Cole as Assistant Principal at Edison Intermediate School, effective July 1. At its June 11 meeting, the Board approved the appointment of Kathleen Nesheiwat for the new position of Supervisor of Elementary Student Support Services for students in pre-kindergarten through fifth grade, effective July 24.

At Edison, Cole will succeed Jacqueline Spring, who was recently appointed as an assistant principal at Westfield High School. During the past two years Cole served as Director of Special Services for the Irvington Public School District and as Assistant Principal at Irvington High School. From 2004-2022, she held various positions in special education, including Learning Disabilities Consultant (LDTC), Case Manager, and Special Education / Resource Teacher in the New Brunswick, Franklin Township, and Newark Public Schools.

Nesheiwat joins the Westfield Public School District, following a year as Acting Assistant Director of Pupil and Personnel Services in the Madison Public School District, where she also served as a School Psychologist and Child Study Team member from 2018-2023.

The addition of a second supervisor to support the Special Programs and Student Support Services Department was approved by Westfield voters in April, as part of the 2024-2025 school district operating budget. Nesheiwat will join the district's current Pre-K-12 Supervisor of Special Education Alex Linden, who was Board approved on June 11 as Supervisor of Secondary Student Support Services for Grades 6-12.






