





FAIR MOUNT CEMETERY WALKING TOUR - OCT 5

Join Chatham Historical Society in a guided walking tour of Chatham's past at Fair Mount Cemetery on Saturday, October 5 (rain date October 6) at 2 to 4 p.m.

Fair Mount Cemetery, located on the hill between Fairmount and Hillside Avenues, was established in 1859 and it is the final resting place for many Chatham dignitaries, war veterans, and ordinary citizens. The cemetery contains many fascinating clues to the history of the Chatham Community and the lives of the people who have populated it for more than two centuries.

The guided tour introduces a few of the men and women – ministers, educators, farmers, doctors, shop keepers, librarians, and veterans – whose lives and vision contributed to the unique character and development of the community we enjoy today. Volunteers will guide you through the cemetery with stops to listen as actors in costumes offer monologues portraying historic individuals near the site of their final resting places.

For many years Chatham Historical Society offered the Fair Mount Cemetery field trip for 4th grade Lafayette Avenue School students. Chatham High School students portrayed wellknown residents from throughout Chatham's history at stops along this walking tour. In the past the society has also organized cemetery tours for adults. In connection with the continued celebration of the Chatham Historical Society's Centennial the society is organizing this popular tour again. MADISON'S ANNUAL STREET FESTIVAL BOTTLE HILL DAY 2024 – SATURDAY, OCT. 5

Madison's annual fall festival, Bottle Hill Day, takes place on Saturday, October 5, from 10:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.

This year will mark the 49th Anniversary of this signature Madison, NJ, event, which has continued to grow yearly since it was first established in 1974 by Mayor Elizabeth Baumgartner.

With the expansion a few years ago onto Kings Road, this rain-or-shine street festival spans over six blocks. It includes sidewalk sales, four stages with live music, three Amusement Areas, food, and 225+ vendors, including nonprofits, crafters, retail businesses, etc. Also, as in years past, the Madison Chamber of Commerce and Madison P.B.A. #92 will be hosting their popular annual Madison Car Show in conjunction with Bottle Hill Day.

Great food options will be available, including the Food Court on Cook Avenue, other food vendors throughout the festival, local restaurants, and a Food Truck Court on Kings Road.

Park & Ride Shuttle: Park your car in the parking lot at the Madison Community Pool and ride downtown, where the shuttle will drop you off right in the center of town. The shuttle will run from 9:15 am until 5:00 pm in a continuous loop between the parking lot and the town center.

Family Activities & Rides: Provided by Seashore Amusements at Dodge Field on Central Avenue and Kings Road.

DDC Beer Garden: The Bottle Hill Day Beer Garden returns for its 11th year! It will again be located between Prospect Street and Maple Avenue on Kings Road. The Beer Garden will feature a variety of beer on tap and wine and will also include some specialty items.

Street Closures and Parking: Waverly Place, Central Avenue (Main Street to Brittin Street), Kings Road (Prospect Street to Green Avenue), and Green Village Road (Main Street to Kings Road) will be closed, but the municipal lots (Waverly Green, Cook Avenue, and Elmer Street) will be open for parking. Additional event parking will be available at the Madison Junior School parking lots, which are accessible via Brittin Street (behind the school). The Kings Road Parking Lot behind the Public Safety Building will be open for public parking, and the Prospect Street Parking Lot will also be open to the public. Street parking, where allowed, will be available as well. Main Street remains open all day.

The DDC's objective is to promote economic growth and business development so that Madison's beautiful downtown continues to thrive. Bottle Hill Day was created in 1974 to promote the business district. The name originated from Madison's establishment in 1715 of the village called "Bottle Hill." Over the years, it has grown, evolving into a family, entertainment, and community celebration that draws between 10,000 and 20,000 people to the heart of Madison every fall. This event is free and open to the public.



The Madison Rotary prepared 50 backpacks with school supplies for local children whose parents rely on the First Baptist Food Panry. The children were so excited to see the backpacks and choose their favorite color and the parents were so grateful. "As every parent knows, getting kids ready for school is an added expense and for those already struggling, it can be a burden. The Madison Rotary is always looking for ways to help the community," said Lois Bhatt, President.

The Madison Rotary and the First Baptist Church forged a relationship that began in the early days of the pandemic when Interact students (the high school arm of Rotary) collected bags of food for the Pantry. ACCUMULATING WRONGS: THE WAR OF 1812

Morris County

On August 24, 1814, British troops invaded an undefended Washington, D.C., setting fire to the White House (then known as the Presidential Mansion), as well as the Library of Congress and other government buildings.

The raid unfolded 209 years ago today, and it was the first and only time since the American Revolution that a foreign power had captured and occupied a capital of the United States.

In observance of the anniversary of the "Burning of Washington," the Morris County Office of Planning and Preservation launched the online Morris County Veterans Compendium, a compilation of the Morris County soldiers who fought in America's past conflicts. "Accumulating Wrongs: The War of 1812" has been created to commemorate local residents who fought in one of our nation's earliest armed conflicts.

The War of 1812 was set against the backdrop of social and economic hardship as the United States was still recovering from the American Revolution, the country's first military test as a new nation. Continental money was worthless, and many homes, industries and businesses had been destroyed. America was struggling to rebuild.

England remained antagonistic and continued to test American resolve following the Revolution by enacting embargos. Worse yet, American sailors were being kidnapped and forced to serve in the Royal Navy in a practice known as "impressment."

"Free Trade and Sailors' Rights" was fast becoming the angry rallying cry throughout the land.

Historians have suggested that 1812 was a more perilous time for United States than 1776.

Additionally, although the nation had won its independence, an American identity had not yet formed among its citizens. People functioned within their individual colonies, rather than as a unified people defined by one nation.

ON AUGUST 24, 1814, THAT CHANGED.

The "accumulating wrongs" as phrased by President Madison in his letter to Congress, and the burning of the White House on August 24, 1814, forged an esprit de corps in the American heart.

Many Morris County men, some of whom had served in the Revolution, took up arms against the fresh tyranny. For others, family tradition of military service began.

Isaac Pierson served in the American Revolution as a Private in Suffolk County. His son Maltby Sr., of Morris Township, would serve



in the War of 1812 and his son, Maltby, Jr. served in the Civil War.

Other citizens' military service in 1812 may not be as prominently denoted relative to their experiences in civilian life.

For example, "Uncle Byram" Pruden served in the War of 1812, but is more likely to be remembered as the first captain on the Morris Canal, at the helm of a boat named "The Dover." He died at age 96 in 1888 and is buried in the Orchard Street Cemetery in Dover, N.J.

OUR COUNTY'S CITIZENS RALLIED AS WELL.

An article published on September 10, 1814, by the New York Gazette, titled "Exalted and Distinguished Patriotism," states:

"We have the satisfaction again to notice the distinguished and practical patriotism of our

sister State New Jersey. Between four and five hundred men from Morris County, some from a distance of nearly fifty miles, headed by their revered pastors, were at work yesterday on the fortifications of Harlem.


Such exalted and distinguished patriotism deserves to be and will be held in grateful remembrance by the citizens of New York, and recorded in the pages of history, to the immortal honor of the people of that State."

Accumulating Wrongs: The War of 1812 is a collection of names, service narratives, historical information and photographs compiled by the county Office of Planning and Preservation and remains a work-in-progress. This list is the latest chapter in the series of online projects known as the Morris County Veterans Compendium being led by the Office of Planning and Preservation to document the military service of Morris County residents throughout history.

For Independence Day 2023, the Office of Planning and Preservation was also proud to launch "Morris County in the American Revolution," an interactive ArcGIS StoryMap© complete with an introductory video, photos, background and geographic data on the local soldiers, civilians and places involved in winning our nation's independence.
