



LONG-TIME PUPPY RAISERS HONORED

The Seeing Eye

The Seeing Eye recently honored five longtime puppy raisers with induction to "The Seeing Eye 21 Club", a special honor for volunteers who have raised at least 21 Seeing Eye® puppies. The non-profit also honored the Seeing Eye puppy raising club volunteers with two awards, the Outstanding Leader Award and the 20-year Leader Award. Finally, 34 exceptional collegebound puppy raisers were awarded college scholarships totaling \$64,000.

"Each year, The Seeing Eye's Family Day is a celebration of all the hard work and dedication of our volunteer puppy raising families," said Seeing Eye director of canine development Peggy Gibbon. "An army of volunteers provides each Seeing Eye puppy with a loving home environment, socialization, and basic training that prepares them to become Seeing Eye dogs for people who are blind."

"We're actively recruiting puppy raisers and puppy sitters for our upcoming litters that are planned for the coming months. If you're interested in joining our community of dog lovers, now is a great time to reach out to us and learn what puppy raising is all about," said Gibbon. "We need homes and families of all shapes and sizes for our puppies because fully trained Seeing Eye dogs are placed in similarly diverse families and living situations with people who are blind."

A puppy raiser family is responsible for providing a loving and nurturing home environment for approximately one year. During that time, the raiser is responsible for teaching basic obedience, house manners, bringing the puppy to Seeing Eye puppy club meetings and socialization trips in their area. The Seeing Eye puppy could be a German shepherd, Labrador retriever, golden retriever, or a Labrador/golden retriever cross.


Puppy raisers must live within New Jersey, eastern Pennsylvania, Maryland, Delaware or New York (Rockland or Orange Counties) so they can attend regular puppy club meetings where they will receive help and coaching with their puppies. All veterinary expenses are covered by The Seeing Eye and a stipend is provided to help cover the cost of dog food. If a Seeing Eye puppy does not graduate from the program, the family who raised the puppy is offered the first option to adopt the puppy they raised. For more information visit seeingeye.org/raise.



When There Were Witches: An Exploration of the Salem Witch Trials

In January of 1692, a strange illness seized control of five young girls living in Salem Village, a contentious and divided town in the Massachusetts Bay Colony. When medical professionals couldn't identify the illness, the town believed the girls had come "under an evil hand." Events soon spiraled out of control with local divisions and a splintered colonial government feeding the frenzy. Archivist Mickey DiCamillo unravels the events with archival documents from the period, and program participants will interact with transcripts from the 1692 interrogations of suspected witches. Participants will also learn where the documents live online, so they can investigate more on their own. A Q&A session follows the presentation.

Amid a significant shortage of bilingual volunteers, each has embraced the role of primary advocate on five cases with Spanishspeaking children, biological parents or resource parents, showcasing their commitment to making a difference in the lives of abused and neglected children.

Tiffany and Wendy have stepped up to bridge this gap, in addition to their work supervising a team of volunteer advocates. Their efforts in taking on these additional 10 cases total, navigating complex situations where language barriers could impede access to essential services and support for children and their families, underscore the urgent need for bilingual community members to join CASA of Passaic and Union Counties as volunteer advocates.

The need for bilingual Spanish-English CASA volunteers is more pressing than ever. Child Focus is actively seeking community members fluent in both English and Spanish to join CASA of Passaic and Union Counties. Volunteers will undergo comprehensive training to become effective advocates for children removed from their homes due to abuse or neglect. This training equips volunteers with the skills needed to navigate court proceedings, build trust with children, and collaborate with caseworkers and attorneys.

For those interested in making a difference, the first step is to attend an information session in Union County: Wed., Oct. 9th or 23rd at 5:30 p.m. at the Colleen Fraser Building at 300 North Avenue East in Westfield; Wed., Oct. 16 at noon in the Elizabeth office at 1143 East Jersey Street, 2nd FLoor.




Tours start at noon and groups leave every fifteen minutes with each tour lasting approximately two hours. Tour time reservations

TRINITY METHODIST, ORGANIZED IN 1849, REACHES 175 YEAR MILESTONE


Rahway's earliest religious congregations, which were organized even before the birth of the country, were Quakers and Presbyterians. A third religious sect, the Methodists, organized in the late 1790s and would grow to become a vibrant religious community. Trinity United Methodist Church, an offshoot of that original congregation, began its history in 1849 as a neighborhood church and will celebrate its 175th anniversary on October 27.

On May 25, 1774, Reverend William Watters rode into Rahway bringing with him the words of Methodism. The Rahway area was just one of the stops for this circuit-riding preacher who spread the tenets of the Methodist religion throughout much of the land east of the Delaware River. Several families soon embraced the gospel as taught by Watters and by 1798 there were enough followers to officially organize a congregation. In 1804 William Flatt, owner of a large carriage factory, purchased an old Quaker meeting hall located on Main Street and invited the congregation to meet there. The members accepted the invitation and began bi-monthly meetings in their new home.

By the summer of 1809, the congregation which had experienced growth over the five year period broke ground on Grand Avenue for an edifice that they would affectionately call

"Liberty Chapel". It was at this time that the church was incorporated as the Methodist Episcopal Church of Rahway, New Jersey and in time became known to locals as First Methodist.

In 1856, the congregation built a new sanctuary that would accommodate their growing programs. Their imposing building, built in the Greek revival style was constructed on the same site where their chapel had stood. Today, the sanctuary serves as home for the Family Center Christian congregation.

By the mid-1800s, Rahway's population had grown and sections of the city that had been sparsely populated became busy neighborhoods. For the Methodist families residing in the southeastern part of town, traveling to the Grand Avenue church for over forty years had always been difficult, especially during the winter months. With a larger number of members now living in the area, the families asked the church leaders at First Methodist for permission to branch off and create a new church nearer their homes. Permission was granted and the Second Methodist Episcopal Church of Rahway was established.

In 1850 the congregation moved into a small sanctuary located on the corner of Broad Street and Milton Avenue on the east side of the railroad tracks which at that time were on ground level. During the forty-two years that the church stood next to the tracks, services were constantly disrupted by the cacophony of noises from passing trains. After four decades of dealing with the noise and soot thrown from the engines, a new sanctuary was built on the corner of Main Street and Milton Avenue. At the Dedication Service on December 29, 1895, the church name was changed to Trinity Episcopal Methodist Church.

The new sanctuary was an impressive brick building designed in the Romanesque-style. Prominent features include steep roof lines with a tall main corner tower and two shorter towers on each side. The three-story entrance tower has a belfry with three arched louvered windows on each side topped by a tent roof. The shorter

towers have similar tent roofs. The huge arched stained glass windows on the south and east sides are also impressive features of this classic design.

Throughout the 20th century, the pastors and church officials remained untiring in their efforts to energize the congregation always leading it toward an active Christian life and character.

In 1930 the church dropped the word Episcopal from its name and became Trinity Methodist Church. It would keep the name until 1960 when it was changed to Trinity United Methodist Church, which remains its current name.

A large education building was erected next to the sanctuary in 1962 to support Trinity's varied youth programs many of which are ongoing to this day.

Under the leadership of current pastor Arturo Bautista, who was assigned to Trinity in 2015, the congregation has been engaged in varied mission programs designed to uplift the spiritual life of the church and nearby communities. Trinity partnered with the Elizabeth Coalition to house the homeless in 2016 and has provided overnight lodging for homeless individuals during cold winter nights. Members of the congregation regularly visit three area nursing homes where they spend time interacting with sick and elderly residents. 

RAKING LEAVES & NEW ENVIROMENTAL THEORIES

Since the end of the last World War, lawns have become a status symbol for the wealthy and upcoming middle class. No longer having to grow our own food, a lush lawn became a way of quietly saying "Look at me". For most homeowners, a lawn full of fallen leaves is unsightly and unacceptable.

Today with landfills full beyond capacity, agricultural universities, and environmental scientists are searching for better ways to utilize autumn leaves, long known to be wasted source of nutrients for our soil.

As autumn begins and the sunlight hours lessen, trees stop their food making process. The chlorophyll breaks down, the green color disappears, leaving the yellow to orange colors to become visible and give the leaves their fall splendor. Shortly after that most deciduous trees shed all their leaves. This incredible process helps trees protect themselves from damage during the harsh winter weather to come. Luckily, we get to witness to this spectacular display of color every year.

Fall is a beautiful time of year in the Northeast, but it comes with a list of chores to be done before the snow flies. Must raking leaves be one of those chores? Maybe, maybe not. If you have trees dropping leaves on your lawn grass, in many cases there is no need to incur blisters by raking them up. Leaves have nutrients, which can be recycled into your lawn. The concern is if your leaf layer is very thick and will smother the grass.

If you have just a few leaves, such as 20 percent of the lawn covered, you can just ignore them. They will blow around, settle in, and break down on their own. If you have a moderate amount of leaves, such as 50 percent coverage, you still don't need to rake. Simply run your lawn

mower over them to chop them into smaller pieces so they can settle between the grass blades where they will decompose over time and release nutrients for your lawn to use next year.

If you have a thick layer of leaves where you can barely see any signs of grass beneath them, it is best if you remove some of the leaves. This prevents matting and smothering of the grass. Rake or otherwise remove at least half of them. You don't need to get every last leaf, but if you remove a significant amount of them, then you can mow the rest up and leave them on the lawn. Those raked up leaves can be a valuable resource, and used in composting, winter mulching, or saved until spring for mulching in vegetable or flower gardens.

The one caveat (concern) to leaving tree leaves where they fall is if your trees have had serious foliar fungal diseases. While most leaf spots on leaves are cosmetic and harmless to the overall health of the tree, fallen diseased leaves do serve as a source for spores that can infect next year's emerging leaves. Significantly diseased leaves should be raked and removed from the area and disposed of properly, such as by burying, burning where allowed, or hot composting. In our area, put them in the trash, not the compost pile.

Of course, one good reason to rake up leaves is to have a pile to jump and play in! But if you only have a moderate amount of leaves on your lawn, quickly mow them up and spend your time doing the other things on your pre-winter chore list.

Caution: All foreign matter must be removed before mulching. Plastics matter will not decompose and have no nutritional value for the soil.
