



KENILWORTH'S LAST FARM BOY - PART 1

The last vast open area commercially farmed in Kenilworth was in the late 1940s. The farm itself used a large portion of land along the eastbound lane of Galloping Hill Road. It consisted of more than 100 acres. At the end of the decade the tract was sold by the Borough. Since then, the enormous site has hosted a number of major pharmaceutical corporations presently Merck.

Back in 1943, Bob Allcroft was a young, athletic, 13-year-old seventh grader at Harding School. This past spring, this then 93-year-old California resident shared his Kenilworth farm boy days with me.

"My dad and mom – Jim and Cecile – had nine children. We lived in Kenilworth in the 1930s and 1940s. My older brothers, Jim and Roger, were off fighting in WWII. Still at home with me at 572 Fairfield Ave. were my parents; my younger brother Richard; and my sisters Meriam, nicknamed Polly; Joan; and Gladys Marie, nicknamed Tucky.

"Among the girls I knew at Harding School was Louise Anderson. Her dad, Anthony Anderson, had a farm down along Galloping Hill Rd. Through her I became aware that her father was looking for farm hand help. With seven people still living at home, a few dollars here and there would help my folks with running a household and give me some very modest spending money - a little feeling of financial independence for a young teenager.

"I hiked over from our house to meet Mr. Anderson. He said to me, 'Well, you look strong enough and tall enough, and are probably smart enough not to get hurt on the job. He then asked me, 'And just how old are you did you say?""

"Without hesitation I piped up and proudly blurted out, 'I'm 13, Mr. Anderson!'" He looked at me, smiled and said, 'You're hired young feller. Gonna pay you twenty-five cents an hour and that's it. Want the job?' I didn't know exactly for what kind of farm work, but I answered, 'Yes, Mr. Anderson, I want to work."

"The farm was a good mile away as-the-crowflies from our Fairfield Ave. house. It was mostly fields. I walked down Fairfield Ave. past the Canteen Tavern on the corner of Michigan Ave.

and kept going down Fairfield and crossed the Rahway Valley Railroad tracks on Market St. right past the Lock Joint Pipe Co. Went through some fields. Then I crossed some more railroad tracks. I think the Lehigh Valley tracks. There was lots of wide-open area after that. Crossed I think two creeks and picked and ate blackberries on the way to the farm. There were lots of blackberries. There was no Garden State Parkway back then so my route was unobstructed. Twenty-five minutes did the trick. If I hustled, did it in 20."

AN UNUSUAL GOOSE REHABBED AND RELEASED

The Raptor Trust

The Brant goose, with its compact size and striking black-and-white plumage, is a remarkable bird. Adapted to drink saltwater, these geese embark on long migratory journeys from their Arctic breeding grounds to coastal winter habitats. Look for them in estuaries, mudflats, and saltmarshes, where they thrive throughout the winter months.

Recently, The Raptor Trust treated a Brant goose (Admit #21-4190) found in Long Valley with wounds from a predator attack. After intensive care, including suturing lacerations, treating an eye injury and parasites, this resilient bird was successfully released at Sandy Hook on November 2nd.

ABOUT THE RAPTOR TRUST

The Raptor Trust is a 501(c)3 non-profit organization located at 1390 White Bridge Rd., Millington, NJ. They provide free care and assistance to injured, sick, or orphaned wild birds. 
