We lose 22 veterans each day to suicide, and they leave behind grieving families. One thing our team decided to do was to have Gold Star families meet disabled veterans at our events, so they can work together and form a bond. We are honored to have veteran family members to work alongside us and know they are just as committed with helping our veterans live a better way of life.



STUDENTS HONOR HOLOCAUST REMEMBRANCE DAY

The students of the Jewish American Heritage Club, advised by Ms. Mayk, made yellow paper daffodils symbolic of the yellow star the Jews were forced to wear in Nazi Germany during the time of the Holocaust. The flowers are displayed on the Daffodil Holocaust Memorial in Heritage Middle School in honor of Holocaust Remembrance Day. This special display in our school was created in memory of the 1.5 million Jewish children murdered in the Holocaust.

In addition to the daffodil making, Harper Rothenberg, the club's founder, and Aaron Vaknansky, a contributing club member, delivered a presentation they created called "Holocaust Memorials Around the World." Together they researched Holocaust memorials in different locations, learned about them, and made an educational Google slides presentation with pictures to teach the club participants. Harper shared about the Für Das Kind Kindertransport Memorial located in Liverpool Street Station, London, the Mémorial de la Shoah, located in Paris, France, and the Memorial to the Murdered Jews of Europe in Berlin, Germany. Aaron presented about the Shoes on the Danube Bank memorial in Budapest, Hungary, the Holocaust Memorial in Miami Beach, Florida and the Holocaust

Memorial Park in Brooklyn, New York.

The Holocaust Memorial Park in Brooklyn is of special significance to Aaron since his great grandparents, Naum Feldman and Yelizaveta Pekar, on his father's maternal side, gathered donations and dedicated one of the stones at the memorial in Brooklyn. Aaron also shared with us the poetry book entitled "Tying the Unraveling Cord" that his father Eugene Vaknansky wrote in honor of his paternal grandparents, Abraham and Evgeniya Vakhnyansky, who were Holocaust survivors. Aaron brought the book with him and read the dedication page aloud to the students. It included the poem from which the title of the book was taken.

After the presentation, the students snacked on delicious sliced challah shmeared with cream cheese or butter, sponsored by Livingston Bagel.

In addition to the meaningful Daffodil Holocaust Memorial display, Ms. Mayk is planning for Heritage students to take part in The Daffodil Project by planting the starter bulbs so that Heritage Middle School will grow an actual memorial garden. This plan is in the works for the start of the upcoming school year since the bulbs must be planted in the fall.



At 10:30 a.m., Elsa Hahn of Edison will show her work and speak on "Surface Design – Making it Personal." The award-winning quilter and retired Westfield music teacher will share her firsthand knowledge of various art quilting techniques, including the pros and cons of popular methods.

Janice M. Tellier of Mountainside will be recognized as 2025's Featured Quilter. The Fashion Institute of Technology (FIT) graduate and lifelong creative spirit will display 20 plus works of original art. Of her 14 vibrant bed-sized quilts Tellier quipped, "I often think my beds are better dressed than I am."

Tellier's whimsical fiber art will be featured **TECHNOLOGY, SOCIAL MEDIA,** alongside her acrylic paintings, crochet, examples of bobbin lace making and a fascinating diorama of a miniature modern quilting studio. SINGING AT THE THRESHOLD

Garden State Threshold Choir

A choir that rehearses but does not perform. A choir that goes in a very small group to sing to one person at a time. A choir whose mission is to provide, not entertainment, but kindness and comfort, to someone who is dying. That is a Threshold Choir.

Threshold Choir is a nonprofit network of about 200 chapters across the country and abroad. And there is one right here in Whippany, NJ, called the Garden State Threshold Choir.

Founded 25 years ago, Threshold Choir singers go, by invitation, to sing at the bedside of those crossing life's challenging thresholds, especially the final threshold between living and dving.

The Garden State Threshold Choir began in 2017 when Whippany resident Judy Hahn retired, looked for a chapter to join, and, finding none nearby, started recruiting to form a new chapter. "It takes time and patience to establish a new

chapter," says Hahn. "And it takes time and patience for each singer to be ready to do this work. What we have is an incredibly dedicated and compassionate group of women."

Arriving in a group of two to four singers at a hospital, nursing facility or home, they carry folding stools and sit by the bed. "Even if the hospice patient is nonresponsive, we believe they can hear us and feel the vibrations of our harmonies," says Hahn. "For those close to the end, it is said that we are 'singing them home."

Threshold Choir has its own unique repertoire of songs, written mostly by members. The songs are simple and short, sung softly a capella, first in unison, then repeated and layered with harmonies. The lyrics speak of rest, comfort, letting go, or about peacefulness and love.

"People wonder how we can sing to a dying person," noted Cedar Knolls resident Bonnie Adams. "But to us it's an honor to be present in that sacred, intimate space. We see the breathing

relax; and when the patient is surrounded by family, the songs give voice to their feelings and help them grieve."

The Garden State chapter is accepting inquiries for membership. A singer has to be able to carry a tune, hold her own part in harmony, blend with other voices, be willing to self-monitor and accept gentle feedback, and, above all, communicate kindness with their voice. Rehearsals are held on Tuesday evenings, alternating between Zoom sessions and in-person at the First Presbyterian Church of Whippany.

Threshold Choir is a 501(c)3 nonprofit organization that honors all spiritual paths and has no religious affiliation. All of the chapter's services are free of charge.
