MADISON MASONIC LODGE PRESERVATION

County of Morris

Morris County Commissioner Deputy Director Stephen H. Shaw presented a Historic Preservation plaque to Madison Mayor Robert H. Conley on December 10, 2024, recognizing the preservation of the 200-year-old Madison Masonic Lodge.

The Federal-style brick building, supported by nearly \$700,000 in county preservation funding since 2020, will soon transition into a community hub for seniors and local organizations, ensuring its legacy endures for future generations. In 2024, the Morris County Historic Preservation Trust awarded a grant of \$562,500, which covered 50% of the total \$1.125 million acquisition cost. Previous Morris County Historic Preservation Trust grants included \$21,440 in 2020 for structural repair documents and \$107,200 in 2022 for flooring and structural restoration.

In addition to county support, substantial funding from the New Jersey Historic Trust, the Madison Open Space, Recreation, and Historic Preservation Advisory Committee, and a \$1 million donation from Madison resident Martin Heller have also enabled the project. The borough is applying most of Heller's donation towards renovation and preservation of the lodge. The building has been renamed The Heller Center, which will be home to The Peggy Heller Senior Center of Madison, to honor Heller's late wife.

"The preservation of this historic building, which dates back to 1825, was made possible through the collaboration between the county, the town and the generosity of Mr. Heller to preserve a piece of Morris County's history. Since 2003, our renowned preservation program has awarded more than \$50 million in grants, supporting 123 buildings and structures across the county. This success is made possible by the taxpayers, who consistently demonstrated their commitment to open space and historic for centuries to come. preservation," said Deputy Director Shaw.

Madison Masonic Lodge

Madison. The building combines elements of Wren-Gibbs Classical and Federalist architecture and was listed on the New Jersey and National Registers of Historic Places in 2008.

In 1930, the church sold the property to Madison Lodge No. 93, Free & Accepted Masons, who maintained the building's exterior while remodeling the interior. The Borough of Madison acquired the property in December 2023, supported by Heller's \$1 million donation.

"The Masons did an amazing job taking care of this building for 90 years, but they could no longer maintain it. It could have been sold to a developer for more money, but they chose to be part of a group committed to saving it. Madison was figuring out how to make this happen, when Martin Heller's \$1 million gift turned this vision into reality," said Mayor Conley.

Planned rehabilitation includes ADA accessibility improvements, LEED certification funded by a New Jersey Board of Public Utilities grant, and electrification of the building. The 12-to-16-month project ensures the building remains a community asset for generations.

According to the mayor, a 200th anniversary celebration is in the works for this May, and Madison plans to restore the building so it will be here

A plaque on the building will honor Heller's late son: "In Honor of Mark View Photos from the Dedication Ceremony at Heller, February 1, 1960 - January 17, 2023 - His Spirit Lives On."





ROBOTIC COMPANION PETS DISBURSED TO HOMEBOUND RESIDENTS

Morris County

The Morris County Office of Aging, Disabilities, and Community Programming (ADCP) reminds residents of the importance of supporting the senior community and ensuring they feel connected, valued, and cared for during this special time of year.

The ADCP office provided more than 110 "Joy for All" robotic companion pets to qualifying residents and facilities across the county as part of an initiative aimed at alleviating social isolation, loneliness, and cognitive decline among seniors.

The program, which was funded by the Aging American Rescue Plan, allocated 20 robotic companion pets to the Morris County Sheriff's Office, which distributed them to clients enrolled in its Project Lifesaver program. Additionally, 12 pets were donated to the Cornerstone Adult Day Center and each of the county's 12 nutrition sites "adopted a pet" to keep onsite. 40 pets were distributed through the Nutrition Home Delivered Meals program, and Hope House will distribute another 25 pets.

"When addressing social isolation and dementia care, we wanted something creative approach. The "Joy for All" companion pets have been the focus of rigorous, peer-reviewed studies demonstrating their efficacy to alleviate the many of the effects of loneliness and social isolation," said Christine Hellyer, Christine Hellyer, Director of the ADCP office. "The partnership with the

Sheriff's Office to distribute the pets was an emphasized the importance of this program. essential component of this program. In total, about 120 companion pets were provided to seniors or senior programs that could benefit from them."

To qualify for a companion pet, recipients must be at least 60 years of age, homebound, and either socially isolated or experiencing dementia or a similar cognitive condition. Designed to mimic real pets, the "Joy for All" animals aim to provide companionship and comfort for those unable to care for live animals.

Sheriff Gannon, who joined in delivering a companion pet to a Project Lifesaver client,

"Anytime the Sheriff's Office can provide comfort to those in need, we are going to do it. This simple act of support provides aid to those who are homebound," said Gannon. "We look forward to seeing the tremendous benefits of this program being passed on to a sometimes forgotten population in our community."

The pets respond to motion and touch: the cats will roll over and purr, while the dogs bark and wag their tails. The pets do not come with names, allowing recipients the personal experience of naming their new robotic dog or cat, which they are welcome to keep for as long as they wish.

NEW CRICKET FIELDS AT LEWIS MORRIS PARK

County of Morris

Commissioners joined the Morris County Park Commission and local leaders at Lewis Morris County Park on October 16th to dedicate two new cricket fields in honor of Russell W. Myers, Commission.

The ribbon-cutting ceremony marked a significant milestone in accommodating the growing popularity of cricket within the county. Among those joining the event were state Sen. Joe Pennachio (Morris-26), state Sen. Anthony Bucco (Morris-25), Mayor James Barberio of Parsippany-Troy Hills, Sheriff James M. Gannon and representatives of the New Jersey Softball Cricket League. Cricket players from the league, including members of Teams Titans XL and Parsippany Sports Cricket XL, showcased their skills at the event.

The project's roots go back several years, when the growing Indian American community in Parsippany Township began searching for more places to play cricket, a popular sport in Britain, India, and many other places around the world. Sen. Pennacchio and Mayor Barberio took up the search, approaching Executive Director Dave Helmer of the Park Commission, which has been accommodating cricket team games for years on picnic grounds.

The Morris County Board of County The Morris County Board of County Commissioners stepped in last year and agreed to finance development of two cricket fields at Lewis Morris Park when the Park Commission identified an open field area.

The dedication honored the late Russell W. the first Director of the Morris County Park Myers, who served as Director of the Morris County Park Commission from 1957 to 1983. Under his leadership, the park system expanded dramatically, and his legacy continues to shape Morris County's recreational spaces today.

> The newly developed cricket grounds, located in the Russell W. Myers Recreation Area, will serve as a dedicated space for cricket beginning in spring 2025. Cricketers will need to schedule use of the fields through the Park Commission.

> The two fields are tailored for the softball version of cricket. The site, previously used for overflow parking, is located close to restroom facilities in the park and has ample parking onsite and nearby.

> Lewis Morris County Park, established in 1958 as the county's first park, has grown from 350 acres to 2,213 acres, making it the secondlargest park in the Morris County system. Address is 270 Mendham Rd, Morristown.

In Flew Enza: The 1918 Flu Epidemic in **Philadelphia and South Jersey**




SUMMIT MAYOR ELIZABETH FAGAN
