

Rahway High School sophomore Katelyn then all day on Saturday. Maglione, a flutist, recently performed with the Kean University Honors Band. The weekend event cu


Maglione was nominated for this prestigious honor by RHS band director Ms. Meg Spatz.





DEUTSCHER CLUB HAD ROOTS IN RAHWAY

The 1937 City Directory gave Rahway's population as 17,500 and noted that the predominating nationalities of foreign born residents were Irish and German. This is not surprising, as from the earliest days in Rahway, going back to colonial times, newcomers from various countries including Germany were settling here. As the numbers of these groups increased and as time passed, their progeny became vibrant additions to the community and by the late 1800s nearly every ethnic group had established religious, business, and social institutions of their own. The Deutscher Club was started by Rahway citizens of German-American ancestry in 1935 and records indicate that another German club was actually organized 40 years earlier in 1895.

Throughout the history of our nation, emigrants came to this country looking for a better life. The German population in Rahway grew in the early and mid-1800s as emigrants came to the city to work in the carriage industry taking on jobs as carpenters, painters, blacksmiths, wheelwrights, and upholsterers. In the later years of the 1800s, at the height of emigration to America during the industrial revolution, large groups of German artisans came to the city to work in its many factories. Most of the workers at Gustave Brachausen's Regina Music Box factory were from Germany.

Once here, these new arrivals would seek family or friends whose backgrounds were similar. People have an affinity towards keeping together where they can feel a part of something and can share the traditions that make up their very beings. As the number of countrymen increased, it was natural that institutions were established to serve their needs. In 1852, German-Americans organized a Lutheran Church. St. Mark's Church, built in 1870, was a parish established for German Catholics. A German Presbyterian congregation was also formed. German owned shops became common throughout the city where families could feel more comfortable doing business. Hedeman's Bakery, Baumgartner's Deli, Feitz' Barber shop, Schupman's Market, and Kessling's Saloon were a sample of the names seen on signs that hung from store fronts.

After a long day toiling in factories and stores, it would not be surprising to find workers stopping in at a local tavern for a bit of libation before heading home. German workers might have frequented the tavern of fellow countryman August Giebelhaus located on the corner of Main Street and Elizabeth Avenue. Perhaps it was there that discussions about forming a German social club might have begun.

Newspaper accounts covering 1895-1905 indicate that a group of men of German ancestry organized Club Unter Uns in the fall of 1895 which had elected officers, regular scheduled meetings, and a program of social activities. The name loosely means "Our Club" or "Among Us" or "Between you and me and the gatepost." The club hosted picnics, masquerade balls, clambakes, and Christmas parties. Their larger

social gatherings were held at Turn Hall located on the SE corner of Milton Avenue and Fulton Street. For whatever reason, Club Unter Uns must have disbanded as there are no articles that mention meetings or activities after 1905.

Interest in organizing another German club was growing by the 1930s, perhaps again as men gathered in establishments like Gruenwald's Deli on Irving Street where they could reminisce about their lives back in the old country. The sense of kinship that grew out of these impromptu gatherings led to the formation of the Rahway Deutscher Club. The first meeting was held at Greven's Hotel on West Cherry Street on Friday, September 27, 1935. The 25 men in attendance, elected Karl Kummer as their first president. The club's mission was to foster and provide cultural and social endeavors for German-American citizens both old and young.

By 1940, now with a membership of over 150, the club moved from Greven's into the larger Eagles Hall on Grand Avenue where they would meet for the next ten years. Like club Unter Uns, the Deutscher Club hosted all manner of social events including picnics, bus trips, song fests, card parties, movie nights, dances, and Christmas and New Year's Eve parties. Their biggest and most popular event was the annual vintage festival which was modeled after the Grape Harvest Festivals held in the Rhine wine land section of Germany. The festival offered a full

day of singing German folk songs, dancing, and entertainment.

Membership in the club continued to grow and with a membership of 350 they once again had to look for larger quarters. They would find a home of their own in November 1950 when they purchased a 3 ¹/₂ acre site in Clark. Members who surveyed the property felt the rural expanse covered with beautiful trees and tall bushes reminded them of their homeland. They called it their "Waldeslust," their "Forest of Joy."

The club, which became the Deutscher Club of Clark after the move, reaches its 90th anniversary in 2025.

LENTEN ROSE (HELLEBORES)

Hellebores, commonly known as Lenten Rose of the sepals is often green-tinged, and most is a group of about 20 plants that are native to the Mediterranean and Baltic regions. They were called Lenten Rose because they bloom in late winter and spring.

If you are one of the gardeners that love to lift, move and transplant your plants, then Lenten Rose may not for you. Hellebores take a very long time to establish themselves after being planted. When planting one in your garden put them in a spot that they can stay for up to twenty years and both you and your Lenten Rose will be happy.

Lenten rose is hardy from Zone 9 to Zone 5 and colder areas when plants have winter protection such as good snow cover.

Mature plants can form clumps that are 18" to 24" tall and 24" to 30" wide. The glossy, deep green foliage can be quite variable in color and shape. The toothed, leathery foliage remains attractive throughout the growing season, remaining evergreen in mild climates and even persisting under snow, but decline over the winter.

Flower buds form during the previous summer, with the distinctive, 1-2" wide, longlasting flowers blooming in early spring with daffodils and tulips. Mature plants often have 50 or more flowers per plant. Blooms make good cut flowers and their seed heads add interest in dried arrangements.

Flowers of hellebore come in a rainbow of colors in both single and double forms. Flower's color ranges from pure white to a plum color bordering on black, with clear red, pink, yellow, green or cream; others speckled, spotted and mottled on the inside of the flower. The outside

flowers become greener as they age.

Lenten roses are an outstanding combination plant for adding color, texture, and habit to the ornamental shade garden, in areas between deciduous shrubs and under trees, or naturalized in woodland areas. Lenten rose combines well with other spring-blooming perennials. Later in the season the foliage provides a nice backdrop for hostas and other shade perennials. They are also excellent for planting on a hillside above a path where the downward-facing flowers can be viewed from below.

They are relatively drought tolerant once established but do best with consistent moisture. They are very sensitive to soggy soil, so the site must have good drainage. This plant requires little maintenance. The previous season's leaves will be dried and tattered after the winter and are best cut off at the ground as the flowers emerge in the spring. Fertilize in early spring, and mulch in winter in colder areas.

Hellebores have alkaloids in the leaves and seeds that can cause mild dermatitis in sensitive individuals, so gardeners should wear gloves when exposure might occur. These same alkaloids make the leaves undesirable to deer and rabbits, but slugs like their flowers. My gardening friends avoid planting them around pets.

RAHWAY ENACTS NEW TREE ORDINANCE

SPRING BEGINS THURSDAY MARCH 20TH AT 5:01 AM

On July 8, 2024 the Rahway City Council voted to adopt new tree regulations to 'preserve and protect trees within the

City of Rahway'. This ordinance includes the trees on your private property.

'City trees' can only be removed by the Rahway Department of Public Works (DPW). If you have a concern about a street tree on your property line or a tree on city land, call Rahway submitted to the City Engineer's office. The DPW * and they will send an inspector to look at it. This regulation has not changed.

The City of Rahway has found that the indiscriminate and excessive cutting of trees causes increased surface water runoff and soil erosion which adversely impacts the general welfare of the inhabitants of Rahway. This causes increased municipal costs to control the drainage within the city.

Therefore, tree removal on private property is

prohibited unless a Tree Removal Application with the appropriate fee is submitted and approved by the OFFICE OF THE CITY ENGINEER.

Rahway's City Engineer office is located in City Hall.**

If your tree is a Hazard Tree, a report must be filled out by a licensed tree expert and cost of this report is the responsibility of the property owner.

Enforcement of these provisions shall be performed by the Department of Engineering and Land Use during the course of ordinary enforcement duties.


