GROW YOUR RPFD GIFT 400 TOYS & 200 CLOTHING ITEMS FOR HOLIDAYS


Roselle Park Fire Department

STATE GRANT FOR IMPROVEMENTS TO PERSHING AVENUE

Borough of Roselle Park

Borough of Roselle Park, with state officials confirming \$374,868 in municipal aid for improvements to Pershing Avenue. The upcoming project will include enhancements to the pedestrian, roadway, and storm drainage infrastructure spanning from Westfield Avenue to East Clay Avenue.


"Each year we're getting through more of the infrastructure backlog I inherited seven years ago," explained Mayor Joseph Signorello III. "We're repaying and improving pedestrian connections at a faster pace by finding outside sources of funding like these."

New storm drains are included in the project, The year is off to a strong start for the converting the existing ones to a newer style that prevents floatable debris from entering the stormwater system, and is safer for pedestrian and cyclist traffic. Sidewalks that have become uneven over time will be repaired, and new ADA curb ramps will be constructed.

"In preparation for warmer weather, our professionals are preparing specifications for the bidding process," said Borough Administrator Andrew J. Casais. "Once drafting is complete, specifications will be sent to NJDOT for review and required by the grant agreement. Once approved by the Department, we will proceed to bid, award, and commence the project."




(above) A dilapidated storm drain along Pershing Ave. that will be upgraded to a bicycle safe one that prevents debris from entering the system.



The Hannah and James Caldwell Memorial Obelisk recently underwent a complete restoration and cleaning at the Siloam-Hope First Presbyterian Church (formerly known as the First Presbyterian Church of Elizabethtown) in Elizabeth thanks to the Union County Historical Society (UCHS).

UCHS President Joanne Rajoppi said, "The 179-year-old obelisk honoring Revolutionary War pastor and patriot James Caldwell and his wife Hannah, was in terrible condition: encrusted dirt from years of neglect with loose mortar and unreadable engravings. As we approach the 250th anniversary of our country, what better time to reflect, remember and honor the contributions of our patriots, especially the Caldwells, who sacrificed their lives for independence."

The Siloam-Hope First Presbyterian Church cemetery is one of the oldest in the state, dating to the late 1680s. More than 40 officers of the partially funded by a Union County Heart Grant,

Continental Army are buried there, many of whom attended the church while Reverend Caldwell served as its pastor. Caldwell also served as General George Washington's Deputy Commissary of supplies during the war. The British placed a bounty on his head and he was murdered in 1781. His wife Hannah and mother of their nine children had been murdered the previous year by a British soldier in the aftermath of the Battle of Connecticut Farms.

There are also more than 313 enslaved and free African Americans buried in the historic cemetery, often in unmarked graves: some are children, and some are likely war veterans. The 313+ Ancestors Speak Project acknowledges and commemorates their lives and burials. A monument with their names was recently erected in the cemetery.

The restoration of the Caldwell memorial was



donations by the Union Township Historical Society, the NJ Society of the Sons of the American Revolution, (NJSAR), the West Fields Chapter of SAR, American Legion Post 248, the First Presbyterian Church of Springfield and many individual contributors.

Ms. Rajoppi said that the restoration included a workshop on how to clean gravestones.

Volunteers, including local area Boy Scouts, the Crane's Ford Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution and UCHS members attended the four-hour event.

The restoration work was completed by Richard Grubb & Associates, a full-service cultural resource management firm and one of the largest, independent archaeological and historic preservation consulting companies in the eastern United States. Their corporate headquarters are in Cranbury, New Jersey.

ABOUT THE UNION COUNTY HISTORICAL SOCIETY OF NEW JERSEY

The UCHS was incorporated by an Act of the 93rd Legislature of the State of New Jersey on April 1, 1869. The objective of this Society is the collection and preservation of all matter of historical relics, books, records, documents, and manuscripts, to stimulate and encourage historical research and the study of history pertaining to the territory originally embraced by Elizabethtown and the present Union County.

The Society exists through the help and generosity of its members. Membership is comprised of citizens who have a common interest in preserving the past. There is no paid staff. The Executive Board and Members perform all Society functions.
