FIVE RESIDENTS SWORN IN TO ADVOCATE FOR CHILDREN

Court Appointed

Special Advocates

FOR CHILDREN

PASSAIC AND UNION

Union County Superior Court Judge Gavin I. Handwerker presided over the swearing-in of 12 volunteers who trained with Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) of Passaic and Union Counties to advocate for vulnerable children in foster care on Thursday, Feb. 13, 2025. Among them are Westfield's Sharon Dorry, Mary Louise Kandigian, Tara McGroddy, Cecilia Nicholas, and Dalida Nigro.

Classmates include Michelle Conway of Cranford, Patricia Joffe of Mountainside, Byron Ruales-Correa of Orange, and Juliette Abadir and James Pritchett of Scotch Plains. Now equipped to champion the best interests of child victims of abuse and neglect, the

volunteers join a team of hundreds of devoted advocates with CASA of Passaic and Union Counties who provide lifechanging advocacy and support services to each of the more than 350 children across both counties living in foster care through no fault of their own.

Each were asked about their goals as a CASA volunteer, and training experience. Said Nicholas, "I hope to contribute to making things better for the children," then offered advice for those considering the CASA volunteer role but unsure: "Just do it!" Dorry agreed, adding her need "to give back, to impact and advocate for kids at a time in their lives when they need it most. I've heard about too many kids who fall through the cracks." Kandigian said she was inspired to become a CASA volunteer to "make the life of a child or children more stable and pleasant by being a caring, adult presence." Said Nigro, being an advocate "is going to be so rewarding that [the classes are] worth the effort. I hope to help the child feel

someone is truly looking out for them." McGroddy noted she's excited to be assigned a case, as training was "interesting and informative with real-life stories that gave me perspective."

"These 12 community members have made an invaluable commitment to ensure every child's voice is heard and valued. We are proud to welcome them as Court Appointed Special Advocates," said Erica Fischer-Kaslander, Executive Director of Child Focus, the nonprofit organization that oversees the CASA program. "Each volunteer brings unique perspectives and strengths that will impact the lives of those who need it most. I encourage anyone interested in

supporting vulnerable children to attend an information session to learn how they, too, can make a difference as a child advocate."

No prior knowledge of child welfare is required to become a CASA volunteer; comprehensive training equips volunteers with the skills necessary to advocate effectively. Volunteer advocates visit their assigned child at least once monthly and communicate with caregivers, educators, caseworkers, and others in the child's life to make informed recommendations to the judge.

CASA of Passaic and Union Counties is a program of Child Focus, which prioritizes the needs and well-being of infants, children, and teens impacted by, or at risk of, abuse or neglect.


Music for All is a non-profit, Indianapolisbased advocate for music and arts education.







ST. JOSEPH SOCIAL SERVICE CENTER DEDICATES RENOVATED MAIN HALL

The St. Joseph's community, including residents from Elizabeth and volunteers and supporters from five counties in New Jersey, came together on February 8 to celebrate the renovation of the Main Hall on its campus. The Hall is the main building at the agency, used to provide a wide array of social services to residents in need in Elizabeth. The renovated Main Hall includes new private offices for mental health counseling and case management services, new facilities for the soup kitchen program, new spaces for the Adult Learning Center and health and nutrition workshops and diagnostic testing, and a reception area where residents can obtain information about agency programs and community services. Karen Maher, President of the Board of Trustees, noted that these new spaces have "allowed the agency to expand services to the community, particularly in the areas of physical and behavioral health."

The renovation of the Main Hall marks the successful completion of a comprehensive facilities improvement plan for the agency. From principal objectives of this plan have been to 1) enhance and expand services to families and children in need in Elizabeth; and 2) offer services in an environment with greater dignity. "Dignity has been a core value of the agency since our founding in 1986," noted Bernadette Murphy, Executive Director. "Our goal is to help people acquire the material items they need to live with dignity. We believe that it is vital for our clients to receive food, clothing, supplies and support services in an environment that fosters dignity, where individuals experiencing poverty and homelessness are truly welcomed as sisters and brothers."

The renovations have created new spaces to serve the needs of Elizabeth residents more effectively. The private offices for counseling and case management, for example, now allow staff to speak with residents in confidence about mental and physical health issues, family dynamics and personal trauma. The Adult Learning Center now has a dedicated space for English as a Second Language classes and for

the initial planning phase five years ago, the work skills training sessions. Community healthcare partners have state of the art spaces to test and diagnose residents on health issues. There is now adequate space to offer health, nutrition and wellness workshops. The soup kitchen now has new equipment and better workflow to serve food. And the reception desk finally gives the agency a central place for residents to come to access agency and community partner resources. All of these spaces have allowed the agency to improve and expand

> Guests at the dedication included contributors to the \$1.6 million capital campaign to finance the renovations, community leaders in Elizabeth and Union County, agency volunteers and partners and residents of the local neighborhood. As part of the dedication program, soup kitchen volunteers convened to recognize the founders of the agency by naming the new soup kitchen the "Founders Kitchen" in the Main Hall. Remarkably, the soup kitchen has served guests every single Saturday for 2025 weeks without interruption since the agency was established. Founder and longtime Executive Director of the agency, Sister Jacinta Fernandes, traveled from her community in Maryland to attend the dedication. All in attendance toured the Founders Kitchen and other renovated spaces in the Main Hall and participated in a moving dedication ceremony.

> Six days a week a dedicated team of more than 6,000 volunteers from Elizabeth, Union, Clark, Westfield, Cranford, Mountainside and dozens of other communities, make sandwiches for the hungry in their kitchens, bring food, clothing and home goods, serve meals at the soup kitchen and help with the operations of the agency. St. Joseph's serves over 3,500 individuals annually. The organization helps Elizabeth residents access food, medicine, mental health counseling, adult education, clothing and a myriad of additional healthcare and support services.






