





STUDENTS TAKE ON NJ STUDENT CLIMATE CHALLENGE

Warren Township Schools

Students at Warren Middle School are taking action in the fight against climate change by participating in the New Jersey Student Climate Challenge. Under the guidance of Student Government Association (SGA) advisors Lisa Lontai and Laura Colantoni, the students are taking on an ambitious stormwater management project that aims to make a meaningful environmental impact.

The students are focused on constructing rain barrels, creating rain gardens, and educating the community about effective stormwater management practices. These initiatives not only help reduce flooding and pollution but also enhance local water conservation efforts and promote environmental stewardship within the community.

To amplify the impact of their project, the SGA advisors brought in representatives from the Township and PSE&G to collaborate directly with the students. Their expertise and insights have empowered the students with real-world knowledge and strategic direction, transforming their ideas into practical, high-impact solutions that drive meaningful change.

The students' work is part of their submission for the NJ Student Climate Challenge, a statewide competition that encourages young people to develop innovative solutions to environmental challenges. By focusing on stormwater management, the Warren Middle School SGA addresses a critical issue affecting the local and global environment.

"As SGA advisors, Ms. Colantoni and I feel that it is important to make our students aware of issues in the school or community. The New Jersey student climate challenge provided a great way for our students to identify a local issue and help create solutions. This project is a pre-cursor to the district Capstone project and we hope it excites our students to become more involved locally and develop Capstone projects that will provide innovative solutions to issues that we all face." - Lisa Lontai

The initiative also includes an educational component, with students planning workshops and informational sessions to raise awareness about stormwater management and its role in mitigating climate change. By engaging the community, they aim to inspire others to take action and contribute to a more sustainable future

By participating in programs such as the New Jersey Student Climate Challenge, the students gain hands-on experience in problem-solving and leadership, proving that age is no barrier to making an impact. Their passion and commitment are driving real change, inspiring others to take responsibility for the planet's future.

STUDENTS PRESENT "IMMIGRATION DAY"

Warren Township Schools

Third-grade students at Woodland Elementary School have created visual presentations and prepared speeches about where they come from in a meaningful and engaging way that explored their cultural backgrounds, family histories, and personal identities. Some presentations included family photos, maps, flags, or drawings of significant places and events. This approach allowed the students to take ownership of their learning while fostering creativity and research skills.

In addition to the visual component, the speeches helped students develop confidence in public speaking and storytelling. Their speeches included historical facts or family traditions. They practiced organizing their thoughts and expressing themselves clearly. This activity also encourages active listening and cultural appreciation among classmates as they learn about diverse backgrounds and experiences.

Third-grade teacher Melanie Morales says, "Students are given the task of finding an immigrant whether it's a family member, family friend, neighbor, friend, etc. They then interview the interviewee using a set of questions that we provide to them. They create tri-fold boards where they research all about the country the immigrant has come from. Including topics like the continent the country is in, important food, holidays, sports, and clothing from the country.

They then construct the tri-fold board, and then the last step of the project is to take their interview questions and create a speech about that person's life and experiences! This whole process takes about 2 1/2 months from first introducing and talking about immigration and Ellis Island to give them more knowledge on how people immigrate and there are different forms of immigration."

For some of the students, the presentations became even more special as the people they were doing their presentations on were invited to attend and witness their storytelling. Parents, grandparents, friends, and other relatives watched as the children shared their stories about their journey to America, recounting stories of immigration, new beginnings, and the challenges their ancestors faced. Some students spoke about relatives who traveled across oceans or borders in search of opportunity.

Overall, this project not only strengthens communication and presentation skills but also promotes a deeper understanding of identity and community in a supportive classroom environment.

Woodland School Principal Jeffery Heaney says, "This is always one of my favorite events at Woodland School. It truly helps to promote the message that while we all come from different backgrounds, we ALL belong at Woodland School, and we all celebrate our differences!"

GRANT FUNDING FOR THE RESTORATION OF THE MT. BETHEL MEETING HOUSE

\$524,115 grant from the New Jersey Historic Trust as part of the COVID-19 Relief Grant for Historic Properties program. This funding will support the continued restoration of the historic Mt. Bethel Meeting House, ensuring the preservation of one of Warren's most cherished landmarks.

"We are thrilled to receive this significant grant from the New Jersey Historic Trust," said Mayor Lisa Lontai. "The Mt. Bethel Meeting House is a vital part of our township's history, and this funding will allow us to continue our efforts to restore and preserve it for generations to come."

The Mt. Bethel Meeting House, originally built in 1761, is one of Warren's oldest surviving structures and holds deep historical and cultural significance for the community. The restoration efforts, which have been ongoing for several years, aim to stabilize and rehabilitate the building while maintaining its historical integrity.

Deputy Mayor Daniel Croson, who serves as the liaison to Warren's Historic Sites Committee, emphasized the importance of this restoration project. "The Mt. Bethel Meeting House is a symbol of Warren's rich heritage. This grant will allow us to continue making necessary improvements while ensuring that the site remains a historical treasure for our residents."

Greg Fitzgerald, Chair of the Warren Historic Sites Committee, expressed gratitude for the

Warren Township has been awarded a funding and its impact on local preservation efforts. "We greatly appreciate the support from the New Jersey Historic Trust and look forward to advancing this critical restoration work. The Mt. Bethel Meeting House is one of the best examples of a building of its type in New Jersey, and this grant will allow us to complete our current long-term preservation plan."

> Warren had previously received funding from the Trust to rebuild the stone retaining wall along King George Road and to regrade the front lawn to manage water runoff and protect the building's foundation. This additional grant will allow the township to rebuild the historic wall on the Mountainview Road side of the property, upgrade the electrical system, and restore the building's interior to accurately reflect the early 1800s.

> The COVID-19 Relief Grant for Historic Properties was established to provide additional funding for previous grantees impacted by rising inflation since the pandemic, ensuring that preservation projects can be completed despite rising costs of labor and material. The Mt. Bethel Meeting House restoration project aligns with Warren Township's commitment to maintaining its historic sites and fostering community appreciation for local history.



ARIN HARKAWAT SPARKS CHANGE

Arin Harkawat, a senior at Watchung Hills Regional High School, is an environmental advocate who recently sparked change on 1,4-Dioxane Contamination.

The journey into environmental advocacy for Arin began with a poignant encounter at an environmental conference. While networking with speakers and attendees, Arin Harkawat, who grew up in Warren, was inspired by a man's heartfelt concerns over the deteriorating quality of his local waterways and tap water. This conversation prompted a deep dive into reports detailing toxic compounds in New Jersey's waterways, with one standing out repeatedly: 1,4-Dioxane. This chemical, commonly found in personal care products like shampoos and cosmetics, poses significant risks to human health, including potential liver and kidney damage, or even death. Alarmingly, New Jersey had no regulations addressing its presence. Recognizing the potential for severe environmental and health consequences, Harkawat resolved to act.

WHY 1,4-DIOXANE?

The decision to focus on 1,4-Dioxane was strategic. New York enacted regulations on the chemical in 2023, creating momentum for addressing this issue. The Environmental Justice Coalition, the campaign led by Catherine Callinan and Arin Harkawat and sponsored by Senator Raj Mukherji, decided to build on that progress in New Jersey, a state known for its environmental consciousness. Tackling 1,4-Dioxane served as a manageable first step, with hopes of expanding efforts to address broader concerns like lead contamination in the future.

RESEARCH AND RESOURCES

Harkawat's campaign was rooted in extensive research. He pored over scientific studies, regulatory reports from agencies such as the EPA and the Agency for Toxic Substances and Disease Registry, and details of New York's legislation. Additionally, he leveraged a network of environmental leaders, professors, and members of the American Public Health Association's Environmental & Environmental Justice Committee. This network provided valuable insights, ensuring the campaign was informed and strategic.

MENTORSHIP AND GUIDANCE

Mentorship played a crucial role in shaping the advocate's approach. He drew inspiration and guidance from Dr. Natalie Sampson at the University of Michigan, who advised on growing the campaign. Other mentors from his summer internship with the Children's Environmental Health Network offered support on policy framing and legislative engagement. These experiences provided the tools needed to navigate complex advocacy efforts effectively.

ENGAGING LEGISLATORS

Interacting with legislators proved to be a key learning opportunity. Harkawat emphasized the importance of presenting well-researched, clear, and relatable arguments. Legislators sometimes lack expertise in specific environmental issues, making it critical to convey the urgency and practicality of proposed solutions in an accessible manner. This skill proved vital in gaining legislative support.

IMPACT ON CAREER AND FUTURE PLANS

The experience of pushing for a 1,4-Dioxane regulation has deeply influenced the advocate's career aspirations. It enhanced his understanding of environmental justice, policy development, and effective advocacy. Harkawat expressed a commitment to continuing this work by address-

ing water quality issues, particularly in marginalized communities, and expanding his focus to other environmental challenges. He aims to measure the impact of their efforts and collaborate with others to drive meaningful change.

OVERCOMING CHALLENGES

Persuading legislators to prioritize 1,4-Dioxane contamination was not without challenges. Harkawat noted that the real hurdle lay in fostering understanding and care for the issue. Identifying and working with the right legislators who shared his vision was critical to making progress. The advocate addressed these challenges by framing the issue as both urgent and solvable, emphasizing its long-term environmental and public health benefits.

MAKING COMPLEX SCIENCE ACCESSIBLE

One of the campaign's successes was simplifying complex scientific information about 1,4-Dioxane to engage a broader audience. Collaborating with peers and asking clarifying questions helped distill the issue into clear and actionable messages. By using human connections and storytelling, he was able to make the topic accessible to diverse audiences.

BALANCING ADVOCACY AND ACADEMICS

Balancing advocacy efforts with academic responsibilities required careful time management and dedication. Much of the advocacy work was done over the summer, allowing him to focus on his studies during the academic year. He acknowledged the importance of resilience, accepting setbacks, and finding motivation in the impact his work could have on others.

VISION FOR THE FUTURE

Looking ahead, Harkawat envisions a future where environmental justice is prioritized in underserved areas. He plans to expand his advocacy efforts, tackle new environmental challenges, and continue pushing for impactful legislation. His ultimate goal is to ensure cleaner waterways and healthier communities, proving that change starts with a single voice and the determination to make a difference.
