The second prize winners are Ryan Haberman and Aidan Buneta, who composed Dreams together; they are seniors at Hanover Park Regional High School.

Artistic Director Dr. Anne Matlack says, "I am in awe of the talent of our student composers and thrilled to be supporting them for 28 years. I am especially happy that we received permission from noted poet Oscar Gonzalez to offer his poem Centroamérica en el corazón to the composers and that it is the winning piece.

MORE ABOUT THE STUDENT COMPOSERS:

First prize winner Gabriel Tarrow is a junior at Columbia High School in Maplewood. He has been playing the piano for more than eleven years and composing for ten. He loves choir and choral music and has attended several summer music camps. He draws inspiration from Baroque and modern choral music. Gabriel's sponsor is choral teacher Nicholas Diaz.

This is Gabe's third time winning the contest. He won as a freshman with Wind using text by Harlem Renaissance poet Gwendolyn Bennett. Last year he was runner-up and set a text by Morristown High School poet Hanna Cochran. This time he used text in Spanish by poet Oscar Gonzalez. Gabriel's piece is entitled Buscándote and will be performed by the full chorus at this concert.

The second place winning piece was a collaborative effort by Ryan Haberman and Aidan Buneta who worked on it during their AP Music Theory class. They thank their teacher Mr. Hine for his valuable guidance throughout this project.


MEET THE COMPOSER




dency requirements for membership, although most members happen to live within 20 miles of New Providence, NJ, which is in Union County.


FOUR DECADES OF **MUSICAL MAGIC**

MEMORIAL DAY: A TIME FOR REFLECTION AND ACTION

As a veteran, I look forward to marching in a parade and attending a BBQ. However, before the festivities begin, I make it a point to check in on fellow veterans and ensure they are in a good place. For some veterans, Memorial Day is a difficult day, and they could use some reassurance from a friend or comrade.

For too long, our military members and veterans have been facing a heartbreaking crisis. A new study suggests that 44 veterans and servicemembers take their lives every day. This has become a nationwide epidemic, and countless families are struggling with this issue alone. 


