Literacy New Jersey

A student and volunteer from Literacy NJ Union County, Xiomara Fuentes of Elizabeth and her longtime tutor, Lorraine Gilbert, of Cherry Hill were recognized at the 2025 Literacy for Life Conference for their extraordinary partnership and commitment to adult education. Xiomara received the Award for Student Excellence, and Lorraine was honored with the Award for Volunteer Excellence at the May 2 conference held at The College of New Jersey.

Xiomara, originally from Honduras, came to Literacy NJ in 2020 with limited formal education beyond sixth grade. Determined to improve her English and earn her high school diploma, she began attending ESL classes with Lorraine Gilbert. The two quickly formed a strong bond, and Lorraine continued to support Xiomara through each step of her learning journey, from mastering English to preparing for and completing the GED.

After progressing through ESL and pre-GED classes, and with the help of additional GED tutors, Xiomara passed all her subject exams in September 2024 and received her high school diploma. She has since enrolled at Union College of Union County, NJ to pursue a degree in business administration and continues to build job and digital literacy skills through Literacy NJ. "When I learned I had passed the tests, I cried," said Xiomara. "I realized how far I had come. I

felt free to find a better job, and continue my education."

Lorraine, who began tutoring with Literacy NJ in 2020, was instrumental in guiding Xiomara from her earliest classes to her GED success. Her commitment to supporting students through challenging times-including the height of the COVID-19 pandemic—has helped many learners access additional programs and pursue ambitious goals.

In reflecting on their four-year journey together, Lorraine shared: "We were a team, and we were on a mission. I've never known such a person as Xiomara. She is an inspiration to me and a role model to her children."

The Literacy for Life Conference also recognized several other award recipients, including volunteer and student honorees from Literacy Volunteers of Camden County and Literacy NJ Gloucester, as well as the Outstanding Affiliate Award presented to Literacy Volunteers of Somerset County.

Literacy NJ's statewide network provides free instruction in reading, writing, math, and English to over 5,000 adults annually, with the support of more than 1,300 volunteers. Services include one-on-one tutoring and classes in ESL, high school equivalency, and U.S. citizenship.

To honor their beloved husband, son, and father, they chose to dedicate the Volcano Room as "Fred's Room." The event happened on the fifth anniversary of Fred DeJesus' death at just 38 years old. Fred's wife Suzanne, and their daughters led the family in a heartfelt dedication ceremony.

"We know that Fred is watching over us, front row for every dance recital, Girl Scout event, and school performance," Suzanne shared. "He's still cheering us on, asking, 'How did it go, kiddo? I know you hit it out of the park.""

Spaces like Fred's Room are made possible by families who want to create a lasting tribute to their loved ones. As Imagine continues to grow, we are honored to help families find meaningful ways to celebrate the lives of those they hold dear.

HUMAN IMAGE OF SUBMARINE IS A GUINNESS WORLD RECORD®

Elizabeth, NJ, and Elizabeth Public Schools, set a GUINNESS WORLD RECORDS® for the Largest Human Image of a Submarine.

An official judge from Guinness World Records was on hand to verify the record and confirmed that 800 students of the Elizabeth Public School- Juan Pablo Duarte- Jose Julian Marti School 28 set a new world record at 25 1st St, Elizabeth, NJ 07206. Guinness World Records announced that we have set a new world record!

The students came together with support from the Greater Elizabeth Chamber of Commerce, Destination Elizabeth The Marketing Organization, the local learning community, members of Elizabeth Public Schools central administration, Elizabeth Public Schools team members, members of the Elizabeth Board of Education, and City of Elizabeth dignitaries.

Other prominent members in attendance included USS New Jersey Commissioning Committee officials Pete Engelman and Tim Doelger.

A special salute to honor Elizabeth, NJ a city of "firsts" and its ongoing legacy to maritime history was demonstrated by the students of School 28, by standing on the very ground where American naval innovation first came to life-the original site of the Crescent Shipyard, where the first U.S. submarine was built. The students now are part of a living legacy documented forever in history by helping the city receive its first GUINNESS WORLD RECORDS® title.

"I am so proud of our students and team members for their commitment to teamwork in

> This event not only showcased the students' enthusiasm and teamwork but also pays homage to Elizabeth's rich naval history. "As we celebrate the 10th anniversary of Elizabeth Tourism, we reflect on a decade of marketing our destination and telling the stories that make this city extraordinary-from innovation and industry to resilience and community. Today, we proudly add a new chapter," said Jennifer M. Costa, CEO/President of the Elizabeth Tourism and Greater Elizabeth Chamber of Commerce.

> In September of 2024, the U.S. Navy officially recognized Elizabeth as the birthplace of the U.S. Submarine Force, acknowledging the city for having built and sold the first submarine to the U.S. Navy. The U.S. Navy commemorated the occasion with the unveiling of a sculpture - 3D replica of the USS Holland (SS-1) at Veterans Memorial Park created by local chamber members and students of the Elizabeth Public Schools.

> "Through the collaboration of Elizabeth Public Schools, the City of Elizabeth, and the United States Navy, we were able to commemorate the special connection between the submarine and our city," said Elizabeth Board of Education President Stanley J. Neron. "This great accomplishment by our community now allows us to share this story with the world."

> This Guinness World Record is one of two that the City of Elizabeth is pursuing. The other is an attempt to set a world record in celebration of the



FIFA World Cup 2026TM coming to

New Jersey. This world record attempt has been postponed due to excessive heat temperatures in Elizabeth and will be rescheduled for later this year.

STEP UP, SPEAK UP FOR FOSTER CHILDREN

CASA of Passaic and Union Counties

Mia spent most of her nine years in a home marked by instability and fear. Her parents' addiction left her hungry, alone, and unsure of what to expect each day. She eventually entered foster care. While her peers prepare for a funfilled summer, Mia finds herself living with strangers. A judge assigned a Court Appointed Special Advocate (CASA) volunteer to her and now, although things still feel uncertain and scary, Mia has someone who listens, shows up, and stands up for her.

Mia is just one of more than 500 children removed from home in Passaic and Union counties due to abuse and/or neglect. Living in foster care and separated from all they've known, each child needs a caring, consistent adult in their corner to protect their best interests while in care. Is that you?

CASA volunteers are trained advocates who visit the child monthly and have court-ordered access to all parties in the case. Supported by CASA staff, advocates make fact-based observations about outstanding needs or concerns and make recommendations to the court. The CASA volunteer is often the only consistent person in the child's life. Applicants must be at least 21, be able to communicate effectively both orally and in writing, have computer skills, pass a background check, and complete the 36-hour training.

Fall trainings start soon; Union County's begins Sept. 16 in Linden and Passaic County's begins Nov. 3 in Wayne; county of residence does not matter. View the training dates at casapassaicunion.org/casa-training.

The first step to becoming a CASA volunteer is to attend an information session. Register now

at casapassaicunion.org/info-session for any of the following:
