

# **BUS TRIP TO AC'S TROPICANA CASINO**

The Kenilworth Historical Society will host a bus trip to the Tropicana Casino and Resort in Atlantic City on Sat., July 26, 2025.

The trip will depart Kenilworth (St. Theresa School parking lot) at 8 a.m. and return to Kenilworth at approximately 6:30 p.m. Cost of \$77 includes comfortable motor coach transportation, an approximate 6-hour visit to the casino and \$10 in free slot play. There will be a 50/50 raffle and complimentary door prizes on the bus.






# WHAT, WHERE, WHEN IN OLD KENILWORTH KENILWORTH'S DISAPPEARING HILLS – PART I

At one time Kenilworth had more hills than it has today. Some of our earliest residents talked of the many rolling hills, fields of flowers, and brooks and streams that once made up the Kenilworth landscape in the 1890s and into the early 1900s. Early residents such as Fred Hiller (1885-1977) and Anna Grippo Scheuerer (1895-1991), were here in the 1890s. Luciano "Old Louie" Vitale (1880-1972) arrived in 1901. Their words painted a pastoral countryside of Kenilworth's earliest days as it transitioned from farms to the first houses being built here. Kenilworth then was part of an area known as New Orange. Some of the hills they spoke of remain, some have been greatly reduced, and some are gone forever. This series of articles starts about the year 1900 when all of Kenilworth's hills still existed. Some disappeared over the decades that followed. What happened to them?

The most famous hill was Tin Kettle Hill. It rose to 186 feet above sea level. Old Louie Vitale noted (1969), "You could see New York right from top of the hill." The crest of the hill was at what today would be N. Michigan Ave. about midway between Washington and Monroe avenues. It was the highest point in Union County outside of the Watchung Mountains. It is said that during the Revolutionary War it was the site of beacon fires to alert George Washington of British troop movements. This mammoth hill is gone. What happened to it?

The hill at one point was owned by the New Orange Industrial Association. It referred to it as "Monumental Hill." Earlier it was known as Sayre Hill for a farming family that lived nearby. The Association sold the hill for dirt to be used to fill in parts of the New Jersey Meadowlands to allow railroad tracks to be built thru the marshes enabling trains to roar on towards NYC. The hill's removal began in 1903 and was completed in 1906. The Cranford Citizen newspaper reported (1906) that hundreds and hundreds of train carloads hauled away 2 million cubic yards of earth. Fred Hiller spoke of the massive process. He said (1969), "Night and day, night and day, six days a week steam-shoveling and so forth were going on. That was a tremendous job. They sold the ground. They sold the hill. They sold the dirt. The trains would come back for a load with a lot of empty cars. The crew would spot 'em under the steam shovel, and they would be filled. They'd shove 'em up on the side there and then they'd have another train crew come along and take them out." He indicated that the Lehigh Valley RR train came in and pulled the loaded trains out because "it was too big a task for the Rahway Valley RR equipment."

The hill was so high that when the Rahway Valley Railroad was built in 1898, the tracks coming from Roselle Park did not go up Michigan Ave. as the locomotives would not be able to climb the hill. So the route was detoured east to the far side of Market St. to go around the hill. To get a perspective of how high Tin Kettle Hill was, go to the top of the Newark Ave. hill. Tin Kettle was 78 feet higher.



# **LIFESAVING EQUIPMENT IS VITAL ADDITION TO DIMARIO PARK**

#### The Aliver Foundation

The Borough of Kenilworth along with the Kenilworth Police Department, and Kenilworth Volunteer Fire Department participated in a family friendly community event hosted by The Aliver Foundation on June 10th to celebrate the donation of a lifesaving equipment bundle consisting of a CE TEK 4000 Outdoor AED Enclosure along with a Heartsine Samaritan 350P AED to DiMario Park.

The evening featured a touch-a-truck featuring fire trucks and police vehicles, an interactive CPR (cardiopulmonary resuscitation) and AED (automated external defibrillator) demonstration by Luciane Raibin of Garwood First Aid Squad, and a stethoscope craft for children.

Each year, nearly 360,000 people in the United States will experience an out-of-hospital cardiac arrest and fewer than 10% will survive. The best

outcomes occur when CPR is started immediately and an AED is used within the first few minutes. For every minute defibrillation is delayed, the chance of survival drops by about 10%.

"Since the day we started, we have had one goal: to save lives and help hearts," said Jill A. Pall, Founder of The Aliver Foundation. "If someone you love had cardiac arrest in an outdoor recreation space, would you want to have access to an AED right there or would you be okay waiting until first responders arrive, knowing that every minute without an AED decreases survival by 10%?," Pall asked.

The hope is that nobody will ever have to use this equipment but knowing it is there and can remain outside and accessible no matter the weather is so important.

About The Aliver Foundation

Founded in January 2024, The Aliver Foundation's mission is to raise awareness and funds to install all weather AEDs in outdoor recreation spaces while also providing crucial resources and educational opportunities to individuals and communities.

#### THE GOAL IS SIMPLE - TO SAVE LIVES AND HELP HEARTS BY:

- 1) Increasing the number of all weather, climate controlled AEDs that are in outdoor recreation spaces
- 2) Creating access to educational opportunities like CPR and AED training
- Providing resources and support to sudden cardiac arrest survivors and their loved ones
- 4) Circulating messaging about the difference between SCA and heart attacks as well as CPR and AED usage

# **STEP UP, SPEAK UP FOR FOSTER CHILDREN**

CASA of Passaic and Union Counties Mia spent most of her nine years in a home marked by instability and fear. Her parents' addiction left her hungry, alone, and unsure of what to expect each day. She eventually entered foster care. While her peers prepare for a funfilled summer, Mia finds herself living with strangers. A judge assigned a Court Appointed Special Advocate (CASA) volunteer to her and now, although things still feel uncertain and scary, Mia has someone who listens, shows up, and stands up for her.

Mia is just one of more than 500 children removed from home in Passaic and Union counties due to abuse and/or neglect. Living in foster care and separated from all they've known, each child needs a caring, consistent adult in their corner to protect their best interests while in care. Is that you?

CASA volunteers are trained advocates who visit the child monthly and have court-ordered access to all parties in the case. Supported by CASA staff, advocates make fact-based observations about outstanding needs or concerns and make recommendations to the court. The CASA volunteer is often the only consistent person in the child's life. Applicants must be at least 21, be able to communicate effectively both orally and in writing, have computer skills, pass a background check, and complete the 36-hour training.


